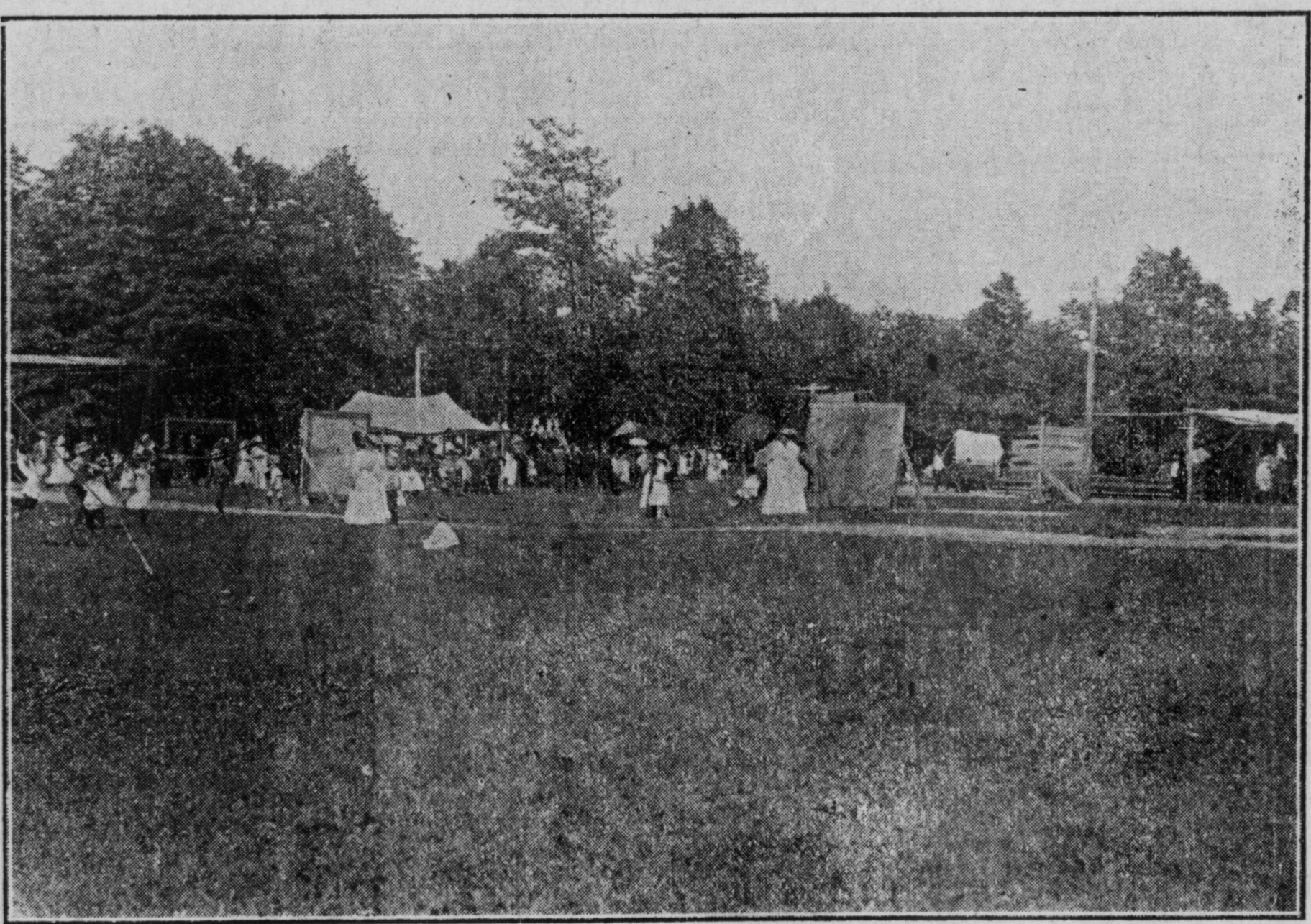

of \$3,000, with a total income of \$35,700. There was an increase in giving of \$3,925 for this year. The estimate for the year is \$48,666. This amount will be required to carry on the proposed work of the board.

The New Brunswick section of the home mission board reported receipts, \$6,025, and expenditure of \$5,635.

The Nova Scotia and P E Island sections reported receipts, \$5,753; expenditure, \$9,699, with a deficit of \$2,004.

The church edifice funds reported receipts of \$736 and expenditure \$603. CALLS OFFERINGS A DISGRACE.

In the discussion, N P Smith, of Halifax, deplored the fact that in some sections the giving of the people to the funds of the church was so small. The amount was an average of 81 cents per member and he thought this a disgrace to the denomination.

The Rev C H Wilson said there were men on the home mission fields who were getting only \$425 per year. He knew of men on these fields who had set down to dry bread. The salary should at least be \$700.

Considerable debate arose over the section of the report, the establishment of a board of missions for the whole of Canada. This board is to be divided into sections, known as the eastern, central and western. After a spirited debate the section was adopted.

Monday evening was devoted to the missionary topic with addresses by Revs I W Parker, J A Gordon and D E Hatt.

#### TUESDAY

At the final business session of the Maritime Baptist association, this afternoon, Rev G A Lawson presented the report of the finance committee. The churches are asked to raise \$55,000 which is apportioned as follows; 30 per cent for home missions; 35 per cent for foreign missions; 12 per cent for Acadia University; 6 per cent annuity fund; 10 per cent western missions; 4 per cent Grande Ligne; 3 per cent ministers' aid.

The report also provided for the appointment of a general financial agent to assist the churches in the support of denominational work. The report indicates a scheme to place all funds in the hands of one treasurer.

The committee on obituaries through the chairman, Rev R O Morse, made suitable references to the following: Rev Henry A Charlton, Rev Frederick Demille Crawley, Rev Sydney Welton, Rev Edwin T Miller, Rev John A Smith, Rev Walter G Goucher, Rev G R White, Prof Warren M Steele, Mrs I W Carpenter, Mrs J C Morse, N A Rhodes, E C Reid, Geo Barss, John Shaffner, Wm W McVane, Alfred Whitman, Henry Goucher, Thomas R Patille, Benj R DeWolfe, Jas A Peters, Isiah Shaw, T H Parker, P D Howett, Freeman Cook, Alex McIntyre and Samuel Simpson.

Rev Dr Cohoon on behalf of his committee gave notice of motion to change the date of the convention to the first Saturday after the 13th day of October.

The evening session was devoted to foreign missions, Rev W V Higgins presided and the following outgoing missionaries delivered short addresses. Rev and Mrs L A Glendinning; Rev and Mrs I C Archibald; Rev Gordon P Barss; Rev and Mrs M L Orchard; Mrs W V Higgins.

At the conclusion of the evening session the convention adjourned to meet at the call of the president.

The convention spent the morning in discussing their foreign mission work. A new field has been acquired and an enlargement of the enterprise is anticipated. The report of the Foreign Mission Board reviewed the work of the year. Four
