CARLETON COUNTY COUNCIL

(Continued from last week)

Coun Tracey—I did not mean to go all over the parish. I made the motion so as to give some a chance to give all they wished to. I thought my scheme would result in more money being raised than by the councillors each giving \$10.

Coun Tompkins—I am in favor of the original motion or the amendments. Subscriptions go good in Peel however and we can raise \$100 there which would be our proportionate share. I was going to suggest voting \$500. I would like to vote \$1,000 but we are under great expense. We can add our \$10 to the \$500 grant.

Coun Smith—I would like it if Coun Brown had made the motion granting \$500. It is generally spoken that we could afford that much. The ratepayers of the Parish of Woodstock are against giving anything. I feel like voting for the amendment to the amendment, that of giving \$5 and taking around a subscription paper.

Coun King—Wilmot is willing to be taxed on some amount so I am willing to take the responsibility of taxing Wilmot their share. Not one out of five would be against it. In fact I have heard nothing against it. Coun Melville has no right to say what the council shall do neither am I willing to head a paper with \$5 and carry it around, yet I am willing to do what I can.

Coun Britain—I would rather that the motion had been made for \$500 and passed unanimously. We are under heavy expense. If Campbellton has a rough winter we can give more at our next session. There are many in Brighton who cannot pay more taxes than they are paying now. Some of our people won't have a quarter crop and for that reason we should not go higher than \$500.

Coun Williams—I agree with the different councillors on the different motions in some respects. I always opposed extravagance or giving away the people's money yet I hoped that Coun Brown's motion might pass unanimously. I would have suggested \$750 and again I agree with Coun Melville as I do with Coun Kinney in regard to suffering humanity. Many Wilmot people say to give \$1,000. I am in favor of it. They would not turn me down for voting for this motion. If they do I am willing to stay at home, I would pay the \$10 too.

Coun Lamont—I understand that the county is being pretty thoroughly canvassed with subscription lists. The different churches have taken the matter up, yet not as a church affair. I am afraid of the precedence, we would establish. Bounties have been given many times yet outside of the Carleton County hospital we have received no benefit. I would approve of giving Campbellton a chance to help themselves. There is lots of work and it would be a good thing for Campbellton if many of the people there were forced to move away. Again I have read that the money contributed is not spent judiciously. If the motion had been for \$500 I would have supported it. In January we can give them more if they need it.

Coun Morgan—I am not in favor of Coun Tracey's suggestion. It was put to sidetrack the original motion and would mean that we would have to go about the county many times. Let us make a respectable gift. If we cannot give \$1,000 let us give nothing. The \$1,000 grant would mean \$90 raised in Brighton. I will give the original motion my hearty support.

The amendments and the motion was then put to a vote. The amendments were lost and the motion carried by a vote of 15 to 6.

Warden Stevens—We are entitled to \$2 each for our time here this evening as well as our expenses. I think it would be a good plan for us not to insist on getting our indemnity.

Coun F. R. Shaw then made a motion that the sessional indemnity of \$2 each be contributed as a supplement to the fund.

Coun Melville—They would now vote money out of our own pockets.

Coun Tompkins declared that the sessional indemnity was little enough for the councillors to receive as their time would be worth more had the members been permitted to carry on their work in the hayfield.

Coun Melville—It is not constitutional to take away from us our indemnity and I will refuse to give up mine.

Coun Williams then suggested that those who felt like contributing their indemnity might do so.

In the matter of appointing delegates to the Convention of the Union of Municipalities Warden Stevens declared that it was customary to appoint one delegate for every 5,000 population of the county.

When he was asked to make the appointments the warden pleaded that they be made by the board and that the warden be exempted.

It would be selfish for me to accept the appointment of a delegate at this convention and I ask you to leave off Councillors Balm, Tracey and myself. Fresh men should be appointed that they might become thoroughly acquainted with the county's business."

Coun Tompkins suggested that it be understood before making the appointments whether the delegates would pay their own expenses. Coun Smith moved that as the delegates last winter had their expenses paid the delegates to this convention should have their expenses paid. It was voted to allow hotel and railroad expenses.

The motion that the warden appoint the delegates was carried.

Just when the convention will be held rests with the executive of the Union. An expression was made that around exhibition time, Sept 21, 22 and 23 would be the best time. The council then adjourned.

PROVINCIAL PROGRESS.

When the conference of New Brunswick editors and St. John business men was held in this city last spring it was suggested that another such conference might be held during exhibition time. It is true that the visiting journalists will be very busy, and have much to see, but it is also true that more provincial newspaper men have promised to be in the city on press day than have ever gathered here at one time. They will be given an opportunity, no doubt, to express their views on provincial matters, but it would be a good thing if a conference such as that held in the board of trade rooms last spring could be repeated, with the addition of newspaper men from other provinces. There can be no doubt that the first conference had good results. It was good for St. John to hear the views of trained observers from other towns, and there can be no doubt that the advertising committee of the board of trade was stimulated by the conference to take more active measures to arouse local enthusiasm. It is also a fact that a more optimistic spirit has been awakened throughout the province in the last six months. There is a more confident tone in the utterances of the press generally. The first step in a forward movement is to get public interest aroused, and there can be no more effective way of doing it than to bring business men and newspaper men together and have them discuss matters relating to provincial progress. Hence, if the visitors will come prepared to state their views from the local standpoint, and tell of their experience, and what in their opinion would still further develop the progressive spirit in the provinces, the results will be very beneficial. The effect moreover, would be lasting. The matter is worthy of the thoughtful consideration of business men.

Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm at least 5 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the required to earn homestead, patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has not exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$800.00.
