PAY YOUR DEBTS.

At 9 o'clock mass at the Cathedral yesterday, Rev. Dr. Foley preached a most practical sermon on the above subject: "Pay Your Debts." Dr. Foley pointed out the necessity of giving every man his due, and incidentally the Church's attitude in respect to this matter. The person who contracted a debt and refused to pay it, he likened unto a thief. There were some people, he said, who contracted debts and who were morally certain they could not pay them. There were others, who, to be as good as their neighbor, contracted debt for clothing, furniture, etc., and who made no efforts to pay these debts. This was a sin against God and against His

Church. In some cases people have said: "Oh, there was no effort made to collect the amount; I was not notified, etc." There is no obligation on the part of the merchant to notify you; the debt is yours and you have the right to pay it. In the eyes of the law debts may become outlawed; but in the eyes of the Catholic Church a debt is a debt until it is paid, even though it were contracted fifty years before. There is no statute of limitations in the Catholic church, and every member of it who contracts a debt must pay it or make an effort to pay it. Making an effort to pay it means by economizing and doing without things which you were in the habit of enjoying; by doing without amusements or a young else so that you can pay the debt, or at

Coun Phillips—I don't think you had better leave it to the building Committee. I am opposed to holding the hustings in this house. It is a mistake to say we are closing this house to the public, it is only to protect the property of the public.

Coun Estey—I think the building committee are in the hands of this council. I would not be in favor of having the hustings in this house.

Coun King—All we have to do is to forbid the candidates making the speeches here. If you have the speeches, no one can tell me damage will not be done to the furniture. Leave the doors open, but do not allow any speeches and there will be no damage done. Of course the official proceedings will be held here. It is no use to attempt to deny that the people get pretty excited at election times, excited over some nonsense that they have been hearing about for months. (Laughter.)

Coun Perry—I think the people will be very much against having this building looked against them. They built this Court House and we are taking their rights away from them.

Coun Shaw—Coun Brown does not mean that we are going to lock these doors against the ratepayers, we all know the official proceedings must be in the Court House, but the public meeting is another matter, not in any way connected with the official proceedings, and every one knows what those meetings are like. The public is excited, and the people climb over the furniture. The rabble of the county is here and they think little of the furniture at that time. Most heartily am I in favor of the resolution.

Coun Melville—The building Committee can handle this question. If there is a rough crowd, I would show them out. I do not look at the elections of this county as rabble. We get a joint debate at the hustings and that is the only time we do. If there is any row we have the sheriff and the other officers of the law. Suppose \$25 worth of damage is done. The county can pay for it. It has always been the custom to have the hustings in the Court House, and I believe in keeping up the custom.

Coun Smith—If the council leave it with the Building Committee, there is a majority against having the hustings in the Court House. Coun Lamont moved that this matter be left in the hands of the Building Committee, seconded by Coun Brittain.

Coun Brown—Coun Melville is playing to the galleries. He is standing for the poor, down-trodden farmer. He wants to be contrary, that is all. As a matter of fact he does not want this building used as a hustings.

Coun Kinney—All the sheriffs in Carleton County could not handle a crowd at election times. I agree with Coun Brown that Coun Melville is simply contrary, and a little arbitrary. He does not want the hustings here. When we pass this motion we are protecting the people's property.

Coun Tompkins—As long as I can remember, the hustings have been held in the Court House. I don't think we have a right to say we will shut this Court House up.

Coun Scott—I don't think there is going to be any election very soon and we may have a way of testing the opinion of the people. I think the matter should be left in the hands of the building committee.

The amendment was then put. The following voting aye: Couns Melville, Tompkins, Morgan, Brittain, Perry, Hemphill, Lamont, Alex Bell, John Hay, Williams, Scott.—11. Balance of Council voting nay. Amendment declared lost. The original motion, moved by Coun Brown, was then passed by the same vote reversed.

Council then adjourned.

SOME CONTRASTS IN MILK YIELDS.

Some records are always stimulating. Some of the records from members of the cow testing associations for May are indicative of good cows well kept and well fed, in a word, decidedly profitable cows. For instance, one dairyman in western Ontario owning a herd of 62 cows has the inspiring record of 1127 lbs of milk per cow during the month. Again, in six associations in Peterborough and Oxford counties the average yield of 380 cows was 1055 lbs of milk and 34.3 lbs fat.

The reverse of the pictures is not so rosy, indicating the need of more and better cows. Several associations have an average of under 700 lbs of milk and 21.8 lbs fat in May. (Think of the difference the average yield noted above is seventy per cent better.)

As an instance of what is being done by the selected animal the record of one of the most famous cows to-day forms a wonderful contrast. She is credited with 120 lbs fat in thirty days. This cow, it is said, was picked up from a neighbor who did not keep records and therefore was unaware of her phenomenal value. Who will be the next man to discover another such diamond in the rough? Individual cow records alone can show where such jewels exist.

ENGLISH SETTLER PRAISES PROVINCE.

Thomas Milne, Now in Woodstock, Advises Old Country Friends That New Brunswick is Better Than West.

A B Wilmot, superintendent of immigration, has received a communication from Mr Scammel, organizer of the Ex-Servicemen's Immigration Society of England, inclosing a type-written copy of a letter he has received from one of the veterans who located in New Brunswick, last year. Thomas O Milne, the veteran in question, who is located at Woodstock, writes enthusiastically of his experience in this province, and declares that the longer he lives here the more favorably impressed he is with its possibilities, and the advantages it offers the men from the Old Country.

"No doubt," he continues, "New Brunswick will do well for itself in the step it has taken on behalf of ex-servicemen, and I may say that all who come out will be given a hearty welcome, and they will get employment immediately they land. It seems a pity that so many people who are desirous of settling in Canada should rush out west, while in this province we have land second to none for agriculture, and it is cheap, and settlers have not the hardships to contend with that they have in the west."

"This country has no use for idlers" but anyone who comes out here prepared to work will be amply remunerated and have a good time; moreover he can save money, and he is treated by the farmer as one of the family and no distinction whatever, is made.
