THE PAST SEASON.

The season on potato shipments from Aroostook county is practically at a close, and while there are a few cars going over the lines of the Bangor & Aroostook each week for different points west, the shipments are light, and will soon be at an end. Last year the last car came down over the line with potatoes on June 22nd, which shows this season to be about three weeks later than last.

Notwithstanding the lateness in closing the season fewer potatoes have been shipped out of Aroostook county, via the Bangor and Aroostook, than last year, by some over 2,000,000 bushels. Aroostook county had last fall, what was probably as large a crop as was ever raised in that county, but the same held true of all other potato growing sections of the country, consequently the demand was lighter than usual, and the prices were not up to the usual mark. As a shipping season the past year has been freaky. Shipments started in with a rush early in the fall along in October, and for several weeks were the customary heavy shipments of the early season. Then there was a sudden dropping off, and the farmers apparently held their crop for a better price, which they anticipated would reach them about the first of the new year. January came, but without the anticipated raise in price, and the farmers began to realize that they must get rid of their potatoes at the prices offered if they wish to sell at all. Shipments started up again, and held heavy all through the winter until along in spring, a record being set for the month of April, which was the largest for that month in years.

The low price of potatoes and the fact that the farmers were anxious to get rid of them worked its benefit on the starch factories, and two of them ground potatoes all winter, something that has not been done in Aroostook county before.

The total shipments of potatoes down over the line of the Bangor & Aroostook this season up to July 9 were 9,360,070 bushels.

The crop this year in a general way looks well. The scare that was started earlier in the season that all the seed was rotting in the ground was not so serious as was at first believed, although in some cases fields had to be replanted, and it looks as though the crop will be up to its usual mark this year. There is the natural increase in the acreage this year, if not a little more. The opening up of the Washburn cut-off, through the towns of Washburn, Perham and Mapleton has opened a section that is expected to boom with potato raising. The farmers there will be able to compete with their brother potato raisers in more convenient sections of the county in taking advantage of the high prices of the early season, when they sell right out of the field, and also of any market fluctuation which means money to the farmer if he is near enough to the railroad to handle his potatoes at once.

THE CENSUS OF AGRICULTURE.

The next Census of Agriculture will be taken under date of 1st June 1911.

The area, product and value of field crops harvested in 1910 will be enumerated for fall wheat, spring wheat, barley, oats, rye, corn for husking, buckwheat, beans, peas, flax, mixed grains, hay and clover, alfalfa or lucerne, corn for forage, other forage crops, turnips, mangolds, sugar beets, other field roots, tobacco and hops; and grass seed, red clover seed and alsike clover seed will be enumerated for product and value.

Grain and other field crops for the harvest of 1911 will be taken by areas only, as none of these crops will be ripe at the taking of the census. The products of these crops will be gathered later in the year from the reports of correspondents.

Animals and animal products, also under the head of agriculture, will include the number of horses three years old and over, horses under three years, milch cows, other horned or neat cattle, sheep, swine, turkeys, geese, ducks, hens and chickens and hives of bees held or owned by each person at the date of the census on 1st June of 1911.

The number of horses, milch cows, other horned or neat cattle, sheep, swine and poultry sold in 1910, will be recorded, as well as the wool, milk, home-made butter, home-made cheese, eggs and honey [products of the year, and the quantities of milk and cream sent to factory or sold.

Pure-bred animals registered, or eligible for registration, which are owned at the time of taking the census will be enumerated for horses, cattle, sheep and swine, but their number will also be counted with all other animals.
