LIBERAL GOVERNMENT DEFEATED CARVELL WINS IN CARLETON

CARVELL WON A HARD FIGHT

Defeated B. Frank Smith—
Woodstock's Grand Reception to Carleton County's Representative

Frank B. Carvell, Liberal candidate, was returned by a majority of seventeen over B. Frank Smith, of the opposition. As early as 7 o'clock in the morning electors crowded round the buildings in which the polls were located and from that time until the returns were in the interest never abated.

The opposition workers were well "heeled" with the necessary goods but the popularity of the Liberal candidate, with the splendid organization of the Liberal association, turned the trick and B. Frank Smith, he of the "lively corpse" story, is in a position to attend to his private business for some years to come.

The fight has been keenly contested throughout the whole campaign but in spite of fake stories and absurd canvasses used by his opponents Mr. Carvell emerged from the battle with a majority.

Mr. Carvell arrived from up river late in the afternoon. When the returns were posted and it became known that the popular candidate had been returned deafening cheers arose from the thousands who crowded the streets and when Mr. Carvell appeared he was lifted to the shoulders of some of his followers and carried through the streets to his office, where in a brief speech he thanked the electors for their support.

At nine o'clock a monster torch-light procession formed, headed by the Woodstock band, and paraded Main Street to the square, where Mr. Carvell spoke for ten minutes to a delighted audience. The parade then formed up and marched to Mr. Carvell's residence, where thousands of people were waiting and huge bonfires burning. All along the route crowds filled the sidewalks and streets, leaving but a narrow passage for the parade to pass through, and the people cheered themselves hoarse as the barouche containing the popular member passed along. It was a demonstration the like of which had never before been seen in Carleton County, and clearly showed that Mr. Carvell, despite the venomous and vindictive attacks of his opponents is still the people's favorite.

HOULTON SUFFERS AGAIN FROM FIRE

NEST OF LITTLE WOODEN BUILDINGS DESTROYED; LOSS OVER \$20,000.

HOULTON, Me., Sept. 19.—A fire alarm was rung in from box 23 Monday morning for a fire in Mrs. O'Brien's residence on Smyrna street, which caught from a spark on the roof. It is estimated that the damage would amount to about \$500. At 1.30 p. m. Monday another fire alarm was rung in from box 34 for a fire which started in a nest of little wooden buildings back of Lane & Pierce's store. This is one of the fire traps which Houlton possesses and which are being gradually burned down. These buildings were used as store-houses by the various firms on the south side of Market square and the spaces around and between them have for years been littered with straw and paper, making an ideal fire trap. At the time the fire started there was a brisk northwest wind blowing, and before the firemen got there the blaze had spread in and around the little buildings so that about ten minutes after the fire started it looked as if Houlton was in for another big conflagration. This nest of buildings, consisting of stores occupied by the West End Drug store, Frank Blithen, jeweller; S. Newhouse, clothing, and G. A. Hall, carriages and harnesses were grouped in such a manner that it was impossible for the firemen to get

around them, but the blaze was stopped at the alley way between G. A. Hall's and Clark's hotel. The loss of property is estimated at \$20,000 to \$30,000.

Amos Putman, who is one of the firemen, was hurt quite badly at the fire Monday afternoon by falling through the floor, a distance of about 12 feet. No bones were broken, and it is thought that in a few days he will be fully recovered. Chas. McClusky, another fireman, had his finger cut quite badly, necessitating the service of a physician.

HON. DR. PUGSLEY SPEAKS OF RESULT

Considers Defeat of Sir Wilfrid Laurier a National Calamity -- Gratifying Results in New Brunswick

Speaking to a Telegraph reporter last night Hon. Mr. Pugsley said of the result of the elections. "Under all the circumstances and particularly in view of the anti-imperialistic and anti-Canadian policy of the Nationalists in Quebec, I regard the defeat of Sir Wilfrid Laurier as a national calamity."

"Speaking for myself, I have nothing to say in addition to what I said in the Queen's rink, that I have no regret on personal grounds that I should be obliged to give up my position in the government, because it is one of arduous labor."

"I only trust that my successor, whoever he may be, will continue the policy which the government has been pursuing, of improving the transportation facilities of the country and that the work of developing the harbor of St. John, which is a part of this policy, will be carried forward as vigorously as it was my intention to do."

"The results in New Brunswick are very gratifying because, while some most excellent men like Mr. Todd, Dr. McAlister, Mr. Lowell, Dr. Atherton and Mr. Leger have gone down to defeat, it is gratifying that the province has, by a majority of three members, sustained the government's policy."

THE SITUATION AT OTTAWA

Ottawa, Sept. 21.—The capital, to say the least, is decidedly astonished at the Liberal landslide. The local result was not altogether unexpected, especially in view of the noticeable anti-reciprocity feeling developed during the past few days through the fears aroused among the laboring classes that reciprocity would increase the cost of living but probably no Conservative in the city anticipated anything like so sweeping a victory for Mr. Borden.

The Liberals in the city are frankly non-plused and the only explanation offered is that the annexation bogey, the cry of "let well enough alone" and the long fostered distrust of American aggression had considerably more weight with the electorate than could reasonably have been expected, in view of the real issue at stake.

It is, of course, too early to prophesy as to what will be the immediate future of the party in parliament. It may be noted, however, that at the last Liberal caucus prior to dissolution it was the unanimous opinion of the members, in the event of a defeat at the polls, that the party could not go out of power on a better issue.

It has been a defeat with colors flying and with no disgrace attached. The landslide is as great as that of 1896 but the conditions are entirely different and the issue of free trade is by no means dead.

Sir Wilfrid and his cabinet are expected back in Ottawa at the end of the week and will, of course, follow the usual course of remaining in office until the accumulated arrears of departmental business have been cleared up.

Pending the premier's return nothing can be said as to his plans or as to the probability of arrangements being made for the return to parliament of any of the defeated ministers.
