As Canada Sees It

Mr. Ure, the Lord Advocate of Scotland, who is one of the most aggressive champions of the Free Trade cause in the Old Country, in representing the farmers of the West as having repudiated the Preferential Trade policy, may be oversteering the case, yet the tariff representations which are being made to Sir Wilfrid Laurier during his present tour should have a profound significance for the party which is endeavoring to promote the policy of protection by appeals to Imperial sentiment.

It is a highly significant fact that throughout the whole of the Prime Minister's tour, not a single representation has been made to him in favor of the policy of Imperial Preference, as it is put forward by the Tariff Reformers. Sir Wilfrid has received delegation after delegation of the Grain Growers' Association, who represent the class which, above all others, might be expected to be interested in the policy of preference on wheat, and yet in no case have the grain growers manifested the slightest concern with regard to it.

It may not be quite correct to say, as Mr. Ure has declared in his recent speech, that the Canadian farmers have repudiated the policy of Imperial Preference, but certainly they have shown and are showing that they are, at least, indifferent to it. They have presented requests for a material reduction in the tariff. They want low duties on agricultural implements and on clothing. They want reciprocity with the United States. They want British woollens and cottons in return for their wheat, scorning the proposed preference which would tax the food of the British workman and make harder the lot of the great masses of the Mother Country.

They stand solidly for the maintenance of the British Preference, which was given to the Old Country by the Laurier Government, as a free gift, and which was not offered in the nature of bartering and bargaining, and they stand for this Preference because it makes for a free exchange of goods with the Mother Country, and because it relieves the tariff burden of the Canadian people.

As to the contention which has been put forward by Mr. Balfour and his party, that Canada is clamoring for the adoption of an Imperial Preferential Trade policy, the Grain Growers of the West, we think, have given a very conclusive and decisive answer. But, quite apart from this, it is a libel upon the Canadian people to assert that the failure of the Old Country to adopt a policy which must and can only mean the taxing of its food supply and the enhancement of the cost of living of its working population, will tend toward the disintegration and disavowal of the Empire. Mr. Asquith punctured the fallacy put forward by the Tariff Reformers with regard to Colonial Preference, when he declared that when it comes to the practical working out of a policy of Preference, it remains as nebulous and as full of inconsistencies and absurdities as it was seven years ago, when it was introduced by Mr. Chamberlain. "The British Government," he said, "will not consent to the imposition of a tax on either food or raw material which would enhance their cost, and thereby handicap Great Britain's productive efficiency." In his opinion, the world-wide British Empire could not be kept together or made

what it is today by industrial competition. The bonds of Empire are "more of a moral, than a material, tie, and they are not easily broken."

Colonel Selley, the Under Secretary of State for the Colonies, pressed the point even more trenchantly, when he stated that, instead of signs of disavowal, the bonds between Canada and the Mother Country were constantly growing stronger. This is a statement of absolute fact, and it is a fact with which the question of Imperial Preference has had nothing whatsoever to do.

The people of Canada are not asking the people of the Mother Country to tax foreign wheat in order to develop Canadian wheatfields. The farmers of the Dominion are quite ready to take their chances in the free market of Great Britain, with any and all competitors, and we venture to say that they would value far more the lowering of the tariff upon British imports than any kind of preference which the British Government could offer them. At the same time the attitude of Canada is, and must be, that the question of Tariff Reform in the Old Country is a question for the people of Great Britain themselves to decide; just as the question of the tariff in Canada is purely a question for the Canadian people.

If the policy of Tariff Reform cannot be made palatable to the British people upon its merits, we imagine that little headway will be made by appealing to Imperial sentiment in connection with the revival of the preferential propaganda. The Westminster Gazette, puts the case in a nutshell, when it says: "Our Tariff Reformers will do well to stick to the protective side of Tariff Reform and not try to revive the Colonial aspect. We quite appreciate their motives in trying to do the latter, because it is a much more glorious thing to think you are saving the Empire than to be engaged in a propaganda which merely collects votes by affirmative replies to any and every industry that 'cries aloud.'"

If the Tariff Reformers are willing to read the signs of the times, in so far as Canada is concerned, they will profit by the very significant attitude of the farmers of Western Canada toward a protective tariff.—Chronicle.

"In a few days 'The Call for Help' from the farmers of Western Canada will re-echo throughout the Maritime Provinces. Thousands upon thousands of helpers will be necessary to assist in harvesting the great crops in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. The demand for laborers is greater this year than ever before. The West cannot provide, and the East is again called upon to render assistance that is absolutely necessary to save the enormous crops. The Canadian Pacific Railway is again called upon to name excursion rates, and operate special trains for the transportation of farm laborers going from the Maritime Provinces. It is expected they will be required early in August. The exact date has not yet been decided upon, but will be announced within the next few days. Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years from date of homestead entry (including the required six months' residence, patient) and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has relinquished his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.
