## ODDFELLOWS PARADE TO CHURCH

Eloquent and Powerful Sermon by the Rev. H. G. Kennedy. Makes Strong Plea for Christian Citizenship.

Following their regular custom of attending in a body Divine Service the Oddfellows of the town, headed by the Woodstock Band, marched to the Main St. Baptist Church last Sunday morning where the pastor, the Rev. H. G. Kennedy, delivered a strong and impressive sermon.

Before taking his text Mr. Kennedy addressed a few words to the Oddfellows present. The founders of the society had made a decree, that once each year, the members of each lodge should attend divine service in a body. It was not the intention of the founders of the society that the church on these occasions should do homage to the society, but that the society should do homage to the church. He would not preach to them alone, but as part of his congregation, who were there to worship God.

Mr. Kennedy took for his text Isaiah 55:1-2. Ho, everyone that thirsteth come ye to the waters, and he that hath no money; come ye, buy and eat, yea, come, buy wine and milk without money and without price. Wherefore do ye spend money for that which is not bread? and your labor for that which satisfieth not? Harken diligently unto me and eat ye that which is good and let your soul delight itself in fatness.

Mr. Kennedy then spoke in part as follows:

In the great centres of the east, on street corners and squares, were hundreds of men selling articles of every description, each crying out and lauding their wares to the passing throng. In ancient Palestine that land of thirst where the sun beat down on the burning sands, men became parched and must drink. Passing down the streets they became thirsty and in order to meet their needs there were water vendors everywhere, each crying out to the passers by. Some had water, another had wine, still another had milk. The thirsty would weigh out the price, quench their thirst and pass on. This was in the mind of the prophet when he said, "Ho everyone that thirsteth, come ye to the waters, without money and without price." He asks mankind to partake of the waters of life, without money and without price. I know of no more all comprehensive message. I have a reason for using the word all comprehensive. "Ho Everybody." Could any other message be so clearly understood by mankind. Could anymore expressive word than "Thirst" have been used. It would seem that there were many in this crowd satisfied. It would need a great spiritual X-ray to show the man who is satisfied. One is calloused, another indifferent, there are some who ignore the church. But in this message there is no race division, no social bars, no class distinction. It appeals to all. Thirst! Water to quench! Wine to gladden! and milk to nourish! They represent three great realms of the universe. Water the mineral life; wine from the juice of the rich ripe grapes represents vegetable; and milk the heart of animal life; all offered to every member of the universe. I am prepared to throw out this challenge; there is not a single individual here but what the gospel of Jesus Christ will satisfy. All comprehensive is the gospel because it furnishes a possible and uniform system. "Ho, ye, that have no money." The King receives the message; the scavenger receives the message; the prince in his palace and the pauper in his hovel hear the summons; all men must stand equal. I am glad there is a place where men find equality. The rich may come but must leave their wealth behind. There is nothing ever panned by man or inspired by God that is more

beautiful. To the man in the prime of life, to old age and youth, the message rings out, "Come Ye." Here we have the Gospel of Jesus Christ in all completeness. In the second place; The prophet is offering a gospel. There is another offer of another kind. The prophet says "Wherefore do you weigh money?" The thirsty have weighed out their money for water, and still their thirst is not satisfied, and they ask the prophet for drink "without money and without price." There are religions and religions. Some that have no God, but only God can satisfy the soul. In the early days the Jews were a religious people with their offering and incense. In the later days they proved to be the greatest people in the world to buy and barter. The change took place while they were in captivity in Babylon. Because God did not answer their prayers as soon as they desired, they drifted from their religion, they went bartering and buy-

## MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

A Movement to Restrict Autos on Saturday. Police to Strictly Enforce By-law.

The regular meeting of the Town Council was held Monday evening. All the members of the Board were present. The Treasurers report showed an overdraft at the bank of \$7054.24. Several members of the Council drew attention to the speeding of autos about town and also to the noise made by a juvenile inclination upon the part of one owner to continually blow the horn. The council as a whole were strongly opposed to the speeding of the machines and an order was passed that the police strictly enforce the law against speeding. Councillor Gallagher referred to the amount of auto driving around town on Saturday and said that the farmers were complaining that it was impossible for them to get into town on Saturday afternoon or evening. All the council did not agree with this and one remarked that over in Houlton where there are twelve autos to one here the Canadian farmers horses did not seem in the least bit afraid of

## SHOOTING AFFAIR MAY PROVE FATAL

William Bragdon Shoots Woodman McCluskey---Victim in Dying Condition.

Jealous of the attention he supposed was being paid his wife, William Bragdon drew a revolver and shot Woodman McCluskey through the bowels Wednesday evening about 9.30. Bragdon had been away from home and upon his return he found McCluskey sitting in the house talking to Mrs. Bragdon and her little child. Some words passed between the men and McCluskey got up and left. Bragdon followed and after a few words in the yard adjoining the house drew a revolver and fired a shot which entered below the stomach cutting off the intestines. McCluskey was taken to the Hospital and Dr. Rankin at once began a search for the bullet but was not successful. At the time of going to press there is little hope of McCluskey's recovery.

Bragdon surrendered himself to Chief Kelly and has been lodged in jail.

At 4 p. m. Thursday McCluskey was still alive but his death is looked for at any minute.

### THE WORK IS CUT OUT.

Taking the country through, probably more than half of both parties are in favor of reciprocity with Canada and considerable changes in the tariff schedules, if they can be made in a judicious way. The lines are not going to be newly drawn during the extra session, and it is a poor time for seeking to make party capital. There are no national elections this year and no direct issue can be made with effect. It is not an appropriate time for renewing the agitation and no useful result would be obtained by it. A long and costly session is of itself undesirable and will prove to be unpopular. Nothing is to be gained by it for the party responsible, and the very best thing Congress could do would be to dispose of the business recommended to it by the President and adjourn.

### 'UNTIL OUR DICK COMES'

Victorians will look forward with pleasure to the visit of R. L. Borden during the coming summer. We are always glad to receive visits from the wise men of the East. While Mr. Borden does not represent every section of the Conservative party in Canada, he is still the acknowledged leader, and the prospects are that he will continue to hold that position until such time as our own Richard decides to enter Dominion politics. When that time arrives of course Mr. Borden will be expected to step aside.

The contract for printing the special issue of Canadian postage stamps to be known as the coronation issue, has been awarded to the American Bank Note Company, and it is expected that they will be distributed throughout the country by June 3rd, the King's birthday. These stamps will be double the size of the ordinary postage stamps, and only a limited number will be printed, as in the case of the Quebec tercentenary stamps. The new two-cent stamp for ordinary use, bearing the head of the new King, will not be ready for some time.

The multitudinous details connected with the Coronation of King George and Queen Mary at Westminster Abbey on June 22nd has been practically settled.

It was decided to have a delegation from the council attend to gather information After a discussion regarding some improvement to the fire alarm system the Council adjourned until tonight.

The New South Wales Government preliminary estimate for the season of 1910-11, indicates that 2,599,000 acres will yield 27,709,000 bushels of wheat and 472,000 tons of hay. The wheat, it is estimated, will average 2.39 bushels above the yield for the last five years.

The Budget committee of the Russian Duma has approved the grant of \$75,000,000 for the construction of warships and naval works for the Black Sea.
