## TRAIL OF DEAD AND DYING IN BIG AUTO RACE

Vanderbilt Cup Contest Was a  
Gruesome Spectacle to Big  
Crowd.

Long Island Motor Parkway, Oct 1.—With dead and wounded marking nearly every mile of the course the sixth Vanderbilt cup race came to a gruesome and appalling close today with Harry Grant, driving a 120 horse power Alco, a winner by the narrow margin of 25 seconds. Joe Dawson, driving a Marmon was second, one minute and six seconds ahead of Joseph Aitken, at the wheel of a National. By his victory today Grant repeats his exploit of last year when he captured the cup in a car of the same make.

The winner's time for the 278.08 miles of the course was 3 hours 15 mins, 55 seconds, or an average of 65 1-5 miles an hour, which establishes a new American record. The race was marked by a series of fatalities and accidents, second only to the memorable Paris-Madrid race in its tragic results.

Harold Stone, of Los Angeles, driver of a Columbia car, was killed in a crash which occurred soon after the race started. Charles Miller, mechanic of the Marquette-Buick car, driven by Louis Chevrolet, was killed instantly in a crash with a touring car along the route. Ferdinand D'Zubia, New York, manager of the Pope-Hartford Company, was killed in a smash-up while on his way down to the track. The number of accidents short of fatalities run to scores.

From a sporting point of view alone the race was thrilling and rich in excitement. There is no doubt that it will go down in the annals of automobilism as the most hotly contested long distance event ever held over open country roads. Judged by its cost in killed and maimed, however, the race was a revolting spectacle, and a severe arraignment of the manner in which it was conducted.

## Sergeant John Hipwell.

Police Sergt John Hipwell, who after fifty seven years' faithful service on the St John police force, was retired from active duty and granted leave of absence on full pay on Nov 30th, 1908, passed away peacefully at his home, 82 Exmouth Street, St John, at 7.45 o'clock Saturday morning, after an illness of only five days' duration.

Sergt Hipwell was born on a farm near Ballyfirm, Queens Co, Ireland, in July of 1824, and after serving some years on the Irish Constabulary, then known as "Peelers," after the founder of that body, Sir Robert Peel, he came to St John when a young man of about 22 years of age. In 1851 he joined the police here, and faithfully discharged his duties as an officer of that body until retired in 1908. The policeman of those

early days had almost unbearable hardships to contend with, but yet Mr Hipwell bore them patiently. In carrying out his duties, which were oftentimes severe, instead of making enemies he made friends. Many a time was he known, although hungry himself, to give his luncheon to unfortunate hungry creatures whom he happened to meet while patrolling his beat through the night. Again he often pleaded to the police magistrate for the liberty of a prisoner, who perhaps had a wife and family at home needing his assistance. So many good acts did he do that he became known to almost everybody, and none had anything but a kind word for the old gentleman.

He was one of the men who arrested the notorious "Bob" Reynolds, who had terrified the people of Carleton and was afterwards hanged for murder in Toronto.—St John Globe.

## NATIONAL AERO CORPS TO BE FORMED.

Great Britain Will Organize Owners  
of Air Machines For War.

London, Oct 3.—Active preparations are under way by the promoters of aeronautics for the World's First Aerial exhibition which will be held at the Crystal Palace during December and January. This exhibition is to comprise everything that pertains to the navigation of the air, whether it be the old-fashioned balloon or the dirigible or multifarious makes of modern flying machines.

One of the main features in connection with the exhibition will be the establishment of the National Aero Corps. This will be inaugurated on the opening day. It is intended that this corps shall be composed of "those persons, units, or divisions, that have war or other national emergencies requiring their aid."
