"INSURGENCY RAMPANT."

The ambitious plans which the dominant faction of the Opposition, as represented by the Toronto News and certain of the Ontario supporters of Mr. Borden, have formulated for house-cleaning, are more likely to make confusion more confounded than to promote harmony in the ranks of the sadly distracted party.

Certain Opposition organs took it upon themselves to send Hon. George Eulas Foster, the chief finance critic of the Opposition, and in the estimation of many of its party, the ablest man on the Opposition side of the House, to the right-about-face Mr. Foster, however, refuses to be sacrificed. He has promptly and emphatically announced that he does not propose to be crowded out. "Somebody," he says, "has been getting in his dirty work," but he is in public life to stay—"unless the Lord takes me."

Leading Conservative organs, it is true, long ago declared that Mr. Foster's usefulness as a public man was gone, but in spite of the revelations of the insurance investigation, Mr. Foster did not see it that way, and he continued to sit in the front ranks of the Opposition and to discharge his task as chief financial critic, as if nothing had happened. He even took occasion to defend his course as Manager of the Union Trust Company, in the House of Commons. Whatever Mr. Borden may have thought about it, he made no steps to remove Mr. Foster. Mr. Foster certainly has no intention of going on his own accord.

Even now, with the added weight of the jury's verdict in the recent libel trial in Toronto, upon him, he hurled defiance at all and sundry and issues what, in effect, is an ultimatum to the pro-Borden conspirators, namely, that he will fight to the bitter end. If Mr. Borden is spurred to the point of tackling Mr. Foster, there will be wigs on the green in short order.

The attack on Mr. Monk by the anti-Quebec wing of the Opposition portends still more stormy times for the Conservative Party. The vicious on-slaught which the Toronto News has made upon Mr. Monk, who is accused of being an "insurgent" and of "intriguing" against Mr. Borden, will be bitterly resented by his party associates in the Province of Quebec. Something of their temper was shown by their action in sending the delegation headed by Sir Alexander Lacoste to Ottawa, to protest against the insulting attacks of Mr. Borden's followers on the people of Quebec. Their disaffection with the present leadership of the Opposition was still further manifested at a recent meeting of the Club Lafontaine in Montreal, at which there was much plain talk.

If then, the anti-Quebec faction insists upon throwing Mr. Monk to the wolves, it will spell the end of the Conservative Party. No political leader in Canada can afford to ignore the Province of Quebec or fail to take account of the sentiment of its loyal, true-hearted people. That is the direction in which the Opposition are heading and that way spells defeat and disaster.

Mr. Monk has done nothing, so far as the public can see, to deserve this treatment at the hands of his party associates. He has merely exercised his right to speak his mind freely and openly on the question of the navy. That he has done so honestly there is no reason to doubt. As a matter of fact, although the views which he has expressed are repugnant to the great majority of Canadians who believe that Canada should adequately assist in the naval defences of the Empire, the

course which he has pursued is eminently more dignified and manly than that of Mr. Borden himself, who has performed a complete somersault on the question.

Nor is the further suggestion put forward prominently in Opposition circles that the "old Tupper crowd" are responsible for the party's defeats and discomfiture likely to conduce to harmony. The men who fought with Sir Charles Tupper represent the fighting force of the party and they are not likely to allow themselves to be snuffed out by the "new leaders" some of whom are but comparatively recent converts to Toryism.

What the out-come of all this heart-searching and bickering will be, no man can foretell. Even "the only leader in sight," with all his vaunted "reserve force" seems to be already making preparations to beat a retreat. His organs announced that Mr. Foster was to be sent to the rear and, forthwith, Mr. Borden speaks up and says that the whole story is a "complete falsehood." Only one thing seems to be certain and that is that the Conservative Party is honeycombed with dissension and that revolt is rampant. There is no longer room for even pretence of denial. The Conservative Toronto World edited by Mr. W. F. Maclean, M. P. (who a year or so ago was being covered with laurel by the local Tory organ) says:

"It has come out at last by general admission that there is dissension in the ranks of the Conservative Opposition at Ottawa, and there is dissension throughout the country at the lack of progress that has been made. Everybody now admits what The World was denounced for stating to be the fact, viz., that INSURGENCY AND DISSATISFACTION ARE RAMPANT. In our news columns of yesterday we printed an editorial from The Ottawa Citizen which clearly admits that this was true, and it called for general house-cleaning and re-organization. An editorial from The Montreal Gazette in substance admitted that dissatisfaction exists, but urges the claims and merits of Mr. Borden to continue as leader. It says he is the best man. As to the dissension that exists at Ottawa among members, or, to use the latter phrase, as to the insurgency, there is ample evidence, notwithstanding the fact that there has been a special amount of abuse heaped upon those who simply point out the facts and who seek to bring about improvement."

And there you are.—*Chronicle.*

Laymen's Missionary Campaign.

Series of Meetings in Maritime Provinces Covering Fourteen Cities.

The ocean to ocean campaign of the Laymen's Missionary Movement is to be concluded with a series of Men's Missionary Conventions in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, reaching fourteen important cities in seventeen days.

The Western Provinces were visited by a delegation of business men and secretaries last October and November, beginning at Winnipeg, October 8th, and reaching to Victoria.

The points to be reached in the East are as follows:

April 3, 4, 5, St. John; 5 and 6, Moncton; 6 and 7, Fredericton and Campbellton; 7 and 8, Woodstock; 10 and 11, Halifax; 12 and 13, Truro and Kentville; 14 and 15, Sydney Mines and Charlottetown; 17, Glace Bay and Stellarton; 18 and 19, Sydney; 20 and 21, Amherst.
