SERIOUS FIRE.

Fire broke out on Tuesday morning between 3 and 4 o'clock, in Hayden's saw mill at the upper end of the town, and despite the best efforts on the part of the firemen the building was burned to the ground. The factory in connection also caught and was completely destroyed. The loss is estimated at about \$20,000 and no insurance.

Some eight years ago this mill was burned, this being the fourth time it has met with the same disaster.

Between thirty and forty men will be thrown out of employment but Mr. Hayden will begin operations for rebuilding at once.

Mr. Colpitts, the Scott Act Inspector, after making a number of searches within the last few weeks at the Boundary line on the road leading from Woodstock to Houlton, suspected that intoxicating liquor was kept in a cellar on the American side of the line. He notified the American officers to meet him at the line on Friday afternoon last. The Sheriff of Aroostook County, with his Deputy and Mr. Colpitts arrived there at the same time and a quantity of intoxicating liquor was found there on the American side. Alonzo Rackliffe, an old offender against the Scott Act and against whom convictions are now standing on this side, was found in the den, in charge of the place. The liquor was Canadian liquor smuggled across the line and the American officers took charge of Rackliffe for smuggling. He will no doubt serve a term in Portland gaol.
