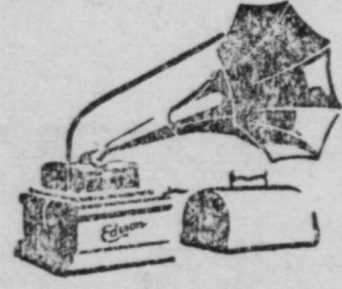

Mrs Emma A H Harmon.

One by one New Brunswick's veterans of European wars are succumbing to the great enemy. In Fredericton last week Major McKee was interred with military honors after a military career of almost three score years. The same week Sgt. Major Hughes of St. John was buried by his fellow soldiers. Both these men were Crimean veterans, and one had seen service in other distant lands. Sgt. Major Hughes received the injury which eventually caused his death in the trenches at Sebastopol. There are still a few old British soldiers in the loyalist city of St. John and veterans of the Boer War, by the score. The new school of heroes—Company "G," in Khaki—the Maritime Provincial boys who captured Cronje, have their meetings each year, and on Monday last made merry at table in honor of their achievements.

Last week St. John was threatened with a Woman Suffrage campaign but it looks now as if too danger was passed. The ladies interested in this movement circulated literature among all organized bodies in the City, soliciting their support. As these bodies met and discussed the communication, resolutions, either non-committal or negative in character, were passed, but the last straw was left for the Mayor of the city who merely said: "As far as I can see, the women of St. John and the Province are not showing an overwhelming desire to obtain franchise. To be sure there are some energetic women taking the matter up, but as yet they do not seem to be in touch with their sisters generally."

Quebec and the Navy.

Mr Monk desired to kill the Laurier naval policy, and in some quarters the assertion has been made that he had Quebec at his back. But La Presse, the most powerful of the French-Canadian journals of the Dominion, shows that Quebec is not at all of Mr Monk's opinion on the question. Quebec knows the value of British naval supremacy. Says La Presse:

"The wicked arm for attack, the good for defence. They dispute for the soil and the fruit of the earth. One wishes to keep what he has, another wishes to have what he has not. Such is life and the reasons for armaments. The powers do not arm for the pleasure of armaments; they arm either for conquest or for defence or for the peace of the world and the security of their institutions."

"When the nations had no navies, pirates infested the seas. The British fleet has done more to exterminate them than any other fleet in the world. This fleet, hitherto inviolable, is the ocean police."

"It is not evident that the security of our institutions rests on the naval force of the British Empire?"

"If the British fleet disappears from the seas, of all the provinces of Canada, the Provinces of Quebec would lose the most because the other provinces could pass over to the United States without change of language, laws or religion, while the privilege of our faith, our tongue and our laws would disappear in the abyss."

"The Province of Quebec and we French Canadians, we Catholics, have the first interest in the power and preservation of the navy of the British Empire. We are the most interested to fly to their succor in danger, and in the name of heaven, in the name of common sense, what would we do without a fleet, that is to say a Canadian fleet can could harmoniously become part of the Imperial fleet in the hour of danger."—Telegraph.

Ottawa, March 31.—In a resolution of which Hon Rodolphe Lemieux has given notice, the salary of post-office inspectors on appointment is to be \$2,500, with an annual increase of \$100 to a maximum of \$3,500.

For assistant inspectors and for superintendents of the railway mail service, the minimum salary is to be \$1,500, with an annual increase of \$100 to a maximum of \$2,500. For assistant postmasters the minimum salary is fixed at \$1,100, and the maximum is \$2,800.
