

The season on potato shipments from Aroostook county is practically at a close, and while there are a few cars going over the lines of the Bangor & Aroostook each week for different points west, the shipments are light, and will soon be at an end. over the line with potatoes on June 22nd, which shows this season to be about three weeks later than last.

Notwithstanding the lateness in closing the season fewer potatoes have been shipped out of Aroostook county, via the Bangor and Aroos. took, than last year, by some over 2,000,000 bushels. The low price of potatoes and the fact that the farmers were anxious to get rid of them worked its benefit on the starch factories, and two of them ground potatoes all winter, something that has not been done in Aroostock county before.

The total shipments of potatoes down over the line of the Bangor & Aroostook this season up to July 9 were 9,360,070 bushels.
