Stamps and Disease.

Dr. G. G. Melvin, Chief Health Officer, writes to Postmaster Sears, calling attention to the fact that postage stamps are frequently affixed to postage material by being moistened by the tongue, that the gummed surfaces, by reason of their adhesiveness are most apt collectors of disease germs whenever coming in contact with the latter, that counters, etc., over which stamps are sold are, by reason of very public use, liable to carry germs of contagious disease, and that the gummed stamp surfaces, when pushed by vendors over such counters, or laid upon them, are very liable to become contaminated. He therefore asked the Postmaster to lend his influence to the effect that when such stamps are dispensed by vendors, the latter pass them to the purchaser with the gummed side upwards.

It is the Postmaster's desire that the views of the Chief Health Officer should obtain in respect to the manner of the disbursement of stamps, and all vendors or licensees are requested to exercise the diligence in following the course advised, which is the course adopted by the United States authorities.

### THE CORONATION OATH.

There will be no serious disturbance over the change made in the coronation oath. The bill had the first reading in the house of commons by a majority of 383 to 42, and even if its opponents are able to muster a little greater strength after the debate on the second reading the general result will not be affected. Old animosities and prejudices are dying out. While most Protestants may still feel that there is more religious intolerance in the Roman Catholic church than in their own churches, they are not disposed to encourage that spirit by giving it undue exercise themselves. The conditions under which the coronation oath was drawn can never arise again, and it serves no real good; while it is an offence to a vast number of the king's subjects. The London Telegraph rightly says "that yesterday's proceedings in the commons can only be regarded as a happy prelude to King George's reign and an emphatic service to the moral unity of the empire." The whole of the London press approves of the change, and this fact is significant of public sentiment in general. Some persons, thoroughly sincere, entertain fears whenever anything appears to be gained by the Roman Catholic church; but it is the Protestant church that will be the gainer in this instance. It will divest itself of that which does not really strengthen its position in the empire, but which does give expression to an outgrown prejudice.

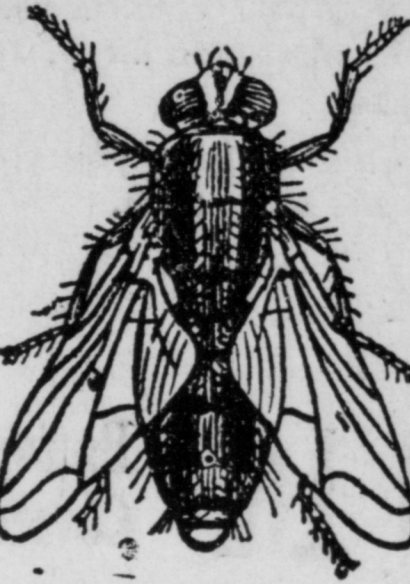
