### INCREASE IN COST OF LIVING CAUSES ALARM IN ENGLAND.

Higher Prices for Staple Products the Rule in Great Britain as Well as in America.

An English financial newspaper publishes the following statement regarding cost of living in that country, from a correspondent for whom it vouches as an expert.

"Every family here knows that prices have gone up anywhere from 15 to 25 per cent. A well-known Bradford citizen said to me a few days ago: 'Everything is frightfully dear, and yet wages are practically no higher. It takes to-day fully 25s to purchase what a sovereign would have brought three or four years ago, very commoditely, without exception, being sensibly dearer.' This is rather a serious matter, for it means that it is taking more money to supply bodily needs and reducing the spending power of the individual on dress.

"The British working man's wife is very persistent in her complaints regarding the cost of flour, for instead of being able to buy good, first-class flour at about 14d per stone, as was the case a few years ago, she has to pay 1s 8d as a standard price. When I was a lad a ton of good house coal could be bought at 14s, whereas to-day the same sort of coal costs 22s. Every other article of consumption has advanced in about the same proportion, consequently the heads of families are groaning under the extra cost of living. Many a man has said during the last six months that he is having to year his overcoat at another winter because of his inability to buy a new one through the claims of other departments of his household."

WILL SEAT NEARLY 2,000 PEOPLE.

Modern New Grand Stand at Dominion Exhibition, St John N B.

In deciding upon a new and more commodious Grand Stand, the Executive Committee of the Dominion Exhibition, to be held in St John, N B, September 5th to 15th, have realized that outdoor attractions lose much of their effectiveness if the sight-seeing crowd is not provided with proper accommodations. This new Grand Stand will be situated almost directly opposite the old structure, which has been removed by the military authorities to make room for a new armory. It will be 208 feet long by 40 feet deep, with comfortable seats for 1,750 people. The plans call for the best of sight-seeing facilities, and the rows of seats are so carefully graded that no difficulty will be experienced by any occupant in seeing all that is going on in the fire-works, open-air entertainment and stock-exhibiting departments. There will be a 10-foot promenade in front of the Grand Stand and a covered bazaar promenade underneath in the rear, as part of the Pike. The aisles will be large and amply wide, making access and egress easy. From this monster point of vantage some of the finest programmes of thrilling feats, pyrotechnics, etc., will be seen.

NEW BUILDINGS FOR BIG FAIR.

Dominion Exhibition at St John Necessitates More Structure.

Arrangements for special features of the Dominion Exhibition, to be held at St John, N B, September 5th to 15th, are progressing most successfully. Surveys have already been made for the new buildings, the chief of which will be the Horticultural structure. This will be 60 by 150 feet in size, 3 stories high, and containing upwards of 20,000 square feet of floor-space. It will adjoin the large southerly wing of the Main Industrial building, and will be erected in an easterly direction towards Courtenay Bay. In this new building the Agricultural, Horticultural, Dairy, Educational and Women's Work departments will be located, thus relieving the main structure of much pressure for space and making room thereby for scores of western exhibitors, whose applications for space are already in hand. The activity of the Board of Trade members in securing local Provincial and Maritime Provincial exhibits to offset the competition of western concerns makes it look as if there will hardly be enough space to accommodate all who desire to take part in the big show. However, the Exhibition Management, by urging prospective exhibitors to make early application, are enabled each day to better gauge the ultimate result.
