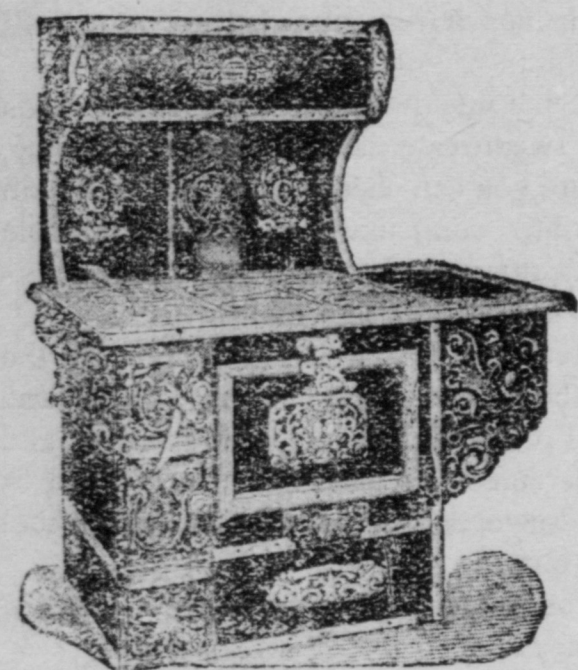

Borrowed Ten Dollars and made a Fortune.

Winnipeg, Dec 2.—Mr A. Gwillim, of Forster, Sask., came to Canada from France eighteen years ago, borrowed \$10 from a farmer by whom he was employed, expended the money staking a homestead, and is now one of the West's most prosperous agriculturists, being worth a quarter of a million dollars.

Alternately working his homestead and hiring out to nearby farmers to secure money to carry him along, Gwillim began to prosper. His first crop was a good one and from then on his road to wealth became smoother, and from time to time he purchased adjoining lands, until now his homestead of 160 acres forms but a portion of his farm, which consists of 42 other quarter-sections, or 6,880 acres of the best farming land to be found in Saskatchewan. Of this land Gwillim had some 6,000 acres in crop this year, and in round figures three hundred 30,000 bushels of wheat, the same of oats, and 7,000 bushels of barley, the proceeds from which alone are a small fortune. To run this large farm, 104 horses are used besides farming machinery and a threshing outfit worth \$25,000.

Conservative Leaders Rebuked by Conservative Newspapers

(Hamilton Spectator.)

There seems to be a difference of opinion among the parliamentarians in respect to the new French treaty which parliament has not yet ratified. Because of recent tariff legislation at Washington and intimations as to what our near neighbor intends to do with countries that make discriminating trade treaties with other nations, some members of the dominion house are urging that we shall do nothing final with the French treaty until we hear definitely how our American cousins will act in such event, their fear being that the Americans may raise the tariff against Canadian goods and thus injure the trade of this country.

The Spectator does not like this argument. For Canadians to thus admit that they dare not close a trade treaty with another country without first asking permission from the United States is to admit that the government to the south of us is practically the dictator of our foreign trade policy.

The French trade treaty may be a good or a bad business arrangement. That is something which can be determined only after it has been given a fair trial.

Evidently the judgement of the Canadian representatives who had a hand in the framing of it was, that it was a good thing, and the government is disposed to ratify it. If it should later be demonstrated in operation to have been a mistake its makers will be sufferers. In the meantime, however, let us as Canadians play off our own bat and not place ourselves in the humiliating position which we would occupy if we hesitated to close what seemed to us a good trade deal negotiated with a foreign nation for fear that it might not be to the liking of our friends, the Americans.

A TACTICAL BLUNDER.

(From the Hamilton Herald.)

The opposition leaders at Ottawa have made another tactical blunder in opposing Hon Mr Fielding's resolution approving of the French-Canadian commercial treaty. They favored delay in order that the government may make inquiries at Washington and ascertain whether the U S government will be likely to retaliate against Canada because the French treaty provides for favored treatment to certain classes of French goods imported into this country.

Mr Fielding takes the ground that this country's trade arrangements are its own concern, and that it would be both undignified and impolitic to make those arrangements with a view to possible action of the United States. And he is eminently right. The government at Washington can have a reciprocity arrangement with Canada whenever it wishes—probably an arrangement not less favorable to the United States than the Franco-Canadian treaty is to France. But it doesn't appear to hanker after such an arrangement. Canada is content to go without but Canadian statesmen should not permit the U S government, while refusing to enter into reciprocal trade relations with Canada, to prevent this country, by threats of retaliation, from entering into such relations with other countries which are willing to give as well as take.

We admire Mr Fielding's spirit. We wonder also what course the opposition would propose if it were found that the Washington government is determined to penalize Canada on account of the French treaty. Would they propose to renounce the French treaty?

LONDON TIMES PRAISES LAURIER'S SPEECH ON NAVY.

Montreal, Nov 28.—The C. A. P. London correspondent cables: The Times publishes a letter from Sir Charles Tupper to R. L. Borden, dated Nov 20, on the question of the Canadian navy, which says that all that is required is that the government of the day should carry out the resolution passed in the house of commons at Ottawa last session, pledging parliament to proceed vigorously with the construction of a Canadian navy.

Tupper says he cannot understand the demand for Dreadnoughts, and cannot avoid thinking that a fearful responsibility will rest on those who disturb or destroy the compact entered into at the imperial defence conference on this vitally important question.

The Times editorially says Sir Charles Tupper's letter should contribute to a strengthening of the concord between Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr Borden on the naval question. The Times also says: "Laurier's speech of the 16th, contain the true ideal of imperial unity. It is not really derogatory to this lofty ideal to say, as Laurier also said, on the same occasion, 'Canada would have a navy and that navy would not go to war unless the parliament of Canada chose to send it.' In the abstract such a proposition is indisputable. In the abstract it applies to any and every form of co-operation or contribution for the purposes of imperial defence. But in the concrete it is certain the same consideration and motives which have served to bring about the present situation will also serve to maintain and develop it."

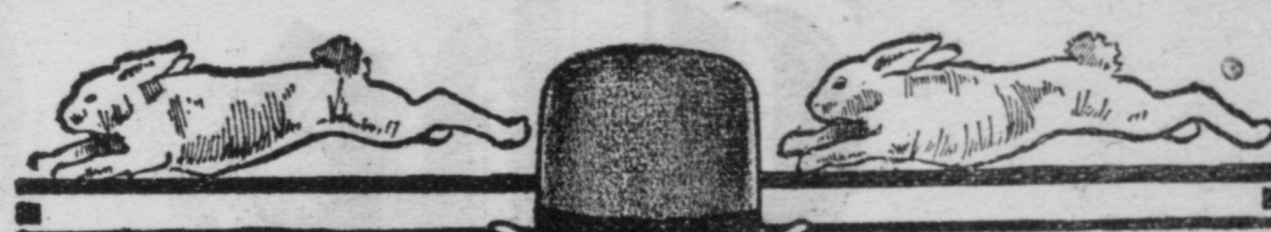
