### 'TIS A FINE RECORD.

There have been nine administrations in Canada since Confederation. The names of the ministries and the length of time they lasted were as follows:

- 1—Right Honorable Sir J. A. Macdonald, Premier. From July 1st, 1867, to November 6th, 1873, (6 years, 96 days.)
- 2—Honorable A. Mackenzie, Premier. From November 7th, 1873, to October 16th, 1879, 5 years, 312 days.)
- 3—Right Honorable Sir J. A. Macdonald, Premier. From October 17th, 1879, to June 6th, 1891 (11 years 229 days.)
- 4—Honorable Sir J. J. C. Abbott, Premier. From June 16th, 1891, to December 5th, 1892 (1 year, 71 days.)
- 5—Honorable Sir J. Thompson, Premier. From December 5th, 1892, to December 12th, 1894 (2 years, 7 days.)
- 6—Honorable Sir M. Bowell, Pre-

mier. From December 21st, 1894, to April 27th, 1896 (1 year, 127 days.)

7—Honorable Sir C. Tupper, Bart., Premier. From May 1st, 1896, to July 8th, 1896 (69 days.)

8—Right Honorable Sir Wilfrid Laurier, July 11th, 1896, to October 3rd, 1911 (15 years, 77 days.)

9—Honorable R. L. Borden, Premier. October 10, 1911.

The ministry of Sir Wilfrid Laurier holds the record for unbroken length of rule. It likewise goes into Canadian history with the record of achievements in the country's interest and with the record of growth and progress in wealth, population, agriculture, mining, manufacturing, commerce, and, in fact, in every department of human effort. Canada is doing very well, and Sir Wilfrid's Government has set a good mark.

## NEW YORK "GIANTS" BANQUET- TED BY ADMIRING FRIENDS

BAKER, IN THE SHAPE OF A WHITE ELEPHANT, WAS INTRODUCED TO ENLIVEN PROCEEDINGS.

New York, Oct. 28.—A big white elephant stalked across Broadway in the white light district tonight and crowded its way into a hotel dining room, where the New York baseball "Giants" were being given a complimentary dinner.

It was only a ghost of a beast manufactured and stuffed with men from a nearby theatre, but was so realistic even the police were for a moment deceived. The elephant was introduced to the Giants as "Baker" the home run maker who was a hero of the recent Philadelphia victory in the world series.

A number of other odd features marked the dinner. Twenty two waiters dressed in the New York baseball costumes served at the table, and motion pictures were thrown on a screen depicting the first game of the world's series. A special song written by "Big Bill" Edwards, the former Princeton all star, who is now street cleaning commissioner, was sung by a colored quartette, mentioning each player by name.

## MONK, NANTEL, PELLETIER AND "IMPERIAL DRUNKENNESS"

(Halifax Chronicle.)

No one is likely to accuse Mr. J. Castell Hopkins of being a Liberal. It is from his Canadian Annual Review that the following description of a characteristic speech by MR. MONK is taken: The Review asserts that it was made at Montreal in 1909 "with the endorsement of Senator A. C. P. Landry, W. B. NANTEL, M. P. (who is included in the Borden Cabinet), and J. M. Teller, Opposition leader in the Legislature." Here is the Review's summary:

"MR. MONK described the cost of the navy as being at present beyond Canada's means because of expensive and necessary public works; denounced the excessive cost of naval construction, and estimated a modest navy for Canada at \$50,000,000; declared a Canadian Navy to be useless, and Canada UNDER NO OBLIGATION TO DEFEND OTHER PARTS OF THE EMPIRE; stated that a military or naval consolidation of the Empire would be fatal to the principle of self-government, and described the words of those who eulogized the greatness of the Empire as 'IMPERIAL DRUNKENNESS.'"

