## THE CLERGYMAN AS A CITIZEN

### Rev. J. James McCaskill Replies to His Critics — Clergyman's Letter

Rev. J. James McCaskill, pastor of St. Matthews Presbyterian church, who has been criticized by some members of his congregation and ministers for his action in advocating reciprocity during the election campaign, had for his subject last night, The Clergyman as Citizen. He said in part:

"The duties of religion are liable to become petty if we neglect the wide horizon. It is only by sending our eyes through the task and viewing each particular duty as but a single feature of the great kingdom of righteousness, that we acquire the dignity of citizens of that kingdom. Members of Presbytery have offered indiscriminating criticism of the clergyman in politics and they find it difficult to forgive him for the crime of being a citizen. But those who criticize forget that the chief work of the prophet in the past was altogether civic and national rather than ecclesiastical. They may call it presumption of me to cite the example of the prophet, but with a suspicious eagerness they tender the prophet's reward. With remarkable unanimity they offer the cup of hemlock and the poison chalice.

"But the unanimity is more apparent than real. From a leading clergyman in the church comes a letter in which he says that the present attitude of the people towards the rights of the clergy in this matter creates a spirit of hypocrisy and cowardice. He continues: 'If a man dare not give expression to his views on any subject he is a slave. So if your action will break the tyranny of the people on the one hand, or awaken the conscience of the ministers on the other it is good some one spoke out.'

#### CLAIMS A RIGHT

"For myself personally this tyranny has had no existence. I have held somewhat definite views on most subjects and have never hesitated about giving them expression. I claim this right for myself and deny it to no one. I would not for a moment continue my connection with any ecclesiastical or other organization that

## U. S. CLERGY DISCUSS DRINKING CUP LAW

(New York Herald.)

With the new State law prohibiting the use of common drinking cups in public places effective on Sunday, much interest has been aroused regarding its effect upon the Holy Communion in churches throughout the State. In some denominations small individual cups have long been in vogue, but in others the custom is to use but one cup for the rite.

The law will not effect the Roman Catholic Church for the celebration of the Blessed Sacrament the priest takes the wine and gives only the wafer to the communicants. In some other denominations small glass cups are already in use, but in the Protestant Episcopal Church the question presented is much more serious.

"While there is no express canon of the Episcopal Church covering the question of the use of the individual cup in the celebration of Holy Communion," said Bishop Charles Sumner Burch, cufuran of this diocese, "there is a very clear and definite rubric, which, I believe, requires the officiating clergyman in consecration to use one cup or chalice.

"Back of these rubrics is the practically unbroken usage of nearly nineteen centuries. Besides this there are the words used by Christ in the institution of the sacrament, by which He blessed the cup and gave it to His disciples, with the command to drink it.

"I confess my ignorance of the wording of the new law providing for the employment of individual drinking cups for public use. Should this law, as is suggested, prohibit the use of a single cup or chalice in the administration of Holy Communion, it brings the church face to face with a difficult problem, for surely the church does not wish to act in violation of any law of the State.

"I do not believe there is any serious danger of infection in the use of one cup in the Holy Communion. I have never heard of a well authenticated instance of infection, and I firmly believe that the danger, if there is any, is more imaginary than real.

"If the State law should be found to contravene the rubrics and usage of the Church—which I hardly expect—it would be a question primarily for the House of Bishops to consider and take action on."

The Rev. Dr. George Clarke Houghton, rector of the church of the Transfiguration—"Little church around the Corner"—said:

"In my opinion this new law will not effect our church in any way. It would not be for the betterment of the State or the city for a law to be enacted by this Legislature or any Legislature that would interfere with sacred customs in the religion of the people.

"The clergy are in a far greater danger than the lay communicants, wine that is left even if six hundred if there is any danger," said Dr. Houghton. "We have to drink all the wine that is left even if six hundred communicants have drunk out of the one cup. Furthermore we must remove what is left on the rim of the chalice and we must rinse the cup with water and drink that, so that there is not a particle of the Blessed Sacrament left.

"There is little if any danger of infection. We have a small consecrated spoon always ready, and when it is necessary we dip this into a cup and communicate a person by this spoon.

The Rev. D. J. Lewis Hartsock, pastor of the Union Methodist Church, uses the silver goblet in his church, but does not object to the law's provisions. He said:

"I should think that if the individual cup is in force in one place it ought to be in another. I don't think the Church ought to try to escape any law that makes for sanitation."

The Rev. Dr. David G. Wylie, of Scotch Presbyterian Church where individual cups have long been used said:

"I think they will exempt the churches from this law, just as the interstate railroad law exempts clergymen in regard to transportation. I think any other course would be considered an interference with the freedom of worship. People are not obliged to partake of the Lord's Supper."

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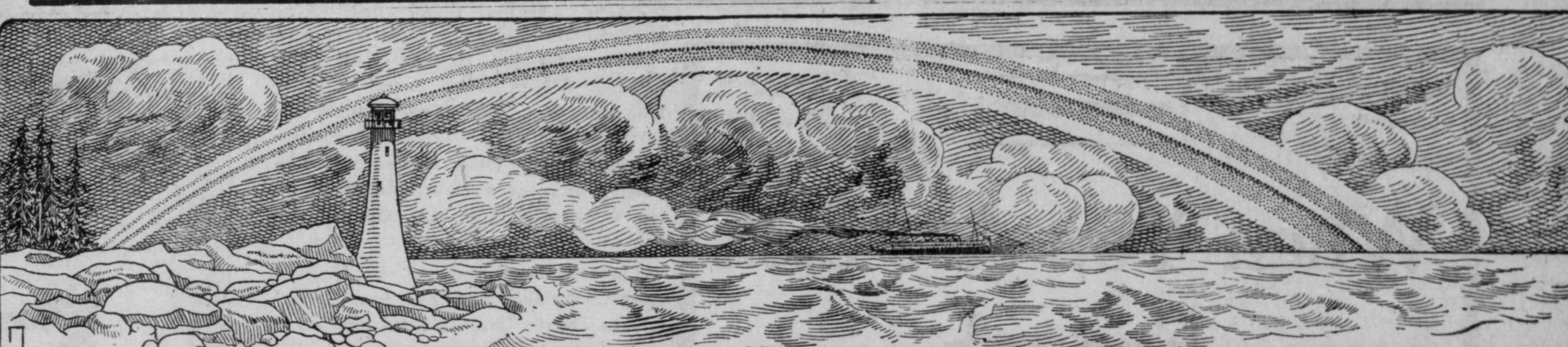
