WHEELS STOPPED ON LOCAL TRAINS AT FUNERAL HOUR

Even United States Company Observed Tokens of Respect on Trains in Canadian Territory.

Although most people had read of the orders issued on the railways for the stopping of all trains for three minutes at eight o'clock this morning -the hour corresponding to the beginning of the funeral service for King Edward in England, the actual carrying out of the order broke in as a dramatic surprise for most travell-

Suburban residents coming into the city thought, in many instances, that there was some obstruction on the line, when they found their trains brought to a sudden standstill in unexpected places, but of course the significance of the occasion was quickly appreciated.
