HOULTON'S GAIN CENSUS 1910

According to figures of the Census Bureau issued last week, Houlton made a good substantial gain of 1160, going ahead of Caribou.

Comparative figures of the towns in Aroostook county over 5000 are as follows:

	1910	1900
Houlton	5,845	4,685
Caribou	5,377	4,758
P. Isle	5,179	3,804

The largest gain was made by Presque Isle and it will be remembered that Caribou and Presque Isle are both what are called doubly towns, being 6 miles wide and 12 miles long, while Houlton is six miles square.

St. John had a visit last week from Mr. D. M. W. Lyell of London, England. He represents Willis & Company, an engineering firm who have had experience on the Manchester Ship Canal and on the Nile Dam at Assuan. Mr. Lyell looked over the site of the proposed dry dock and terminal works at St. John Harbour East, and also examined the plan of the works in the office of the Department. He will report to Willis & Company, and it is possible that they may tender for these harbour works.

An indication of increased business in St. John is found in the hotel registers. This is usually one of the dull seasons of the year for travel but the hotels are filled, and one of them reports that on several occasions recently it has been unable to accommodate all who came. Speaking of hotels, it was stated at the annual meeting of the New Brunswick Tourist Association that one of the great needs of the Province was hotel accommodation on the St. John River, and at other favorite resorts for Summer tourists who desire to spend a considerable portion of the season at one place. One suggestion was that a Company having a big hotel in the South in Winter could very profitably conduct another on the beautiful St. John River in summer, employing the same staff at both places. There can be no question that when the charm of this region in summer is better known over the rest of the Continent, great hotels will be erected which will rival those of the Atlantic Coast of New England.

The city of St. John declines to be regarded as the effete city of Canada. The movement in favour of the adoption of the commission plan of city government is progressing with almost the speed of a prairie fire. Within a couple of weeks after a committee of the Board of Trade had submitted a carefully prepared report on the Commission plan, with a recommendation that it be adopted, the Board of Trade had endorsed the report, a mass meeting of citizens had declared its approval, the City Council had decided to ask the Legislature for authority to take a plebiscite, and a committee of fifty citizens representative to all classes and interests had been formed to prepare a rough draft of a new city charter, and carry on an educative campaign from this date until the plebiscite is taken at the civic elections in April. It is a popular movement, founded on a desire to apply business principles to city government.

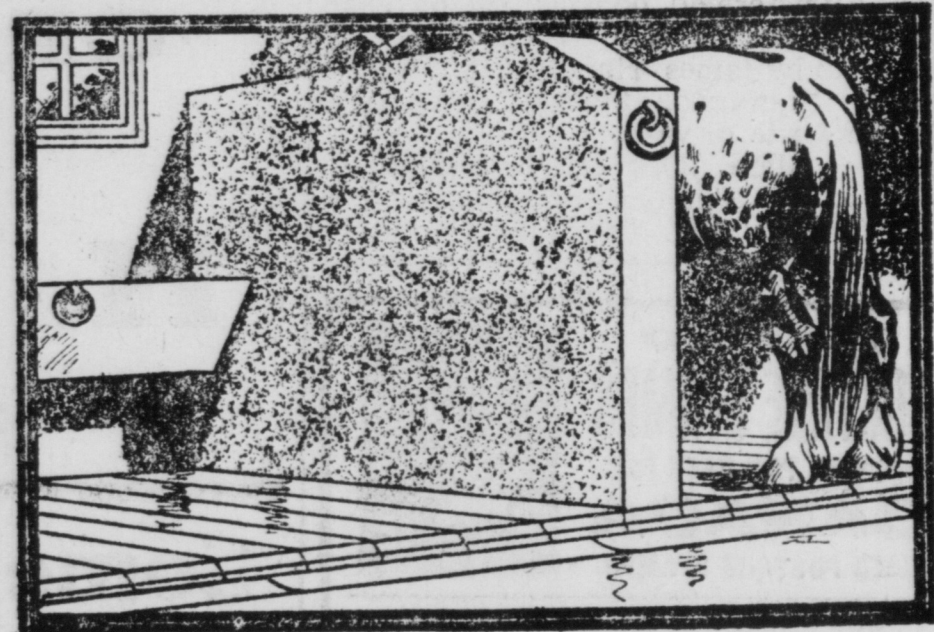
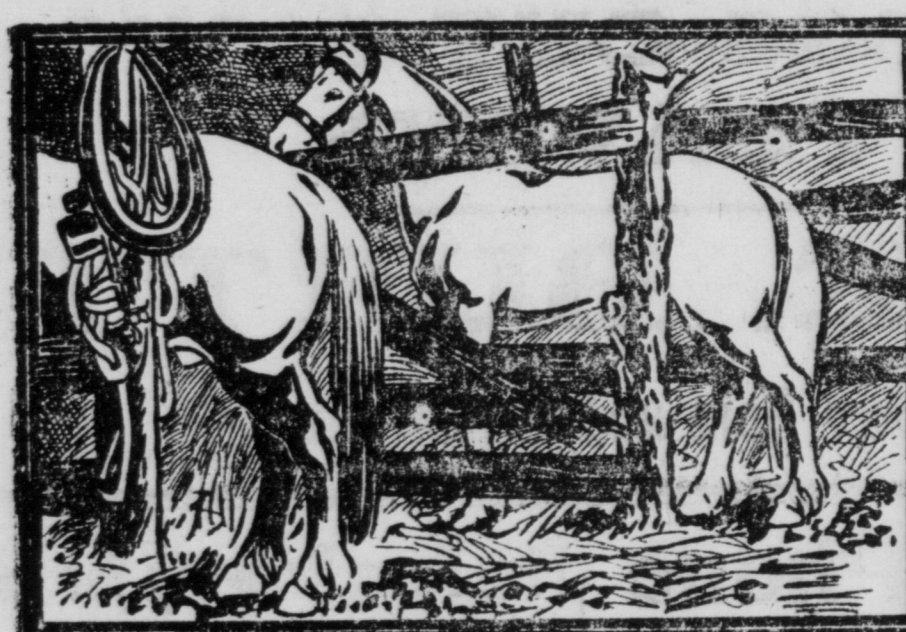
