BIG DAY AT CONNELL PARK

Picnic Will Net About Eight Hundred Dollars for the Fund

With weather conditions which could not be surpassed and a large crowd present with the intention of enjoying themselves the picnic at Connell Park, Wednesday afternoon, was a pronounced success. Nearly 2000 people were present, all the sports were liberally patronized and everybody went to their homes in the evening delighted with the Park and the success of the afternoon. The baseball games between the Has Beens and Never Wassers were keenly contested and afforded much amusement for the crowd. Sedate men of business became boys again and those who were not on the teams racing after the ball and making holes in the air, were equally as boyish in their enthusiastic support of the different players.

The different sports and games were well patronized, and the proceeds after all expenses are paid will net about \$800.00 which with the County and town funds and that open in the stores of Messrs Mair and Gibson will mean a total of about \$2300, which is a good showing for the county and does not include the contributions of the outside towns and the different churches.

Much credit is due Chief Kelly, W. A. Gibson and J. L. Ross for the success of the enterprise. They were untiring in their efforts to make the picnic a success in every way.

A frail electric light pole nearly cost George Sutton of the Woodstock Electric Light and Power Company his life last Saturday afternoon. Mr Sutton was repairing the line on a pole on the middle pier of the Meduxnekeag bridge when suddenly the pole broke without warning and Mr Sutton was hurled through the air. Fortunately he was cast in the direction of the bridge, the pole going in the opposite direction and falling into the stream. Mr Sutton fell across the railing of the bridge where he lay stunned. He was carried on a litter into E W Mair's drug store and Drs P T Kierstead and T M Sprague summoned. Later he was taken home. It was found that his injuries were confined to some bad body bruises and a severe shaking up.

The property on the east side of Main Street, south of the Meduxnekeag bridge, and known as the Lindsay property changed hands in an auction sale last week. The land and building was purchased by Mrs R J Lindsay, the price being, it is said, \$500.

BASE BALL NEWS

Woodstock Stands Off Waterville and Trims Mars Hill Twice

Any doubts that may have existed as to whether Woodstock has a fast ball team were dispelled in the series of two games played with the Waterville, Maine team last week. The first game was played in Houlton on Thursday, before a large crowd, and resulted in a victory for Waterville by the score 12 to 4. The second game was played on Friday at Connell Park before the largest crowd that ever witnessed a game in this town. Woodstock shut out Waterville 5 to 0.

Never was the fortunes of baseball better illustrated than in these two games. At Houlton, the Woodstock team had an off day and could field nothing while they batted poorly. Peasley pitched and was found for 12 safe hits, four of them being triples and two doubles. In addition to that he passed two men and struck two.

As if that were not enough our team piled up eight errors, four being charged to Hughes on second, three to McRae on first and one to Pickel in center field. Pickel's error allowed the first two men to score on what should have been an easy third out and paved the way for Waterville's four runs in their first inning.

Harry Moore, who pitched for Millinocket in the Northern Maine league last season, and who now draws down a fat salary from the Fairfield team pitched for Waterville. While he gave seven hits he kept them fairly well scattered. McRae got three, Neptune got a double, Hughes had two singles and Iott one.

It would seem that our boys would have been discouraged at the showing they made before the number of excursionists from Woodstock and points along the B & A. Local followers sadly shook their heads and hoped that the second trouncing would be as mild as possible.

It was with that feeling that the large crowd assembled at Connell Park for the "slaughter." A pleasant surprise was in store, however, for Waterville was made the victim. And a beautiful game it was, too. There were none but a very few excusable errors. The plays were fast and clean. It was the finest exhibition of baseball ever seen in Woodstock and possibly never excelled in the provinces.

Joe Neptune pitched a beautiful game. He was steady at all times, and fielded his position perfectly. Chapdelaine, of St. Stephen was behind the bat and caught a fine game. He held Neptune well, was very active on bunts and threw well to bases. "Dick" Malloy played a good game at third, and led the team in hitting with three hits. Eddie Ramsay played short and up to the time he was hurt on second through colliding with Cobb a Waterville base-runner, played a good game. "Jimmie" Michaud gathered in some nice flies in center, as did Milmore in left. Hughes and Iott played a good game.

Dwinal of Bates College, who pitched for Caribou in the Northern Maine League last year, twirled for Waterville. He is a south-paw with good curves and fair speed. Woodstock had their batting tops on, however, and touched him up for 10 hits, Milmore, Ramsay and Hughes getting doubles, while every man on the team except Pickel obtained a single.

For Waterville, Rawson, coach for the Colby College team and a member of the Fairfield team, excelled in hitting, getting three singles. Cobb, third-baseman for the U of M got two hits, which were all that Neptune allowed. Dwinal had six strike-outs as against Neptune's three.

So excited was the crowd after Woodstock by sharp fielding shut out Waterville in the first inning that at the close of the game men swarmed on the diamond and raised Neptune to their shoulders and

carried him. A rain of silver was showered upon him while he was told that the town was his for the asking. Seldom has such a demonstration been accorded a ball player in this section.
