Calls Medical Schools a National Disgrace.

Chicago, March 7.—President Schurman of Cornell, in an address before the American Medical Association, said he considered commercial schools of medicine and medical schools, "hitched on" universities to complete their sphere of activity, a disgrace to the country.

"I do not hesitate to assert," he declared, "that many of our medical schools and colleges have been established for the pecuniary benefit of their promoters, with the result that we now have in the United States almost as many of these institutions as all the rest of the civilized world. The personal profit of individuals has been the most powerful and prolific motive for the multiplication of medical colleges, as it has also been the most pernicious."

"At the same time there has been a growing appreciation of the fact that every professional school to be vital and efficient must be a department of a university. I am indeed firmly persuaded that no university, merely because it is a university, is justified in founding a medical college. Institutional addition is an unallowable motive for the multiplication of medical colleges as the love of personal gain. The latter motive has filled the country with commercial schools of medicine. The schools are a disgrace to our country."

Many times has the Chinese government ordered a census made of the population of that country, but there has never been one which is accepted as any where near accurate. In their totals, these computations have varied greatly, so that they are not deemed of any more value than as estimates on which to base other estimates. Figures given by geographers have fixed the total population at a figure as high as 450,000,000, while the more conservative figures of the different censuses vary from 100,000,000 to 200,000,000. A census is now under way which is being conducted on such lines as to warrant the belief that it is of value in arriving at the population and resources of the country. The difficulties in the way of this work are stupendous, but a systematic effort is being made by the government to secure the correct figures.

Four thousand dollars an inch was the value set upon a man's leg by a jury in the Supreme Court at New York, Monday. Tried before Justice Ford, the damage suit of Patrick O'Donovan, a night watchman, who fell into a hole in the street and broke his leg, resulted in a verdict of \$6,000 against the city. O'Donovan's leg was shortened 1 1/2 inches by the breakage and the resulting operation, the testimony showed.

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THE EDUCATIONAL ASPECT OF FORESTRY.

By Dr. C. C. Jones, M. A., Ph. D., Chancellor of the University of New Brunswick.

Dr. C. C. Jones, Chancellor of the University of New Brunswick, which has a course in Forestry, gave an address instead of reading a paper. He contrasted the educational aspects of Forestry with regulative restrictions, and showed that education was essential in order to get the right kind of regulations. This was further developed by a brief review of what other countries were doing in the matter of education, notably Germany and France. He then showed how much educational work had been done in Canada by means of the Canadian Forestry Association and local associations, and now by the newly organized Commission of Conservation. What had been done in Canada in way of special departments of universities who pointed out, courses having been established

at New Brunswick and Toronto. Dr. Jones traced the connection that should exist. Arbor Day, largely neglected and ignored, should be revived and made really what its founders intended it to be. Nature study, too, suffered in the same way, even if not to the same extent. In many schools nature study practically stopped in the winter for lack of material, whereas it could be carried on all winter if the trees were studied. That this was needed was shown by the fact that boys even in the country did not know the names and characteristics of common trees. Following this up children should be taught the uses and comparative values of the different woods. This would lead on to a consideration of the dangers which threaten these friends of man, especially the danger from fires. If this thought of the fire loss were impressed upon the children each school would become a centre of fire fighting influence. Children in wooded districts often cause damage by starting fires either carelessly or to make berry patches. This would cease as soon as the old idea that very tree was an enemy was eradicated, and besides the influence on the general public and in after life would be immense. On these educational lines there was much important work to be done for forestry.
