## LET WELL ENOUGH ALONE

LET WELL ENOUGH ALONE is the cry which has been raised by Canadian opponents of Reciprocity. The Sentinel agrees with the doctrines of letting well enough alone and continuing in power a government which has brought to Canada prosperity and advancement such as was known under no previous government.

LET WELL ENOUGH ALONE and keep in power a government which has proved its worth. It has not been a perfect government for its members are only human, but it has been a government the general policy and administration of which have worked out to the great advantage of Canada and to the strengthening of the Empire.

LET WELL ENOUGH ALONE and continue in power a government which has carried out policies which have practically tripled Canada's trade, caused enormous growth in the country's revenue, added thousands of miles to our railroad trackage, spent millions on improving our ports, lessened the per caput taxalities and in scores of other ways added to the prosperity of the Dominion.

LET WELL ENOUGH ALONE and keep in power a government which, in face of the bitterest Conservative opposition has established and maintained the British Preference. Keep in power a government which has nailed to the mast-head the policy of granting a preference to the Mother Land.

LET WELL ENOUGH ALONE and keep in power a government which has found new trade openings for Canada in the past and is today appealing to the people on a policy which aims at opening to us the greatest of the markets now walled up by tariff restrictions. Keep in power a government which by securing the remission of heavy United States duties is giving to the common people of the Dominion an opportunity of receiving more money for their hay and their potatoes and sheep and lambs and other natural products.

LET WELL ENOUGH ALONE and keep in power a government which is today fighting the battle of the Common People against the Monopolists and Capitalists. Keep in power a government which stands for the People against the Classes.

LET WELL ENOUGH ALONE and keep in power a government which has followed a policy of true Canadianism. Keep in power a government whose leader has declared that Canada must always stand by the Mother Land in time of danger.

LET WELL ENOUGH ALONE and keep out of power Bourassa and his friends who shout that "Laurier is too British," "Laurier has sold us to the English," "We have had enough of England and the English." "We have had to shoot holes in the English flag in order to breathe the atmosphere of liberty" and other seditious cries.

LET WELL ENOUGH ALONE and keep out of power Bourassa and his aims at a French state on the shores of the St. Lawrence, a fact made clear by his own utterances and the waving of the French flag at a Conservative meeting a few days ago by Bourassa's lieutenant, Hon. Jean Prevost.

YES, THIS IS THE WAY TO LET WELL ENOUGH ALONE. But to let well enough alone by resting on our oars and making no effort to add to our present prosperity would be to accept a position worthy only of the savages of uncivilized lands who see merely the present and live merely for the present.

## UNDER WHICH FLAG?

Since some people want to talk about flags, apparently, why mince matters?

Under which flag? Under the flag of un-British ideals of Mr. Bourassa, who vehemently protests against Canada doing anything to help defend the Mother Land; or under the flag of close allegiance to all things British, as borne by Sir Wilfrid Laur-

ier who has been honored by three British sovereigns and lauded by British statesmen and honored even by Bourassa when he said last week that Laurier had been the chief Canadian "instrument for the furtherance of Imperialism."

Under which flag? Under the flag of Mr. Borden's Nationalist allies who said publicly that Canada owed nothing to England or the English; or under the flag of devotion to the British Empire which Laurier says is the greatest defender of liberties the world has ever seen?

Under which flag? Under the flag of Mr. Borden's ally, Mr. Bourassa, who cries that Canada should not have a navy to help the Mother Land; or under the flag of willingness to help the old Mother Country bear her burdens of defence?

Under which flag? Under the flag, the tri-color, waved aloft at a Conservative meeting by Hon. Jean Prevost when speaking in support of Mr. Bruno Nantel, former Conservative M. P.; or under the flag of the leader who says that if England is ever in danger it will be Canada's duty to hasten to her help?

Under which flag? Under the flag of Mr. Borden who allies himself with the Nationalist shouters that it has been necessary "to shoot holes in the British flag in order to breathe the atmosphere of liberty" while Mr. Borden himself shouts out—in English speaking provinces only—that Laurier isn't loyal; or under the flag of the man who said the other day that he believed in a policy which will knit the Canadian races closer together in bonds of nationhood with the great British Empire.

Under which flag? Under the Bourassa-Borden flag of appeals to racial passion such as inevitably lead to dissension and the disruption of a country; or under the flag of Laurier who has proved his worth as one of the foremost statesmen of the Empire and a man who believes in a domestic policy of moderation and conciliation and the upbuilding of a nation of people who will live in harmony, tolerant of the racial feelings of all classes of our people?

## A BUSINESS PROPOSITION

Reciprocity will not be and is not intended to be a one-sided arrangement. Both parties to it will benefit by it, the United States as well as Canada.

It is simply a plain business proposition. Nations do not enter into business arrangements for the benefit of one country only any more than firms or individuals enter into business arrangements with a view to benefitting only one party to the agreement.

Canada will benefit by Reciprocity. The United States will benefit. No other expectation would have justified either country in considering the pact.

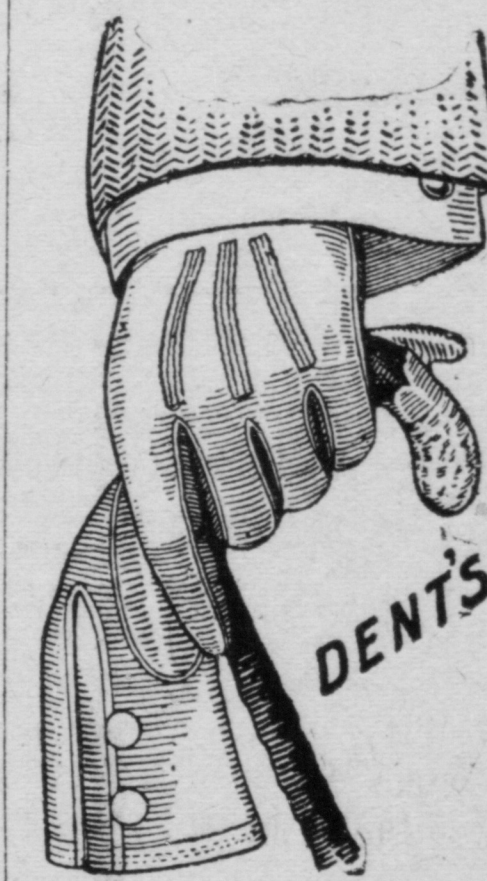
