San Francisco, Nov. 28.—A revision of the imperial laws of Japan, which will extend to aliens the privilege of opening property in fee simple for agricultural and other purposes, will be the consideration of the next treaty that is consummated in Japan with another nation, according to M. Zomoto, proprietor of the Japanese Times, of Tokyo, the close friend of the big figures of the present day life of the island empire.
