#### POISONED BY PAPER MONEY

Waltham, Mass., Oct. 9.—Poisoned from the handling of money caused the death here today of George H. Farnham, treasurer of the Waltham County Co-operative Bank.

#### Tripoli Will Not Be Recaptured

Tripoli, Oct. 10.—It is reported that three thousand Turks are twelve hours distant from here under Munir Pasha. It is thought probable that they are trying to reach Tunis.
