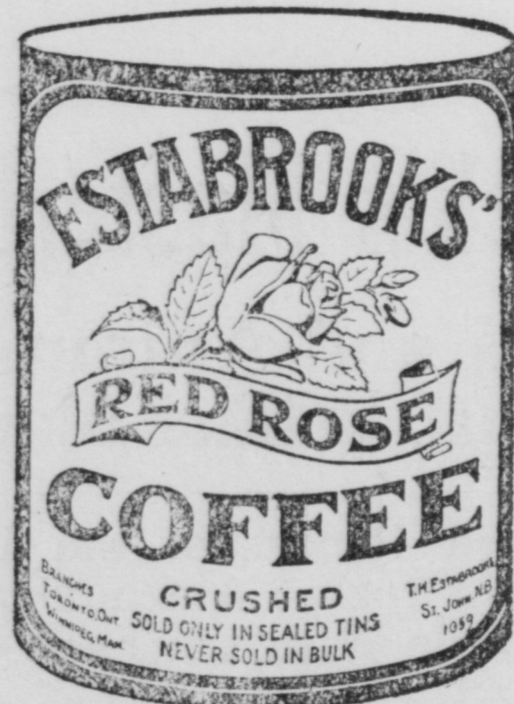

The couple left that evening for their home in Seattle, Washington, where the young man, who gives his name as George West, is said to be a civil engineer.

The girl was a Miss McMillie, who came out from England only 3 weeks ago. The groom, who secured employment merely to pick out a wife, refunded to the Penman Company \$60, the amount of the passage money which had been advanced to bring the girl to this country.

With the opening of navigation on the St Lawrence, the winterport season at St John is drawing to a close. When the last of the Trans-Atlantic Winter fleet has gone there will have been about one hundred and twelve sailings from this port to the ports of Liverpool, Bristol, London, Manchester, Glasgow, Belfast, Antwerp, and ports in South Africa; and the total value of the exports will be close to \$23,000,000. These exports include over 7,000,000 bushels of grain and nearly a million sacks of flour. It is worthy to note that more than a fifth of the value of the exports was in produce from the Middle and Western States. One interesting feature of the imports by a recent steamer was a thousand carcasses of Australian mutton coming here from England for shipment to Winnipeg. The cattle shipments show a great falling off this season, but in other lines there was a general increase. There is a summer service between St John and Glasgow, besides the fleet of steamers in the lumber trade.

The new Cuban steamer service direct from St John has proved of great value to shippers of potatoes, hay, oats, lumber, fish and other goods, and the new market opened up for potatoes really saved the situation for New Brunswick growers. Although they shipped over 100,000 barrels to Cuba, they still have considerable quantities in warehouse, and have lately sold as low as thirty cents per barrel. It is anticipated that trade with Cuba and Mexico will show a marked development within the next few years. The erection of the proposed large sugar refinery at St John will give a market for raw sugar, and it is believed Cuban pineapples can be successfully handled by a canning factory at St John.

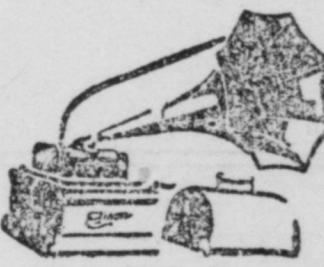
