## EULOGY OR AN EPITAPH WHICH?

This is the question many have been asking since the Press came out with its magnificent eulogy of Mr. Flemming and Mr. Munro this week. For many weeks the Press has maintained a discreet silence regarding these gentlemen, so much so in fact that we arrived at the conclusion that the Press had at least discovered, what has been patent to the public for some time, that these gentlemen are politically dead. But to the surprise of the public the Press this week brings these gentlemen forth again into the limelight, it tells the public what great men they are, it points out the work they have accomplished, or rather are going to accomplish, for alas! Mr. Munro and Mr. Flemming are future tense men, they are always going to do something, and then the Press tells us what they stand for. The question is why this great overflow of fealty at this time, why this lavishness of praise. Have these gentlemen a prospect of resurrection from their political death or does the Press think that in view of the coming session of the House it is simply a resuscitation.

Or it maybe that the Press, with far greater foresight than we have given it credit for, has seen the gathering cloud, has been able to forecast events and instead of sounding the praise over a revived and resuscitated pair of representatives it is preparing an epitaph for the passing of these men who would have been great but could not reach the mark.

## BORROWED PLUMES.

With inconsistency which one hardly expects, even from the Press, we are told this week that "the chief commissioner, on the advice of Mr. Munro, will pay one half the cost of building the retaining wall from the Lindsay building to the Meduxna-keag creek pier." Some weeks ago we published the facts in this case. When Mr. Munro was approached as the town representative, for the usual aid given in these cases, he pointedly refused to give any assistance on the ground that the owner of the property had no votes. A short time after, during the week the Union of Municipalities met in Woodstock to be accurate, the Hon Mr. Morrisey was in town and a gentleman who has no particular political leanings took him down to the creek where the work was in progress and suggested to Mr. Morrisey that in view of what had been done on former occasions it would only be right to pay one-half the cost of this wall also. With commendable promptness Mr. Morrisey said at once that it would be done and said

"send me the bills and I will have the matter promptly attended to."

Mr. Munro was not known in the matter, and it is commonly said that Mr. Morrisey does not know Mr. Munro in anything he can well avoid out to the Commissioner of Public Works alone can the credit be given for this work. The Press however can be excused, it must say something in favour of Mr. Munro and the only way possible is to borrow from the work of some other man and give the credit to Mr. Munro.

## A SERIOUS MATTER.

In the news columns of the paper we direct attention to the importation of three carloads of beef cattle from Alberta by the Imperial Packing Company. Surely this is "bringing coals to Newcastle" with a vengeance. That Carleton County, for so many years the banner county of the Province, is not able to raise beef for its own consumption is a subject for consideration. It maybe that the Potato business is making the farmer rich, tho' they themselves say not, but if so it certainly is at the expense of the future welfare of the county and this importation of beef cattle is but the forerunner of what will occur unless we get back to mixed farming.

## STANDARD TOPOGRAPHICAL MAP OF CANADA.

The Department of the Interior has just issued a new map of Prince Edward Island comprising sheet No. 14 of the Standard Topographical Map of Canada. This map covers not only the whole of the island but parts of the counties of Kent and Westmorland in New Brunswick and parts of the counties of Cumberland, Colchester, Pictou, Antigonish and Inverness in Nova Scotia.

The map is of a convenient size—about 3 feet square and is on the comparatively large scale of 3.95 miles to the inch. It shows all surveys to date, post offices, stations on the railway, highways and roads and all other available information within the territory covered.

A series of these maps is being issued by the Chief Geographer of the Department of the Interior. Maps are being prepared in detail of the most important districts of the Dominion and the intention is to combine them as has been now done in the case of Prince Edward Island into large and complete maps of each of the provinces of Canada when all are finished. In the meantime, copies of the map of each district are being issued for the convenience of the public as soon as the individual plates are completed. The following sheets have been published covering portions of Nova Scotia on the same scale as the map of Prince Edward Island: The Cape Breton sheet—(comprising Cape Breton and part of the counties of Antigonish and Guysborough). The Truro sheet comprising Pictou and parts of the counties of Antigonish, Guysborough, Halifax, Colchester, Cumberland and Hants.

The Halifax, Yarmouth and Moncton sheets covering the remainder of the province and part of New Brunswick are in progress.

In New Brunswick, the St. John sheet on the smaller scale of 7.95 miles to the inch was published in 1905. This map does not cover quite all of the province; the south eastern part of the counties of Kent, Westmorland and Albert not being shown but a new and up-to-date map covering the entire province is under preparation.

It will be interesting to the public to know that single copies of any one of the published sheets of the Standard Topographical Map may be obtained free on application to the Chief Geographer of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa.

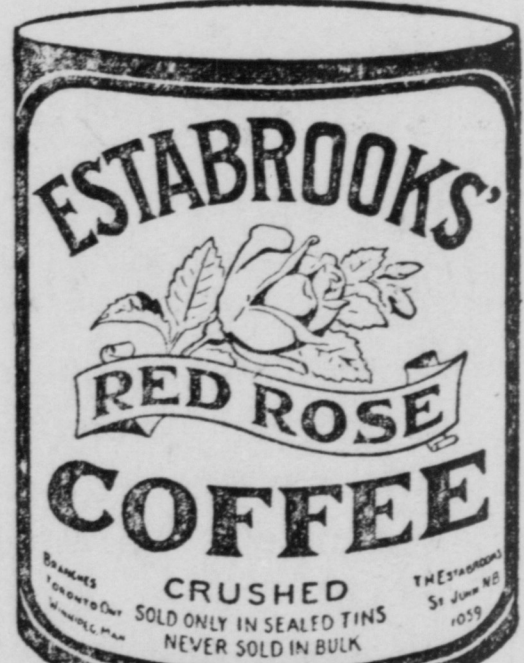
