### FORTY YEARS AGO.

A glance at the Carleton Sentinel of Feb 13th 1869, discloses some interesting things. Of the doctors then residing here the cards of O P Connell, Stephen Smith, and N R Colter appear, also that of Dr Reynolds who lived at Archibald Plummer's, just above the Upper Corner. W A Balloch was apparently the sole dental surgeon advertising at that time. Of the legal gentlemen the cards of S B Appleby and W M Connell appear. The leading hotels of that day appear to have been the Cable House, run by A H Parks; the Caldwell House, G W Tinker prop; and the Gibson House, Alex Gibson prop. Outside hotels advertising locally at that time were the Park and American of St John, Long's of Fredericton and the Russell of Ottawa. Other advertisers were S E Baker, coach and sleigh factory; Glidden & Glidden, livery close to Woodstock Hotel; S T Baker, carriage factory; P Gillin, groceries and liquors; James Grover, insurance; Simon McLeod, clothing and auctioneer; G W Vanwart, dry goods and express; M McGuirk, furs etc; Michael Quinn, clothing; Hugh Hay, dry goods; Bryson & Morrison, photographers; A McTavish, dry goods; P R Bowers, book store; W T Baird, druggist; D McLeod Vince dry goods and groceries, Hartland; H R Baird, chemist; Davis, Parsons & Dickinson, tanners; S E Jewett, tinware; Wm Dibblee, groceries and fancy goods; C F K Dibblee, land surveyor; C B Churchill, tinshop; James Jordan, hardware; Small & Fisher, threshing machines; F T Bridges, jewelry; B W Harvey, marble works; J & D Ebbett, general store; John Regan, dry goods and groceries.
