Florenceville Consolidated School Closing Exercises.

After this, examinations were conducted in the Primary, Elementary, Intermediate and Advanced Departments, in various branches, including Spelling, Geography, Arithmetic, Grammar and Analysis, British History, Algebra and Geometry.

Letter from F. A. Hourihan, Monarch, Alberta.

The Sentinel is in receipt of the following interesting letter from Mr F A Hourihan. Mr Hourihan has been teaching in Monarch, Alberta, but is about to return to his home in Carleton County, and in the fall will take a course in St Joseph College.

To the Editor of the Sentinel:

DEAR SIR,—The Sentinel has been a very welcome visitor to me, especially during my sojourn here, as I find it very interesting and look for its coming with much eagerness. Note by your paper and the Telegraph that you are having considerable rain in N B and the eastern Provinces, even enough to injure the crops to some extent, while here the crops are suffering considerably for the want of moisture. We have had scarcely any rain for nearly a year and the winter was very mild and spring opened early. As a result of this, farmers began to seed early, the last of February and in March and the continual dry weather, interrupted by only a few slight rains, has very much retarded the growth of the wheat of these infinite prairie fields. Farmers in nearly all parts of southern Alberta report that spring wheat is suffering intensely from the hot and dry weather and the fall wheat fir but little better. It is believed that both crops will be ruined if they don't receive sufficient moisture within a short time.
