Says New Brunswick Should be Getting Them.

MORE THAN 1300 DESIRABLE IMMIGRANTS TO PASS THROUGH ST. JOHN THIS WEEK FOR THE WEST—ONE INTERESTED URGES EASTERNERS TO FOLLOW UP ACTION OF BOARD OF TRADE.

More than 1,300 passengers are to arrive here during the present week in three liners. The C. P. R. steamer Empress of Ireland, Captain Porter, is due Friday with 709 as follows: ninety-four saloon, 170 second class and 445 steerage. The Lake Michigan, also of the C. P. R., should be here Wednesday evening from London and Antwerp with 354 and the Allan liner Corsican is expected Sunday with 281 as follows: twelve saloon, fifty-nine second cabin and 210 steerage. The Allan liner Hungarian from London and Havre is also expected during the week, but she is not bringing any passengers.

Practically all of these immigrants are to be taken right through to the west. An interested gentleman said last night that it seemed a pity that such numbers of first class settlers should have to land in St. John and travel through the province on to a part of the country two or three thousand miles away without knowing anything of this magnificent province and the excellent opportunities to make a fine living here. "Why does our government, our boards of trade, our civic and municipal councils not get busy," he said, "and have New Brunswick properly advertised in Great Britain? I am glad to know that the St. John board of trade have passed a resolution to this effect today, and I sincerely hope every interested man in this province will follow it up hard and do his part in bringing pressure to bear on the legislature to spend money in showing intending emigrants from Great Britain how superior chances are in New Brunswick to anything the west has to offer. It would be money well spent, and I do not think the provincial government could make a more popular move."

The Manchester liner Manchester Merchant steamed from Manchester for St. John direct on Sunday. The Manchester Shipper is due in Halifax on Wednesday or Thursday bound for St. John.

The West India liner Cromarty is now due, and should be here today.—Telegraph.

CHAOTIC CONDITIONS PREVAIL IN MANY SECTIONS IN


Hong Kong, Dec. 1.—Although the reign of piracy on the West river has been checked by the vigilance of guards on board the river steamers, situation ashore is utterly chaotic. In the towns and settlements along the river, the most deplorable outrages are frequently occurring. Even in Canton the military regime has proved itself wholly insufficient. For several days armed bands of robbers have gone about Canton looting shops and houses. Today five ruffians bristling with revolvers walked boldly into a bank in a suburb and got away with \$5000 in cash. About the same time, a band of seven armed natives blundered into the open market and boldly plundered two prominent shops before the eyes of hundreds of panic-stricken onlookers. They secured several hundred dollars in money and walked off.

Canadian Student Won all Contests at Chicago Show

THREE COLLEGES WON ALL THEY COMPETED FOR IN STOCK-JUDGING CONTESTS—MACDONALD COLLEGE BOYS DID BEST.

Chicago, Dec. 4.—According to an announcement by the stock show management, Canadian student stock men will take home 70 per cent. of the Armour scholarship awards to the international stock show.

Three Canadian colleges which entered the competition in stock judging against seven schools in the United States, were winners in every class. The five-boy team of Macdonald College, of Quebec, was declared the most efficient, and to this school will go 40 per cent. of the \$5,000 Armour scholarship award, together with the international trophy for judging.

The shipmen's of the Dominion Coal Company this season to Montreal will close for the year next week and will total upwards of one and a half million tons of coal. This is an increase of over 150,000 tons over the best previous year, 1908, when the total shipments were 1,350,000 tons. This year's record is the largest in the history of Cape Breton collieries. The company employ a fleet of twenty-six steamers in this service.

MR. BORDEN'S QUIBBLE.

When Sir Wilfrid Laurier denounced the scandal of men holding diametrically opposite opinions on a great public question, sitting side by side in the Government, in violation of the accepted principles of ministerial unity and ministerial responsibility, Mr. Borden tried to wriggle out of the humiliating position in which his alliance with Mr. Bourrassa had placed him, by asserting that there was only a difference as to facts, and not as to principles between Mr. Monk and himself. This excuse was so lame, and so utterly preposterous, that even the Toronto Telegram is impelled to repudiate its pretences. In the following leading article it brings Mr. Borden up with a sharp turn:

A quibble, unworthy of Hon. R. L. Borden, was expressed in the argument embodied in Mr. Borden's definition of the difference between the Monk policy and the Conservative policy in relation to Canada's duty towards the defence of maritime freedom.

Canada did not understand that the difference between Mr. Borden and Mr. Monk was a difference on the QUESTION OF FACT as to whether Britain needed help.

Canada hoped that the difference between Mr. Borden and Mr. Monk was more than a difference on the QUESTION OF POLICY as to whether Canada should help Britain. Britain's need may be a QUESTION OF FACT on which Mr. Borden and Mr. Monk may safely disagree.

CANADA'S DUTY is no QUESTION OF POLICY, but a QUESTION OF PRINCIPLE on which Canadians are going to line up against the Monks and the Bourrassas, irrespective of what Hon. R. L. Borden may do or leave undone.

The point that Hon. R. L. Borden overlooked in his speech is that Canada's duty in the defence of maritime freedom is not a QUESTION OF FACT or a QUESTION OF POLICY but a QUESTION OF PRINCIPLE. This ultra-Tory organ has put it up squarely to Mr. Borden, and he

cannot escape. Mr. Monk's attitude is well known. He denounced both the naval policy of the Government and the Dreadnaught proposals of Mr. Borden, and he burned his bridges behind him during the election campaign when he declared: "I have separated myself from Mr. Borden on this important question, and I will continue to fight until the battle is won."

Neither Mr. Borden nor Mr. Monk can be persuaded to tell the whole truth about the matter, but it will be dragged out of them.—Chronicle.

CUSTOMS RETURNS SHOW BIG INCREASE.

Ottawa, Dec. 1.—The customs re-

ceipts for the month of November amounted to \$7,322,055, an increase of \$1,300,000 over the corresponding month last year. The revenue for eight months was \$56,336,000 an increase of \$9,000,000 over the same period last year.

MR. MONK'S ADMISSION

Hon. F. D. Monk's speech in the debate on the Address ought to open the eyes of some people. "Sir Wilfrid is morose and peevish," he says, "because he is losing the confidence of Quebec." Why? Because, says Mr. Monk, Sir Wilfrid failed to guard the religious and racial rights of the French-Canadians. Because Sir Wilfrid failed to do justice to the Roman Catholic minority in Manitoba. Because Sir Wilfrid, in the Autonomy Bills of 1905, "once more deceived the confidence of the people whom he should have been particularly bound to protect"—that is, his co-religionists. Because Sir Wilfrid refused to impose the French language on the Legislatures of Alberta and Saskatchewan. Mr. Monk's admissions are a sad commentary upon the campaign cries of the Tory Party outside of Quebec.—Chronicle.

NIAGARA SNOW TO SAVE HAND FROM AMPUTATION.

Toronto, Dec 4.—Dr. F. S. Pepperdene, a distinguished London physician, who had considerable to do with the perfection of Roentgen's discovery of the X-ray, will pass the winter at Vinland in the Niagara district in a series of experiments whereby he hopes to save his right hand, which is afflicted with the hitherto incurable disease of dermatitis, caused by X-ray burns, received in the course of his studies.

Some time ago his left hand had to be amputated for the same reason, and now that the right is also diseased, he hopes to do everything to save it. The curative method he will adopt is to hold the hand in snow until it is at the point of congelation, later allowing it gradually to return to the normal temperature. Similar treatment has been found efficacious in driving out the poison in other forms of skin disease in England, where artificial cold is used in the process.
