

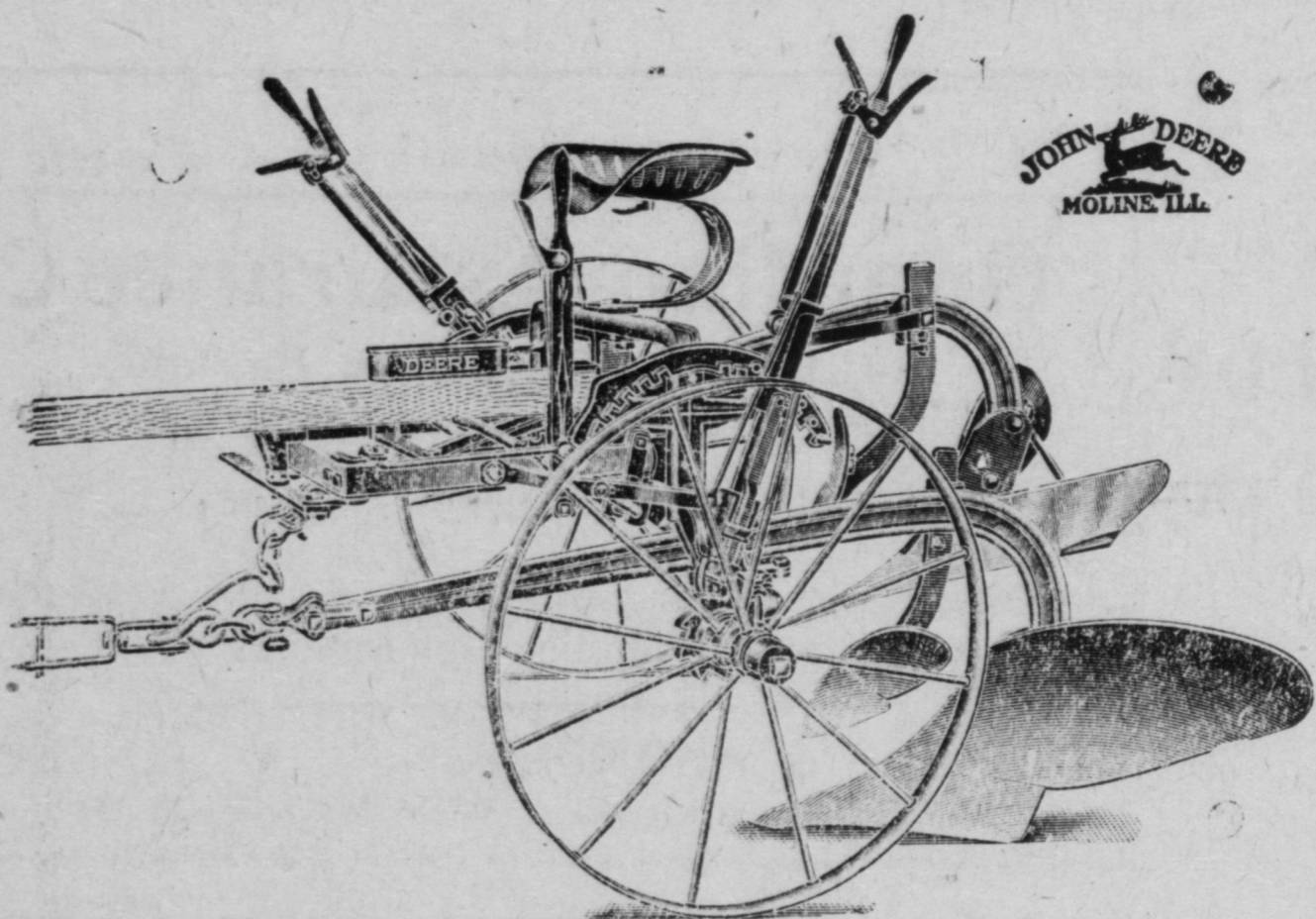

### THE SADDLE HORSE IS COMING IN TO HIS OWN

London, Oct. 4.—The saddle horse, after suffering a temporary eclipse owing to the popularity of motoring, is now rapidly galloping into favor again. During the last three years there has been a wonderful revival of horsemanship and today, according to competent authorities, more people are regularly taking horse exercise than has been the case for many years past. A morning visit to Hyde Park, Tooting Bec, Hampstead Heath, or to Battersea and Dulwich Parks will provide sufficient proof to convince the most sceptical.

The various riding schools throughout the country are all doing record business in training new riders and in supplying mounts to those horsemen, who are again taking to this most wholesome and exhilarating exercise.

"That horse-riding is becoming increasingly popular, there can be no doubt," said the manager of Messrs Tilling's riding kingdom. "This change in the habit of the people commenced about three years ago. Then, on the accession of King George, when His Majesty revived the practice of taking a morning gallop in the Row, the habit once again became fashionable."

"Apart from the pleasure of sitting a good horse for a morning or an evening gallop, physicians are increasingly recommending it for nervous complaints, for a too pronounced roundness of the figure, and for men who have become aware that they have a liver."
