Shipments are made to the United States, United Kingdom, West Indies, South Africa, South America, and even to Australia. Surveyor General Grimmer states that the cut of logs on the Crow's Lands of New Brunswick during the winter totalled about 265,000,000 feet, or 60,000,000 feet more than in the preceding winter. There is also a large cut each year on the land owned by private companies and individuals. United States lumber men have invested largely in timberlands in the Province during the past dozen years, and are still picking up desirable properties. The export of pulpwood has been growing as a result of these investments.
