Town Council.

A bare quorum gathered Friday evening, those present being Mayor Thorne and Couns Ketchum, Fisher and Hagerman.

R Ricardi was heard in reference to his proposed clothespin factory. He asked exemption from taxes, free water and a bond guarantee of \$5000. On motion he was asked to submit his proposition in writing for future consideration by the council.

A delegation of temperance workers appeared, consisting of Rev R G Fulton and Messrs C L Smith and G W Slipp. They presented a memorial praying for the enlargement of the Scott Act committee by the addition of Couns Ketchum and Hagerman. The three delegates made brief speeches urging compliance with the request, and also asking for a better enforcement of the Scott Act. Rev Mr Fulton said he for one had no fault to find with the present Inspector, who would doubtless do whatever the council wished him to do. He was scarcely satisfied with the work of the Chief of Police. Mr Fulton strongly urged that the whole council act on the Committee.

The Mayor, in replying to the delegation, said it was rather unfortunate that some feeling had arisen over the composition of the committee. Prior to naming the committee he had been asked by leading temperance workers to nominate Coun Fawcett as chairman, with Couns Fisher and Dugan as associates, on the ground that those three gentlemen were regarded with most favor by the temperance people. He had complied with the request. Three is the limit on committees, and he had no idea that any man at the council board would put the least impediment in the way of the committee or inspector. Unfortunately two members of the committee were not present. He couldn't say whether their absence was temporary or permanent. If they failed to attend council any longer, as had been hinted, it would be necessary to re-elect the committee. Pending the by-election of March 1st for one new member, he asked that the request of the delegation be withdrawn.

This was not in accord with the wish of the delegation. Coun Ketchum said he for one could not comply with the prayer of the petition. He was not personally against enforcing the law, but didn't believe sentiment in Woodstock is in favor of a rigid carrying out of the Act. Coun Hagerman declared that he was in favor of enforcing all laws and by-laws but was not in favor of enlarging the committee, since his experience had taught him that a small committee can do just as effective work, and much more easily, than a large unwieldy body. Anyway the Chairman is the man who has to bear the brunt of the burden. Coun Fisher made a motion that the request of the delegates be granted, but it failed to secure a seconder. The delegates then withdrew.

Coun Ketchum moved the resolution of which he had given notice at the previous meeting, in amendment of the license by-law on traders coming in from outside, raising the yearly fee from \$100 to \$300. This was seconded by Coun Fisher, and carried.

After passing several bills, Council adjourned, sine die.
