CAN THIS BE OTTAWA?

Question Arose When Advance Party of Duke Arrived at Old Station

Ottawa, Oct. 9.—Can this possibly be Ottawa, the capital city of Canada? gasped the advance guard of H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught's household, as their special train of three Pullman sleepers, d'ner, day coach, three baggage cars and express car were shunted into the yard at seven o'clock. The outlook from their train to the rows of shacks and dilapidated buildings in the vicinity of the yards was evidently not their expectation of what their home for the next few years should be, and they did not hesitate to express their views on the matter.

While the railway officials shunted the train into the yard they did so with the idea of making the haul for the baggage a short one to Rideau Hall, and did not consider the surroundings. The old station, which is nothing more than a disused shed looked anything but reassuring in the dim light of the evening to the new comers, and the train was pulled into the yards and shunted about for a time finally coming to a standstill on a siding.

There were twenty eight servants, and three aide-de-camps in the party which arrived at Montreal on Saturday morning by the steamer 'Victorian.' There was one baggage car of personal baggage, two cars of household baggage, and an express car containing two high power automobiles. There were 221 pieces of baggage in all, and about 450 additional pieces are expected with the Royal party when it arrives on Saturday.

THE NEW GOVERNMENT SWORN IN TUESDAY

Earl Grey Presented Each Minister with Bible—Dr. Daniel will Probably Retire in St. John County in Favor of Hon. Mr. Hazen

Ottawa, Oct. 10.—The Borden government was sworn in to office by the Governor General, Earl Grey, at noon today. The ceremony took place at Rideau Hall. Mr. Borden and his ministers drove to the place and were received by Earl Grey, who with his aide was waiting for them. The premier, Hon. R. L. Borden, took the oath of office first and Hon. George E. Foster, Judge Doherty, L. P. Pelletier, W. J. Roche, J. D. Reid, Sam Hughes, Martin Burrell, Reid, Sam Hughes, Martin Burrell, J. D. Hazen, Robert Rogers, F. D. Monk, Frank Cochrane, W. T. White, T. W. Crothers and Bruno Nantel took the oath first as members of the cabinet and a second oath for the portfolio they represent. Senator James A. Loughheed, A. E. Kemp and George H. Perley, being without portfolio, took the oath of office as members of the government. Following his custom Earl Grey presented to each of the eighteen ministers the Bible with which he was sworn.

Rodolphe Beaudreau, clerk of the Privy Council, was present and made an official record of the oath taking. After the ceremony Earl Grey congratulated the members of the new government and said good-bye to them. This is His Excellency's last official act as Governor General of Canada. This afternoon the new government held a cabinet meeting, which began at 3 o'clock, and was devoted chiefly to a discussion of the by-elections which will have to be held before the ministers can take seats in the House. The date of the opening of Parliament was also discussed. It is understood that by-election writs will be issued immediately. Dr. Daniel will, it is understood retire in St. John County to make an opening for Hon. J. D. Hazen to come in. David Henderson will probably retire in Halton to enable W. T. White the new Minister of Finance, to represent his native county. Mr. McKay will retire in Prince Albert to make a place for Hon. Robert Rogers. Parliament will be summoned for business on November 8 or 15, and the session will not go much beyond the thirty day period which will enable the supply for the current year out one.

It is said that possibly Dr. Roche will decide to leave the State Department for a place at the head of the Western section of the Railway Commission. This will enable Senator Loughheed to receive a portfolio for the Senate which is now without one. The new government is regarded as efficient if not brilliant. Mr. Foster and Mr. Borden can be classed as debaters of the first rank, and some of the others may develop in this under the pressure of work in the House and with the authority bench give. It is reported that the cabinet is not likely to be continued long with its present personnel and that some of the appointments are more or less tentative. It is stated that Hon. George E. Foster will eventually retire from the Trade and Commerce portfolio to become head of the permanent tariff commission which Mr. Borden is committed to give. When this is done Mr. A. E. Kemp will likely get the portfolio.

NEW BRUNSWICK APPLE SHOW

The second New Brunswick Apple show will be open in St. Andrew's rink, St. John, on Thanksgiving day, October, 30th, continuing for three days. Mr. A. G. Turney, the provincial horticulturist, stated that the fruit crop this year was much larger and of better quality than that of last year, and that business men generally are taking much larger interest in fruit growing than ever before. A company known as the St. John Fruit and Farmland Company, having a large property at Burton in Sunbury County, has made preparations to set out five thousand trees next spring, in addition to two thousand already planted. With the construction of the St. John Valley Railway it is expected that the orchard industry will receive a great impetus for it has been shown that every variety of apple which is successfully grown in the famous Annapolis Valley can be raised of equal appearance, quality and flavor in the valley of the St. John river.
