The Forestry Course in a Lumbering Region.

By Robert Barclay Miller, M. F. Professor of Forestry in the University of New Brunswick.

Prof. Miller, who is the head of the Forestry Department of the University of New Brunswick, spoke first of the recent conference of forestry educators in Washington, called together by Mr. Gifford Pinchot, when, although all kinds of forest schools were represented from the big post graduate institutions, there was a unanimity of view as to certain main lines of forestry instruction. He showed how Prof. Fisher of Harvard in order to give his students practical experience had had them conduct actual logging operation on a two thousand acre tract belonging to the University. In New Brunswick, where lumbering was the leading industry and where students might observe woods operation close at hand, no such department was necessary. He proceeded to explain the four year course in Forestry in the University of New Brunswick. The first two years the course is affiliated with the engineering course as forestry is a branch of engineering. In the two last years the usual forestry subjects of silviculture, dendrology, forest mensuration, topographical surveying were taken up with practical work. Part of this will be got in a tract of 3000 acres of woods just back of the University and belonging to the University, but most of it in the lumber camps in the province. The nearness of these camps and the booms in the St. John River at Fredericton gave the school an advantage over those located far away from woods operations. The work of booming, driving, towing, and sawing the export trade, and the subsidiary industries as the making of pulp, paper, bark extract, wood distillation, etc., were studied at first hand. Great benefit had been experienced from the meetings of the Forestry Club where experienced lumbermen gave practical talks to the students on what they might expect to meet in their life work.

Prof. Miller discussed what attention should be given to cruising and estimating in a forestry course. He entirely disagreed with the statement that it was an insult to the profession for a lumber company to employ a forester as a cruiser and estimator. He wanted to know what more honorable and legitimate work there could be for a forester. He pointed out that some of the most successful men in the United States had done more to advance the profession than those who overstocked with dignity, wanted to devote themselves entirely to the theoretic side for which New Brunswick will not be ready for years. Studies leading to such practical work should have precedence over some of the purely theoretical subject. The student should also be able to ride, pack, shoot and cook over an open fire. Men should be able to take care of themselves in the woods without a dry nurse. What must be done was to secure a proper balance between the two so that men would not only be useful now but would be ready for the more advanced conditions ten years hence. Each teacher must work this out for himself, but he reminded them that the most notable examples of success were not those which the world counted most successful but those who had vision and who wrought not selfishly but for the good of future generations.

Coats For Spring Are In Hip Length.

Velvet is used on the more dressy coats for spring in facings on collars and cuffs and as an edge in place of the braids we have used so long.

The wraps and capes are mostly sleeveless, with large or small openings for the hands, as they have been for the present season, but they are decidedly new in the arrangement of the drapery and in the bands which are used to hold in the fulness of the lower portion, just as they are used on the new skirts.

Linings need not harmonize to be in good taste, many gay colors are used, making the most brilliant color combinations, while bands of velvet are used as a trimming, as for the coats.

The unbelted coats, and there are just as many of these as with belts, which are not always becoming, are about hip length, and they are cut away at the front in a curved or diagonal line or lapped over wide at the left side.

Unless there is fulness given by the cut of the coat, have it finished with a deep plait at each side of the back, as this will be one of the distinctive points about the new coats. Small bone buttons set very close together are much used on coats buttoning higher up, while two or three buttons of a larger size are placed low on the coats with long lapels.

The lapels and revers should be very wide and short, or very long and more narrow in appearance.

Remarkable New Gun.

Washington, Feb. 28.—The army has just adopted a new type of machine gun that has some remarkable points of advantage over existing guns. The new weapon is so small that it can be carried by a man, or two, with full equipment of stands and ammunition, can be packed upon a mule. Moreover, it can be fired from the shoulder, and consequently is much less subject to attack and capture by the enemy.

The ammunition is carried on steel strips and the new gun is said to be free from the danger of choking, while the barrels are carried in duplicate and can be almost instantly changed when they become heated from rapid firing.
