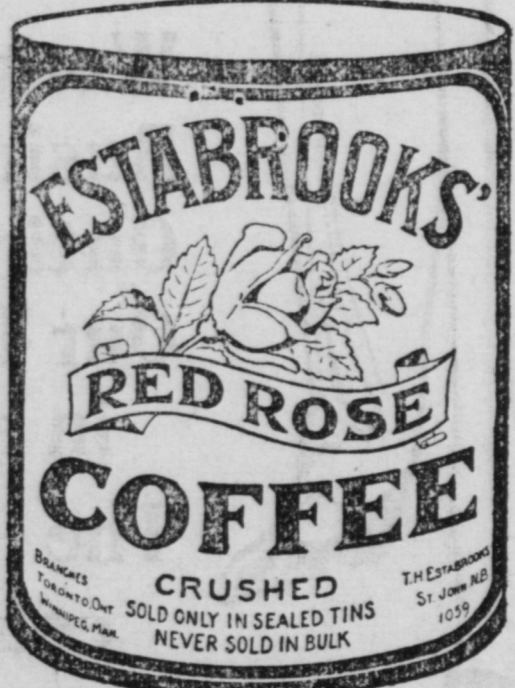


## Crushed Coffee— what is it?

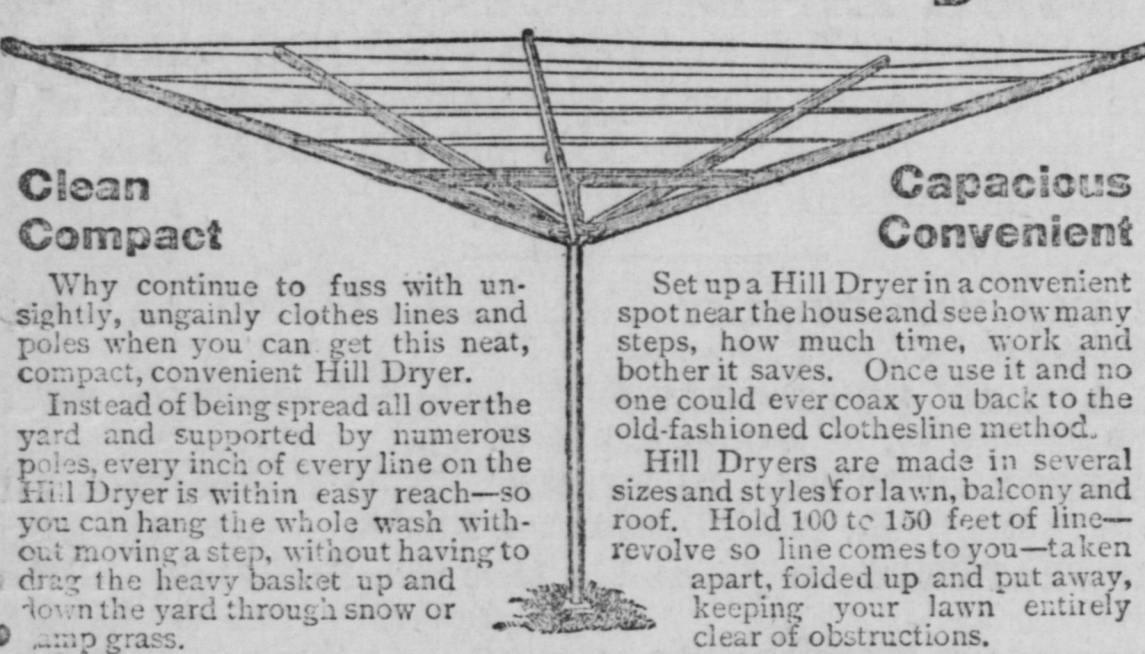

### King George's Tact.

That King George V. has inherited a share of the tact and kindness of his father, King Edward VII., was clearly shown when as Duke of Cornwall and York he toured Canada some years ago. During the Royal visit to Ottawa one of the festivities arranged by the then Governor-General and Countess of Minto was a garden party held at Rideau Hall. The afternoon on which the party was held was clear and somewhat chilly, as the season was late in September and an autumn breeze was much in evidence.

When the guests had collected in the grounds the Duke came out of the house with Lady Minto, the present Queen being escorted by Lord Minto. Accompanied by his hostess King George—then Duke of Cornwall and York and not yet even Prince of Wales—moved about the lawns and garden, meeting the guests and exchanging a few words with those presented to him. As they were returning to the house, Lady Minto stopped with her companion where a picturesque figure stood alone at the edge of one of the lawns, and presented an elderly man who instantly doffed his hat and stood bareheaded while the wind played with his decidedly sparse locks, ruffling them considerably.

"Put on your hat," said the Duke, as soon as he had acknowledged the other's salutation.

"Indeed I will not, sir," was the reply.

"Put on your hat," again said the Duke.

"I know better, sir, than to wear my hat in the presence of my future King," returned the patriotic old Canadian.

The Duke laughed, and then said, "Well, if you don't, I won't stay and talk to you."

In an instant the old gentleman replaced his hat on his head, and for two or three minutes the trio continued in conversation before the Duke and Lady Minto continued their progress towards the house.

Another story which illustrates the kindness and lack of "side" which have always endeared the present King to all those with whom he has come in contact was told me by an officer who had it from one of the persons concerned in the matter. This occurrence took place a good many years ago when King George was still actively connected with the Navy. For some reason or other, just what I have forgotten, some young officers were sent with a message to the man-of-war to which King George then belonged. They were busy coaling on the big cruiser, and the messengers were interviewed by another young officer who was anything but spick and span in appearance and whose face was not guiltless of coal dust. As he was about to clamber back to his boat one of the messengers ventured a remark about "Prince George" being aboard and asked the jolly young man, with whom he had been talking how the rest of the officers liked him, adding boyishly, "Well, I just wish I could see him," to which the young man he talking to replied, "Well, I am he."

