HUNDREDS OF ELECTORS PUT FRANK B. CARVELL IN NOMINATION

A Partial List of Those Who Have Signed the Nomination Paper of the Reciprocity Candidate--Conservatives on the List Because They Stand by the Principles of the Great John A. --Smith's Campaign Managers Finally Came to Time for a Joint Debate--They Wish They Hadn't Now

On Thursday Frans B. Carvell and B. F. Smith were duly nominated as candidates in the present contest.

After the nominations were made and the court closed a joint meeting was held in the Armoury. Some days ago Mr. J. N. W. Winslow, on behalf of the anti-Reciprocity people, informed Mr. Carvell's executive that Mr. Smith was eager for a joint debate in the Armoury. All right, was the reply, we're ready. Then a little later Mr. Winslow wrote Mr. Carvell's executive that the anti-Reciprocity men DIDN'T want a debate in the Armoury but one in the Haydn-Gibson Theatre. The reply made to him was: We'll meet you in the Armoury but not in the theatre, since that building is too small for such a meeting. Then there were some more letters from Mr. Winslow, but his bluff didn't go. Finally, at eleven o'clock on Thursday morning, Mr. Winslow notified the secretary of the Reciprocity Executive that Mr. Smith was really willing to meet Mr. Carvell at the Armoury, and so the debate took place.

The debate was heard by a large crowd and Mr. Carvell's speech made an excellent impression, though, of course, some interruptions were made for the purpose of lessening its effectiveness. Mr. Carvell talked "business" and gave a clear cut exposition of the campaign issue and a masterly criticism of the unfair and false statements made by opponents of the pact in this and other counties. The speech was one which made a distinct impression and well deserved the hearty applause.

Mr. Smith, on the other hand, rehearsed some of the stock, "interest" made arguments against the agreement and did some of the customary flag-waving. He disappointed even his own friends by his failure to discuss the case from a business standpoint.

A TUPPER VIEW

This is what Sir Charles Herbert Tupper said before the Halifax Canadian Club in last December:--

"There should be unity of parties to make Canada absolutely loyal to a policy of sharing in the defence of the Empire. Then we could share the titanic burden and we might live to see driven to the four winds the Bourrassas and Monks, and all that ilk, who would destroy and render of no effect the dreams of the men who strove to build and ennoble an empire in which Canada should have an honorable part."

Mr Monk is Mr Borden's Quebec lieutenant and it is Mr Bourassa who is Mr Borden's chief ally in Quebec province. Think it over.

A BRITISH OPINION

The Manchester Guardian, one of the greatest of English journals, says:--

"Mr Bourassa's main charge against Sir Wilfrid Laurier is that he has consented to a naval agreement by which Canada may be drawn into Imperial wars from which she had better keep aloof, and it is the most curious feature of the election that Mr Bourassa's allies are the Conservatives, whose complaint is precisely that Sir Wilfrid Laurier is half-hearted in his Imperialism, and that he is unpatriotic enough to decline to put the Canadian squadron wholly at the disposal of the British Admiralty."
