To the Editor of The Sentinel:

DEAR SIR—It may hardly seem necessary to draw your attention to the lack of good judgment and the astounding lack of fair play displayed by one of our City Fathers at the Council meeting held Monday evening. One does not desire that all the play of wit and grace of laughter should be removed from the proceedings of the Council, but it is certainly humiliating, to say the least, to see one in whom is trusted the control of civic affairs needlessly making charges against an official of the Town without any reason or justification. All know that the Councilor in question has much of a "human nature" himself but no possible excuse can be offered for the reckless display of Monday evening. Would it not be more in harmony with order, and with what the people have reason to expect from a City Father, for any charges to be made in a regular way and not in the haphazard manner and bitter spirit in which this charge was hurled.

But aside from the dignity of the Council, which certainly ought to be maintained, by his charges this Councilor puts a stigma upon a trusted official of the Town. Is it an honorable thing, or is it even fair, to touch a man's integrity by a rumour, or unfounded statement. We have no more trusted, no more respected and no better official in the service of the town than the one whom this Councilor referred to Monday evening. And yet there are those who would be foolish enough to be influenced by a vague innuendo. Surely in the interest of fair play and good citizenship we ought to expect a fairness of statement and a reasonable display of good judgment from those who have sought and obtained positions of honor. It may be that the town will laugh at the incident referred to and call it another one of the Councilor's "outbursts" but surely when it has so serious an influence upon another it is time to call a halt to these "outbursts."
