GENTLEMEN,—I have to acknowledge  
the receipts of your letter and samples  
dated the 20th inst, which owing to the  
Xmas holidays have been delayed. I have  
completed the assays upon them and am  
enclosing herewith certificate for the same.

In the first sample, I took all the differ-  
ent pieces and had them ground together;  
their composition you will see from the  
certificate; and have assayed them as one  
sample. This makes very good ore, and  
should pay you to ship, the best market  
for you probably being in England. With  
a formation such as you describe there is  
every probability of the ore going down,  
and retaining its values at depth, though  
the Lead will probably give place to more  
Zinc or Copper. You will notice that I  
have not made allowance for the Zinc,  
this is because the Smelters always make  
special allowances for this metal accord-  
ing to the ore, and to the smelter.

An Important Tribunal.

Much that is interesting and instructive  
concerning the work of one of the most  
important tribunals which has ever been  
set up in Canada is contained in the report  
of the Board of Railway Commissioners  
for the last fiscal year. The Board, as  
originally constituted by the Laurier gov-  
ernment five years ago, consisted of three  
members, but the pressure of work be-  
came so great that it was found necessary  
over a year ago to double the number.  
At the present time there is one vacancy,  
due to the death of Hon Thomas Green-  
way. Once a month regular sittings of  
the Board are held in Ottawa, and special  
sittings are held in various cities of the  
Dominion, as occasion requires.

Last year 39 public sittings were held  
and 3,479 applications were considered,  
an increase of 354 over the preceding year.  
Filings and outgoing letters totalled \$1,913  
—an increase of 6,483; orders issued, 2,249  
or 462 more than in 1907. Of the 3,479  
applications, 737 were heard at public sit-  
tings, 2,742 being disposed of without the  
necessity of a hearing.

For the maintenance of this Board, Par-  
liament last year appropriated \$168,000  
of which \$55,000 went for salaries of Com-  
missioners and Secretary, \$103,000 for  
maintenance and operations, and \$10,000  
for expenses of public sittings. The actual  
expenditure, \$136,969.17, is \$31,030.83  
less than the appropriation.

The Board is clothed with the full pow-  
ers of a court of law, but it is free from the  
inelasticity and formality inseparable  
from ordinary court procedure. Since its  
organization it has been instrumental in  
securing a reasonable regulation of the  
transportation companies, with due re-  
gards to the rights and interests of both  
the companies and the public, and in that  
alone has justified its creation. It is  
about to become increasingly valuable as  
a regulator of public utilities.—(Chroni-  
cle.)

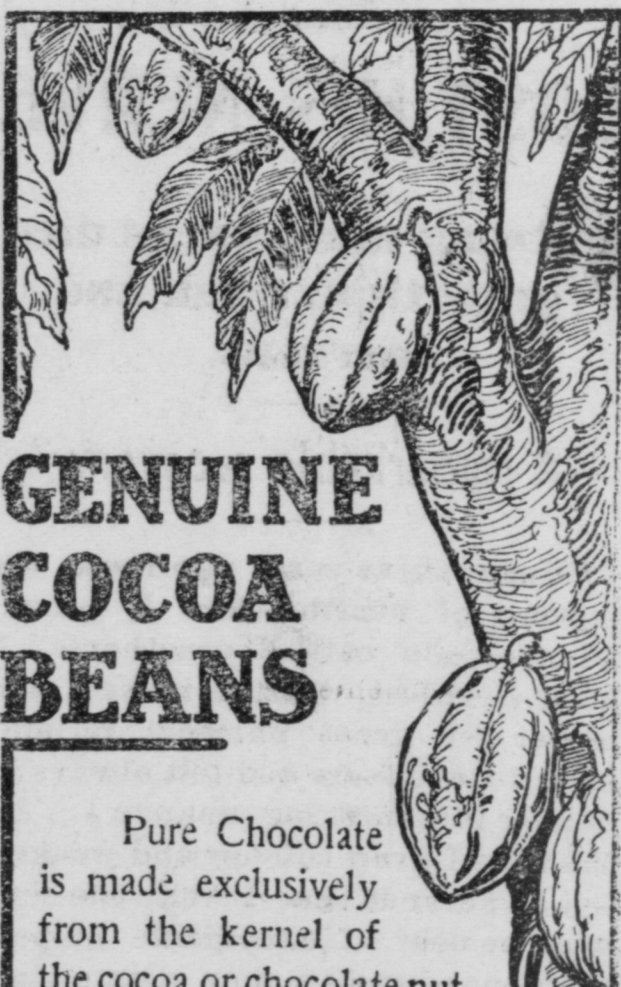

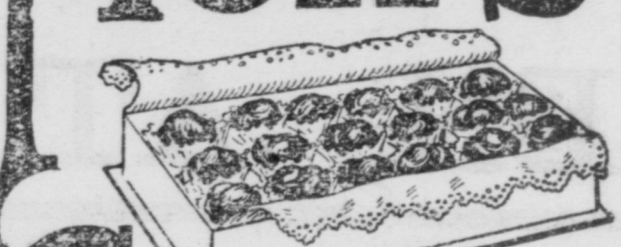