There can be no doubt as to King George possessing a great sense of humor, that fact being proved by the numerous tales once current concerning his childish escapades when as a very small boy he used to visit his grandmother, the late Queen Victoria. ### Stories of the Royal Children.

London, May 20.—The characters and individuality of the Royal children have suddenly become of great public importance, writes Sarah A. Tooley in The Chronicle. Two of them will in due course take new titles. The ever-popular Prince Edward will become at his father's pleasure Prince of Wales, and his sister Princess Mary the Princess Royal. The remaining four boys, Prince Albert, Prince Henry, Prince George, and Prince John, will, all being well, figure in the distant future as Royal dukes.

The education and upbringing of the Royal children has been on eminently modern lines. At York Cottage, Sandringham, they have passed much of their time in healthy outdoor exercise, and have been very gradually initiated into book learning. They have been trained to use their eyes and their hands, and to acquire knowledge by observation. At the Technical Schools, Sandringham, they practice needlework and wood carving. The young Princess can complete with their sister in cross-stitch and wool crochet, and each year they send some of their handiwork to the Needlework Guild, of which their mother is president.

At Sandringham, too, they have been brought up in friendly association with the village boys, and practise at the gymnasium, which King Edward provided a few years ago for the youth of the district. At Christmas they help to entertain the school children, and join in their merry-making.

A pleasurable part of the education of the Royal children is visiting the sights of London under the guidance of their tutor, Mr. Hansell and Mr. Hus. They know their Tower and their Zoological Gardens thoroughly, and have been to the principal museums.

### PRINCES AS CRICKETERS.

At Frogmore House, Windsor in Park, the Royal children have delightful recreations. There is a new cricket ground, which grandpa caused to be made for them, where the young Princes captain teams of boys from Eaton College and St. George's, and where Princess Mary also rises to try her skill at the game. During diabolical crabs the Royal children played with keenest zest, and the young French boy, Marcel Meunier, gave a display of his skill for them at Marlborough House. From Frogmore, too, they go on delightful picnics to Virginia Water, where the brig "King Edward VII." lies moored on the lake.

This smart little craft was provided by "grandpa," and on it Prince Edward and Prince Albert took their first lessons in seamanship before they went to Osborne College, and now it serves as a training craft for the younger Princes. It is at Frogmore also that the Royal children practise riding and driving, under the tuition of Mr. Stratton, who has been groom to their father for many years. They have two pairs of driving ponies, one dark and the other the beautiful cream-colored ponies given to them by Mr. George Sanger.

The Windsor home farm and dairy close to Frogmore House, afford the children endless diversion, and have somewhat eclipsed their old love, the Sandringham Dairy. In the hay-making season they have glorious times in Windsor Great Park.

All the children have cameras, and receive instruction from Mr. Hua one of their tutors and a skilled photographer. They vie with each other in filling photographic albums with snapshots, and may possibly have some sympathy with the pressmen who are not permitted to snapshot them. They have also their postcard albums, which contain quite a wonderful collection of views sent by their parents from the Colonies and India, and many cards signed "From Grandpa." Those from Biarritz will have a sad significance, now.

Prince Edward, who is known in the family circle as "David," played the role of elder brother, even in his earliest years. The newcomers were "the children," for whom his protecting and admonitory care were quite necessary. There were times, however, when the "new boy," as Prince Albert was called, showed signs of rebellion against the nursery sway of his elder brother,

and one day their mother was deeply shocked to find them disputing the possession of the rocking-horse with blows. But their father said, "Let them have it out; they will be better friends afterwards."

It was the wish of King Edward that his grandsons should receive a naval education; he had seen its value in the case of his own sons, and always regretted that he had not had a similar training in his youth. Accordingly, Prince Edward entered the Royal Naval College, Osborne, and conformed in all respects to the routine life of a cadet. Prince Albert followed a year later. They are continuing their studies at the Naval College at Dartmouth.

### PRINCE EDWARD'S CHARM.

Prince Edward, who now stands so near the throne, is a great favorite with everybody. He has great charm and dignity, and a happy knack of doing just the right thing. Though his position will preclude him from following the navy as a profession, he is a most enthusiastic sailor, and has a great liking for mechanics. He is musical with a good tenor voice and has acquitted himself well at college entertainments. He joined the choir shortly after going to Osborne. The time is now approaching when he will start on an educational cruise as his father did in his youth.

Princess Mary the only daughter, and known from her birth in 1897 as the "Jubilee baby," is a fine, bonny girl, with fair hair and blue eyes, a high spirit and a desire to emulate her brother in most things. She loves her pony and dogs, and likes to be out of doors as much as possible. Shopping expeditions with her governess are also a source of great pleasure. She has a savings bank account at a West end post office, and transacts the business herself. She is quick and bright at her studies, but not particularly fond of books. The young Princess has already begun her domestic training, and has taken cooking lessons. The chief event of her life, so far, was when she accompanied her parents to the Court of Norway. She was somewhat puzzled to know how "Aunt Maud" had become a Queen. Since her elder brothers left home for college, Princess Mary has found her chief companion in Prince Henry. They are very much attached to each other.

Prince Henry is an extremely interesting boy, and gives evidence of eaving musical ability. It is the aim of our new King and Queen to train their six children so that in future years they may be an honor to the nation and a power for good in the world.