Speaking at Montmagny, some days after the election, the HON. L. P. PELLETIER, another of Mr. Borden's new Ministers, delivered the following threat on behalf of the anti-navy party:

"We shall have a referendum on the marine question. I am sure Mr. Borden will carry out this promise that he made. We have been elected on the ground that the Canadian people would have a navy only, if the majority was willing to have it, and if the men now in possession of the power neglect to carry out this article of our programme, WE SHALL TAKE MEANS TO HAVE IT CARRIED."

Messrs. Nantel, Monk and Pelletier have carried their point. They have been given high places in the Borden Cabinet. It remains to be seen how and when they will press their demands. As to this Mr. Bourassa, the Nationalist leader, has given us more than a hint. Mr. Bourassa has been powerful enough to persuade, if not to force, Mr. Borden to give three of the most important portfolios to men who followed Mr. Bourassa in fighting Sir Wilfrid Laurier because of the support the latter gave to Empire defence. Now he comes forward to announce in words which seem to carry a veiled threat that Mr. Borden will make his pledge and submit the naval question to a plebiscite. This will be humiliating and cowardly, but what can Mr. Borden do? Mr. Bourassa was able to

## MURRAY C. UPHAM DEAD

Well-Known Printer and Prominent in Many Societies Passed Away at His Roxbury Home

Murray C. Upham, a well known and highly respected printer, died at his home, 26 Holborn St., Roxbury, early this morning.

He was a member of the Franklin Typographical Society, Boston Typographical Union 13, and was the first vice president of the Boston Central Labor Union. He was also a member of the Masonic and Odd Fellows' organizations.

Murray C. Upham was born in Woodstock, N. B. Dec. 25th, 1849. He attended the common schools, and also spent two terms at the private school of Rev. Charles G. Glass.

He entered the printing business in the office of the Woodstock Times in 1863. After the suspension of the paper he entered the office of the Carleton Sentinel in Woodstock and served an apprenticeship of four and one-half years. In the spring of 1868 he became publisher of the Woodstock Arcadian, which suspended business in August of the same year.

Mr. Upham then came to Massachusetts and obtained a situation on the Lawrence Eagle. In the spring of 1870 he came to Boston and went to work in the office of Alfred Mudge & Son on School St., remaining there seven years with the exception of a few months at A. M. Lunt's and the Living age. He afterward worked two years at Wright & Potter's and about the same time on the Boston Post.

He then worked on the Herald 1½ years and when the Boston Republic was started in 1882 he became foreman of that paper, where he remained until after the death of Mr. Patrick Maguire. He was a proof-reader at the Municipal Plant until about two years ago when he had to resign on account of failing health.—Boston Globe.

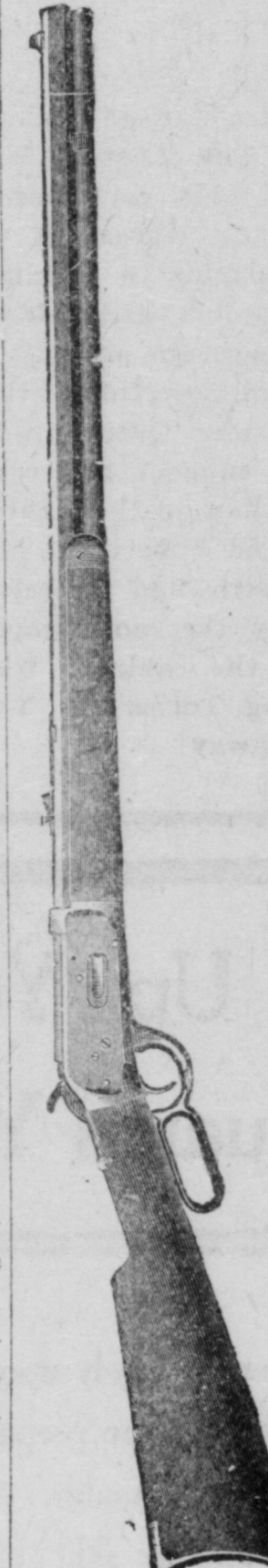
