Williamson Fisher Wins.

The Supreme Court on Friday gave Judgment in the appeal taken by Williamson Fisher, Collector of Customs, against a verdict entered in the Carleton County Court last summer, wherein Mr Fisher was plaintiff and the Town of Woodstock defendant. The suit arose out of a transaction concerning the sale of a quantity of granite curbing. Mr Fisher was contractor for the Armoury, and alleged that the Town had taken a quantity of paving stone, for which it refused to pay. The case came to trial before Judge Carleton without a jury. His honor gave judgment in favor of the Town, from which appeal was taken, as has been stated. Argument was heard in October. The court after full deliberation, unanimously held that the original verdict must be set aside, and a verdict entered in favor of Mr Fisher, in the sum of \$108. This and the costs, which are considerable, must now apparently be paid to Mr Fisher. At the several stages of the case Mr Fisher was represented by F B Carvell K C, and the Town by its solicitor, Mr Hartley.

N. B. Members Busy Men.

The Ottawa correspondent of the St John Telegraph furnishes that paper with a breezy letter every day or so concerning the doings of the politicians. This parliament is no exception to its predecessors in that the men from the East are among the ablest and busiest there. No provincial delegation is held in greater esteem than the eleven Liberals from New Brunswick, which province clearly bears the palm. Discussing this matter the writer above referred to says:—

There are no busier men than those sent from the maritime provinces. To hear many of them talk, their place is home attending to their business and not here. This applies to both parties. Some act upon that thought and remain away a good deal of the time looking after their own or their clients' affairs. Courts will open just the same even if parliament is in session and boards of arbitration will not stay their deliberations because members and counsel are engaged in the business of the country. Within a few days

one of these boards meets at St John and besides Senator Costigan, Frank B Carvell, M P, and Col McLean, M P, will have to be there. These are busy valuable men, no matter where they are. They look after the interest of their constituencies here more thoroughly probably than many others. The busy men always seem to have time, for the simple reason they have some method.

But if the newly elected members grow a little at being away from home it must be noticed that Ottawa has a kind of attraction for those to whom the electors were unkind. Just now among the Ex's in the vicinity are George Fowler, formerly of Kings-Albert; Hughes, P E Island; Johnson, of Cape Breton, and Pope, of Quebec. All of them, of course, got a warm reception from their friends as well as a sympathetic twist. Some of them are kept busy explaining "how it happened," but that by this time has become an old story and the representatives of defeat would prefer not to be asked that question. It is quite a comfort, though, to some people, to give the knife a turn or two after it is in.

Sir Wilfrid yesterday asked Dr McAllister, of Kings-Albert, to act as Liberal whip for New Brunswick. The honor was unexpected by the popular member but he is in constant attendance at the house and is well calculated for the duties of his position.

Among the familiar faces at the Russell last evening was that of James Robinson, ex-MP for Northumberland. Just now Mr Robinson thinks with the Liberals, and if the truth were known, though the Parliamentary Campaigner used to class him on the other side, the genial James was always more in sympathy with the Liberal leaders than with the company he kept officially. His business interests bring him to Montreal frequently and the opportunity to make the remaining distance and chat over old times is not to be resisted.
