THE CAMPBELLTON FIRE.

Sympathy is expressed on all sides for the people of Campbellton in the terrible disaster which has overtaken their beautiful town. There was no more thriving or industrious town in the Province and the fire coming as it did in the busy season of the mills and factories means much to the people. On the other hand if the fire had occurred in the late fall or winter months the loss of life from exposure might have been large for there is no town near nor any place of shelter.

The citizens will applaud the act of the council in sending at once after the news of the fire the sum of \$200. It is said "he gives twice who gives quickly" and it will mean much for those who may be in destitute circumstances to know that from all parts of the country there is a generous response in the hour of need.

WHAT DID HE MEAN?

At the trial of the Holyoke Flemming case this week there was strong evidence of the truth of the adage which refers to a certain class "falling out" and others getting "their due." The trial itself had nothing of much import for the public as it was simply a suit case in ordinary form but the evidence at one point has caused some to sit up and take notice. It is a well known fact that the plaintiff Holyoke is one of the favored ones in the Tory ranks having succeeded in defeating many other aspirants for the position of sitting Magistrate. The defendant is a brother of the Provincial Secretary. As far as the public knows this is the "first transaction Mr Holyoke has had with Mr John Flemming while he has had many with his brother J K Flemming.

The evidence to which we refer was that portion of Mr Holyoke's testimony when he said "you can't play any of your Flemming tricks on me." What did Mr Holyoke mean by Flemming trick. Certainly he did not mean that Mr John Flemming, who gives a simple life of the farmer had an assortment of tricks which he was about to produce—this could not have been the reference.

The average mind will associate Mr Holyoke's statement with his experience with the Provincial Secretary. His statement would have us believe he thought the honest farmer was trying to reproduce a trick which was drawn from the Holyoke's repertoire.

An explanation of what these tricks consist of would be interesting.

Maritime Baptist Convention to be Held in Woodstock.

The Annual Maritime Convention of the United Baptist Association will be held in Woodstock, Aug 20th to 23rd inclusive. This will be one of the largest gatherings Woodstock has ever entertained as it is estimated that the attendance will be about 400. The local church will provide homes and breakfast for the delegates providing for the other meals at their own expense. A convention such as this must be of material benefit to a community. The representative men of the denomination both lay and clerical will be present.

Horse Race at Woodstock Park

Maritime Record Broken

With a fast track and all the necessary conditions for good racing some of the best races ever seen on the Woodstock track were seen last Friday and Saturday. Owing to the new law horses from the United States are debarred from participating in the Province circuit. This, many thought, would detract considerably from the quality of the races but no better or cleaner sport has ever been had here. Everything was straight, no jobs and no framed up finishes. From the start to the finish every heat was fought and the fast time shows that the horses were being pushed for a fast mark.

On Friday the fast pacing horse Frank Patch lowered the Maritime record when he made the third heat in the 2.18 class in the remarkable time of 2.14 1/4 and many excellent judges of horses present thought he could have gone two seconds faster had he been pushed by the other horses. The local horse Thomas J followed Patch a close second in this heat and great things are now expected from him. Thomas J was practically an undeveloped colt last year but this year he is surprising even the most sanguine of our local horsemen. With good care and training he will travel very fast.

Helen Gould owned by Coles W Dugan also made a good showing. Her driver, Thomas Holmes, showing good judgment and skill in handling her.

The crowd Saturday was larger than that by the day proceeding and the racing was as good if not better than the day before. In the 2.30 trot it took four heats to decide and Walter H, a grey gelding, took first money by winning first place in the last three heats. Coles Dugan's Master Hill showed up in good form taking third money.

In the 2.21 class good racing was the programme all the way through. Many were disappointed in the withdrawal of King Arion from whom so much was expected, this horse was taken sick after the first heat and withdrawn. The race was won by Onward Gratten, owned by C J Hanson of Presque Isle, in straight heats. The officials were A W Williams, starter; W B Belyea, A L Trites and G W Gerow, Judges; J A DeWitt, J E Burham, J L Tompison, Timer; W P Lindow, Clerk.

Town Council.

At the regular meeting of the Town Council Friday evening all the members of the council were present. The monthly accounts were passed. On motion of Coun McManus seconded by Coun Allingham it was decided to purchase a piece of ground from G A White for the sum of \$40.00 the council to put up a fence as required.

Coun Ketchum in a strong address referred to the strong public sentiment regarding the children attending moving picture shows. He felt that in view of this the council should take some action in the matter. The question was a very delicate one as it involved the possible interference with the parents but he felt that with the great majority the resolution would not be looked upon in this way. Moving pictures, said the councillor, may be educative if properly conducted but unfortunately the managers sometimes selected poor material. He deplored the number of wild west and murder pictures which have been shown recently in the town. The evening attendance of little children should be restrained. The evening attendance had seriously interfered with the school work of the children and caused many complaints from the teachers. He could not understand why parents took so little care of their children, it was time for the town to step in and do something. He then moved the following resolution—"That the proprietor or manager of a moving picture show only be granted a license on the condition that no child under 15 years of age be admitted unaccompanied by parent or guardian or by the written permission from them." This resolution was seconded by Coun McManus and passed unanimously.

The speeding of automobiles was then discussed and the Chief of Police was instructed to take action against anyone exceeding the speed limit.

Canada's Next Census of Population.

The next census of Canada will be taken under date of June 1st, 1911, and will embrace the subjects of population, mortality, agriculture, manufactures, minerals, fisheries and dairy products.

Population will be recorded under the heads of residence and personal description; citizenship, nationality and religion; profession, occupation and trade or means of living; wage-earnings and insurance; education and language spoken, and infirmities.

Every person living on 1st June will be entered on the schedule of population by name, as member of a family, institution or household, together with place of habitation, sex, relationship to head of family or household, and whether single, married, widowed, divorced or legally separated. The month of birth, year of birth, and age at last birthday will also be recorded.

Entries will be made for each person to show the country or place of birth, year of immigration to Canada if born elsewhere, year of naturalization if formerly an alien, and also racial or tribal origin, nationality and religion. Every person of alien birth who has become a naturalized citizen is a Canadian by nationality; and every British subject with residence in Canada, as well as every native of Canada who has acquired citizenship by birth or naturalization, is also a Canadian by nationality. But there is no Canadian by racial or tribal origin, unless the Indians are so counted.

Every person having an occupation or trade will be entered for it, but if employed in the census year at some other occupation for part or whole time he will be so recorded also. If the person is working on own account, the entry will be so made. An entry is also required to be made showing where the person is employed, as on farm, in woollen mill, at foundry shop, in drug store, etc.

Wage-earners are entered to show the number of weeks employed in 1910 at chief occupation or trade; at other than chief occupation if any; the hours of working time per week at chief occupation, or at other occupation if any; the total earnings in 1910 at chief occupation; the total earnings at other than chief occupation; and the rate per hour when employed by the hour.

Entries are required to be made for each person showing the amount of insurance held at date of the census upon life, as well as against accident or sickness, together with the cost of such insurance in the census year.

Under the heading of education and language records will be taken for every person of five years of age and over showing the number of months at school in 1910, and if the person can read and write, and the language commonly spoken by each person. The cost of education in 1910 for persons over 16 years of age at College, Convent or University is also called for.

The last question on the schedule of Population relates to infirmities. It calls for a record of each person having an infirmity. If blind, deaf and dumb, crazy or lunatic, idiotic or silly, a record thereof will be made in the proper column, and the age at which the infirmity appeared is required to be specified.
