## The Millville-Hawshaw Branch Again

There is an insistent rumor that negotiations are about complete for the beginning of work on this road. It is reported that the Hon Mr McLeod, who for a time did not see why the road should be built, has at last received light on the subject and now agrees with Messrs Pinder and Young that this road would be an excellent thing for York Co. We have no objections, as was intimated through this paper once before, to the people of Hawshaw having railway privileges, rather we would be pleased to see the section opened up if it can be done without sacrificing a larger and more important section. But the difficulty is that when a railroad is run into Hawshaw it will give those opposing the Valley Railroad more footing for opposition than ever before. Hawshaw is about half way between Fredericton and Woodstock. Half way from Hawshaw to Fredericton or Woodstock is about fifteen miles. The opponents of the Valley road, and there are many, will say why a new road when a short drive of fifteen miles will place these people on a railroad. More especially will this argument be put forward if the road, also proposed from Prince William to Harvey should be built.

When the Valley Road was proposed the controlling idea was that of competition. Conservatives and Liberals alike were willing to sacrifice their political convictions for the obtaining of a favorable railway competition in these river counties. The proposition for I C R control was put forward and the Ottawa government was willing and is still willing to take over the Valley railroad and run it as a part of the I C R system. This will give a satisfactory competition. But with the Hazen Government giving support to such a line as this Millville spur, which is but a branch and feeder of the C. P. R. it is made evident to the most casual thinker that Mr. Hazen is simply handing out a sop to those to whom he has promised an opportunity for a competing line of railway.

## LOST

A survey party which some weeks ago started from Woodstock to survey a line for a proposed railway to Andover. The last heard from this party they were in the vicinity of Mars Hill, Maine, making vain endeavors to climb the mountain, or find a way out of the woods. Anyone giving satisfactory information concerning this party to the Provincial Secretary will receive a promise of a new railroad to his own backyard as a reward.

## New C. O. C. F. Councils

Two new Councils of Chosen Friends were organized last week, one at Stanley, N. B., and one at Lerwick, Vic Co, N. B., and a full staff of officers elected. The C. O. C. F. work is going on splendidly in New Brunswick. They now have thirty-nine Councils in this province. S. G. Barter, the general organizer, who has just returned from a trip up the Tobique, reports that during his trip 16 new members were added to Lerwick Council, No 619; 4 new members to Three Brooks, No 584; 5 new members to Plaster Rock, No 558; 1 new member at Burnt Land Brook, No 598. S. G. Barter reached Fredericton, Monday eve, in time for the meeting of Fredericton Council, where five new members were added.
