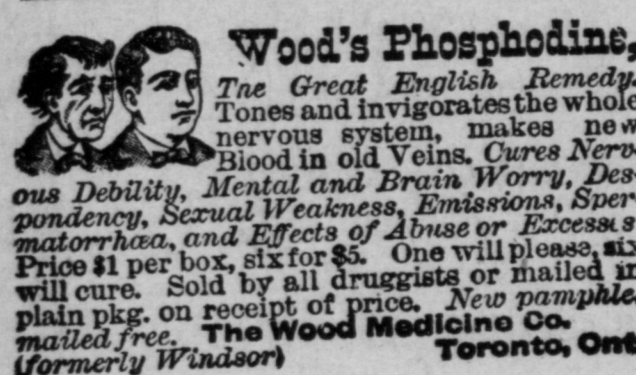

THE MILLVILLE SPUR.

Announcement is made in one of the Hazen newspapers that construction is about to be begun on the Southampton Railway. Mr. John E. Stewart of Andover, of Tobique dam fame, is quoted as the authority for this statement, and it is said that the first work of building the line will be commenced next week.

The public has very little information about Mr. Hazen's railroad activities in the counties of York and Carleton, but very recently there has been heard a well defined rumor that the local government some time ago passed an order in council guaranteeing, or promising to guarantee, the bonds for the construction of the Millville spur, in which Mr. Pinder, the "King of the Neckawick," is deeply interested because of his business activities at the place where the road would terminate. The Millville spur, of course, would be a C. P. R. branch, and while it would be of value to a few people locally, the public has no facts to show that there has been any proper survey such as would justify the government in authorizing the work and undertaking to finance it.

If any such order in council has been passed the people of New Brunswick should have known about it long before this, and if they find that it was passed they will surely be disposed to think that Mr. Hazen and his colleagues have been usurping the powers of the New Brunswick Legislature, at the command of Mr. Pinder. Mr. Pinder has a habit of kicking over the traces occasionally, and if reports in connection with the proposed railroad are true, he has kicked to good purpose so far as his personal interests are concerned, though politically it would seem clear enough that he has placed Mr. Hazen in a difficulty of no little magnitude.—Telegraph.

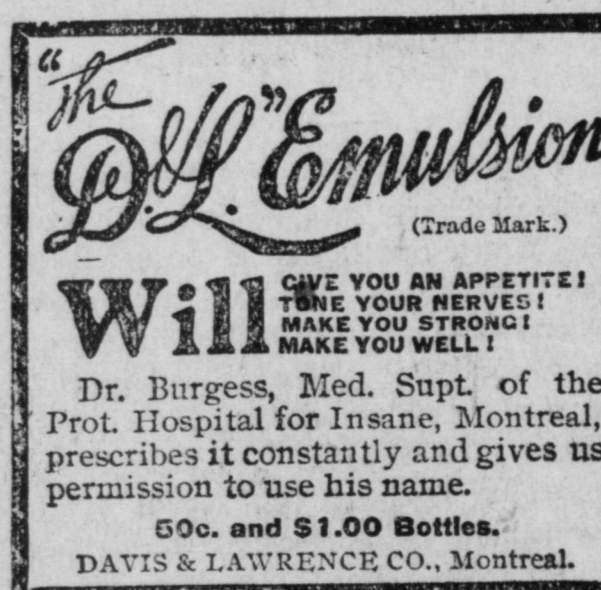

GRAND ART GALLERY AT ST JOHN FAIR.

Vigorous Committee Co-operating with Art Clubs All Over.

On a few isolated occasions the people of St. John and New Brunswick generally have been favored with quite extensive displays of art works, and numerous valuable canvases have been brought to these parts. During the ten days of Dominion Exhibition—September 5th to 15th—the St. John Art Club, supported by the Exhibition Executive, will hold an Art Loan Show of unusual excellence. This gallery, to be situated in a large portion of the new building adjoining the main structure, and before the final arrangements were made a guarantee of over fifty magnificent paintings was secured from the Art Union of London, as well as assurances from connoisseurs in the large Canadian centres that over one hundred rare works would be forthcoming in addition. The Maritime Provinces will contribute many more pictures, plastic art works, bronzes, rare art fabric, etc., as well as an exclusive collection of ceramics. A generous money allotment has been made to fit out the art gallery under the direction of an expert gallery superintendent, and those who enjoy graphic and applied art works will be assured of some rare delight at the St. John Fair. Among those who will lend some of their choicest treasures will be Sir William Van Horne, of Montreal.

NEW PACIFIC MAIL STEAMERS.

Montreal, Aug 10—It is stated in Victoria, B. C., that the Pacific Mail Company are planning the construction of two new mammoth liners for their trade on the Pacific, between Honolulu and San Francisco. They are to cost, if reports may be believed, in the neighborhood of \$3,000,000 each, and will be fitted up in a most luxurious style for the comfort of 600 saloon passengers which they are able to accommodate. Mr. Scherwin, the manager of the line, said recently that the new boats will be 650 feet long and 70 feet beam and will draw 33½ feet of water. Their displacement will be 38,000 tons and they will each accommodate 1,500 passengers. In addition to these two boats, the Weir Line are also building two new liners with modern passenger accommodation for saloon passengers. These vessels, which are to be named the Oteric and Luceric, will be of 11,000 tons each and will, it is expected, place the line in the front rank of the contenders for the passenger traffic on the Pacific, instead of, as the line have been content to do up to the present, confining themselves merely to freight and stevedore passenger traffic. It is also said to be generally understood in Victoria that the C. P. R. have formulated extensive plans for the improvement of their Pacific line next year.

GIANT CRUISER FOR BRITAIN

The Lion to Make Thirty Knots and Fire Broadside More Destructive Than Any Rival—Armor is Impregnable.

London Aug 8—The latest addition to the British navy, the cruiser Lion, successfully launched at Devonport on Saturday evening, is in displacement, speed, gun power, armor protection, torpedo equipment and matters of internal equipment, considerably superior to anything projected by foreign powers. The Lion really combines the speed of a scout ship with the offensive and defensive qualities of a Dreadnought battleship, a two fold characteristic which is non-existent in any other navy in the world.

Although the Lion's complement of single calibre guns is fewer than the Dreadnought battle ships, it is able to deliver a more powerful broadside. This is due to the fact that the cruiser is the first vessel to carry a number of 13.5 guns, eight of which are mounted in pairs on the central line ship. The guns are so arranged that it is possible to train the weapons ahead, astern or abeam. They can send a projectile weighing 1,200 pounds a distance of twenty miles. The armor of the Lion can resist a shell fired two miles away with a force equal to that required to lift 40,000 tons weight twelve inches from the ground. The armor extends from the upper deck to six feet below the water line.

The engines of the ship are equal to 70,000-horse power. The speed is thirty knots. The length is 700 feet; beam, 88½; displacement, 26,000 tons. The Admiralty has taken extraordinary precautions to preserve secrecy regarding the details of the Lion during her construction and she was known as the mystery ship of the navy. Her cost is more than £2,000,000 (\$10,000,000).
