



NEWS OF THE WEEK

The Canadian Northern Railway has decided to start work at once upon the construction of the work-shops in the City of Quebec.

As a result of a row in Tuft's College, Boston, Mass., Dr. David D. Scarwell, the assistant professor, together with every instructor in the surgical department has resigned.

At a meeting of the provincial cabinet held in Quebec on Tuesday morning, it was decided to grant a subsidy of \$3,500 towards the erection of a tuberculosis hospital in Quebec.

James J. Regan, Esq., National President of the Ancient Order of Hibernians in America, has been visiting the larger cities of the Province this week and addressing meetings at each place.

Dr. Alfred C. Lambdin, Editor of the Public Ledger, Philadelphia, for the past twelve years, died on Tuesday of heart disease, aged 65 years. Dr. Lambdin was well known as a writer of musical and art topics.

The annual conference of the United Baptist Young People met in Waterloo St. Church, St. John, on Tuesday. The local societies entertained the visiting delegates at luncheon at White's restaurant on Wednesday.

At a meeting of the members of Immanuel Baptist Church, Canby, Me., on November 7, it was voted to accept the resignation of Rev. C. V. T. Richeson, now in jail on the charge of murdering Avis Linnell.

The Governor and Council at Augusta, Me., announced on Tuesday, November 7, that they had decided to accept corrections on the vote in the election recently held in Maine, and it would give prohibition a majority of 758.

On the face of the returns from 954 out of 1070 election districts in Massachusetts, the Democrats won the state election on Tuesday, November 7. The returns gave Foss, Democrat, 187,553; Frothingham, Republican, 177,074.

It is announced that Queen Mary will devote the £65,000, subscribed by the Marys of the Empire as a Coronation gift, to the establishment of a home for working girls. This fund was partially subscribed by the women of Canada, who rejoice in the name of Mary.

Mr. N. W. Rowell, the new Liberal leader for the province of Ontario, has announced his policy and many reforms are promised for the people of that province. Mr. Rowell says regarding the liquor question, the party will consider the best form of legislation, and at the first general election this will be voted on.

The forty-third annual meeting of the Church of England Synod of New Brunswick, has been in session in the Church Hall, at Fredericton, this week. Seated on the platform were His Lordship the Bishop, Very Rev. Dean Schofield, Archdeacons Newnam, Forsyth, Hannington, Cowie and Neales and Chancellor Dr. T. C. Allen.

As a result of the criticism from his marrying Col. John Jacob Astor and Miss Madeline T. Force at Newport, on September 9, Rev. Joseph Lambert has resigned as pastor of the Elmwood Temple (Congregational) of Providence, R. I., and will leave the ministry and go into business.

Father of Three-Decker—Death Takes Francis Gallagher, Originator of Worcester Type Dwelling.

Francis Gallagher, aged 77 years, died yesterday morning in his home, 4 Plane street, of carcinoma. He was a contractor and builder during the 41 years of his residence in Worcester, and in the building trade he was known as the originator of the three-decker type dwelling. Houses on this style that he built in Worcester were the first of the kind and attracted widespread attention. Mr. Gallagher retired from business ten years ago. He was a member of the holy name sodality of St. John's church.

He is survived by his widow, Theresa (McElaney) Gallagher; two sons, Peter S., contractor and builder; James A., councilman from ward 4; seven daughters, Anna M., Agnes C., wife of William A. Brady; Helen Augusta, known in religion as Sister Loretta, superior of the Notre Dame convent, Chicopee; C. Louise, Mary F., Sarah L. and Gertrude M. Gallagher; five brothers, Michael, Peter, George, James and Daniel Gallagher, all living in Newburg, N. B.; two sisters, Catherine, wife of Thomas Ryan, and Sarah, widow of Thomas Ryan, both of Newburg, N. B.

The funeral will be Thursday morning, with a solemn high mass of requiem in St. John's church, at 9 o'clock.
