(1). A Winnipeg news item says that a farmer named Bert Manning, living southeast of Mather, hauled five hundred bushels of barley to the American market, paid duty and cleared 18 cents a bushel over the Canadian price. Charles Masters, a neighbor farmer, paid \$64.00 duty on four loads, and still realized \$15.00 over Canadian prices.

(2). E. J. Fream, secretary of the Alberta Farmers' Union, has returned from a visit to a machine firm across the line, endeavoring to make arrangements for cheaper agricultural machinery. Of course the western farmer will have to pay the duty on the machinery brought into Canada.

(3). A bunch of Montana grass fed cattle, which had never been off the ranch sold on the Chicago market for \$7.90. They are selling here at less than \$5.00. That means after everything is taken into consideration that Alberta ranchers could make more than \$20 a head at the present time shipping their cattle to the Chicago market, but for the duty.

Facts such as these will, not induce the western farmer to forget about the Reciprocity agreement.—Calgary Albertan.

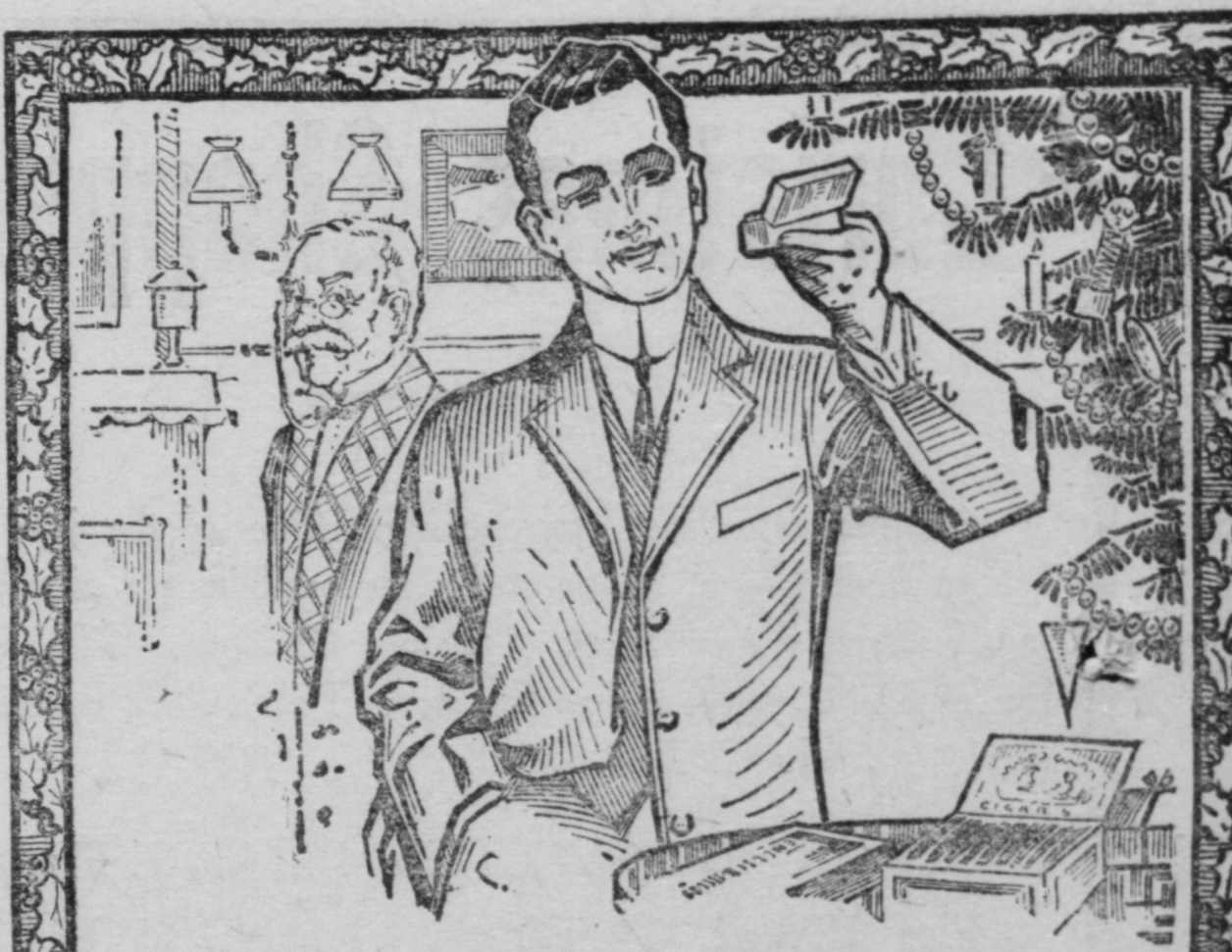
THE BORDEN NAVY.
