For the maintenance of this Board, Parliament last year appropriated \$168,000 of which \$55,000 went for salaries of Commissioners and Secretary, \$103,000 for maintenance and operations, and \$10,000 for expenses of public sittings. The actual expenditure, \$136,969.17, is \$31,030.83 less than the appropriation.
