## VALLEY RAILWAY PLAN AGREED ON

### Conference Tuesday Shows the Way is Clear

It Will be Constructed From St. John to Grand Falls and Operated by the Intercolonial--Federal and Provincial Governments Must First Endorse Agreement

A further conference was held this morning by Hon. J. K. Flemming, Hon. John Morrissy and Hon. Robert Maxwell, members of the provincial government, with Hon. Wm. Fualey, minister of public works, in reference to the St. John Valley Railway.

An earnest effort was made on both sides to arrive at an understanding which might ensure the early construction of the line, and while full details of what was agreed to have not been given out, by reason of it being necessary that each of the parties to the conference should first submit the matter to their respective colleagues, the Times is authorized to state that, if the conclusions reached are approved by their respective governments, there is a certainty of the early commencement of construction of the valley line to extend all the way from St. John to Grand Falls, to be operated by the federal government as part of the Intercolonial system.

Certain modifications of the standard of construction have been agreed to, but the line will be first class in every particular. Approval of these modifications will be sought from the provincial legislature and federal parliament respectively, and will no doubt be readily granted.

The question of constructing the necessary bridge across the St. John River at Andover and near the Mistake (so called) as well as across the Kennebecasis between Perry Point and Gondola Point, which will be expensive structures, was fully discussed and it is hoped that a conclusion has been reached in regard to these which will be approved by the respective governments and legislatures.

It is understood that arrangements will be made for running rights to other companies on terms to be mutually agreed upon, or in case of disagreement to be settled by the Board of Railway Commissioners of Canada.

After Dr. Pugsley has conferred with the minister of railways, it is understood that there will be a further conference in Ottawa when it is hoped the matter, including the terms of the agreement for lease to the federal government, will be definitely closed.

### REV. DR. CAMPBELL WILL OCCUPY A DUAL POSITION

To Be Acting Principal of Mt Allison Ladies' College in Connection with Other Duties—Another Professor Appointed.

Sackville, N. B., June 13.—The Hart A. Massey chair of philosophy in the Mount Allison University, made vacant by the resignation of Dr David Allison, has been filled by the appointment of Prof P. L. Given, who comes very highly recommended both as regards scholarship and general fitness for the position.

Prof Given graduated from Wesleyan College, Middletown, Conn) in 1909, standing high in his classes and taking several prizes, including a prize in philosophy and psychology. He had had three years of German, two years post graduate study at Harvard, where he has already passed the preliminaries for the degree of Ph D and he is regarded as a young man of much promise, thoroughly competent scholar and one who should prove a most successful teacher. In addition to taking classes in philosophy, logic and psychology, Prof Given will teach classes in German.

Dr G M Campbell, St. John, in addition to being professor of homiletics to Mount Allison University and being associated with Dr Borden in connection with forward movement, will occupy, during the present year, the position of acting principal of the Ladies' College.

### WOODSTOCK DISTRICT CONFERENCE

The Woodstock district of the Methodist church met in annual session at Debec Junction on Tuesday and Wednesday last, under the chairmanship of the Rev R W Weddall. This district extends from Grand Falls and Plaster Rock to Canterbury, including nine circuits with ten members.

Satisfactory reports of the year's work were rendered from all these charges. Rev George Ayers, of Jacksonville, was elected, in company with the chairman, to represent the district on the stationing committee at the approaching conference to be held in St John during the present week.

The district pronounced itself in an emphatic manner upon the questions of church union and the sacredness of the marriage tie by the following resolutions carried unanimously:

"Resolved, that inasmuch as certain proceedings have taken place within this dominion in regard to the annulment of the sacred obligations involved in the marriage contract, thereby threatening the home life of our nation, and inasmuch as the enforcement of the 'Ne Temere' decree must necessarily prove detrimental and destructive to the national life, wrecking homes, causing separations and imposing the awful burden of disgrace upon innocent women and children, we, the members of the Woodstock district, gathered in annual session, most emphatically utter our protest against the application of the Ne Temere decree in this dominion and call for its immediate withdrawal and furthermore ask for legislation enactment to grant a uniform marriage law for use in the entire dominion."

### A BANQUET TO HON. MR. COSTIGAN

Friends to Honor the 50th Anniversary of His Entry Into Politics.

DATE IS JUNE 20

Hon. Wm. Pugsley will be Present—Minister of Public Works Will Later Address Meeting at Andover Along With Hon. C. W. Robinson.

The friends of Hon Senator Costigan are tendering him a banquet at St Basil on Tuesday evening, June 20, in honor of the 50th anniversary of his entry into politics.

Among those invited to this interesting gathering is Hon Wm Pugsley, minister of public works, and he has signified his intention to be present. Dr Pugsley will leave St John for St Basil on Tuesday morning and returning will find an opportunity of joining Hon C W Robinson at Andover, where the electors of Victoria county will assemble Wednesday evening to hear the public issues of the day discussed.

The local members for Victoria county have also arranged with Hon C W Robinson to address a meeting at Plaster Rock on Tuesday evening. There has been a very energetic Liberal association recently formed in this flourishing centre of Victoria County, of which Archibald Fraser is the president and F A Kirkpatrick the secretary, and the members of this body and the electors generally will no doubt give the Liberal leader of the opposition an enthusiastic reception.

### LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

MR EDITOR,—Having visited a great number of towns throughout the province of New Brunswick and having made inquiries concerning the civic matters of said towns I have failed thus far to find a town where the cost of running is as high according to the population, as Woodstock. Nor have I found a town where the public streets and sidewalks are in such a disgraceful state as in Woodstock and where the citizens are allowed such infringements on the town streets.

I am not going to mention all the streets, but let us commence, say, at the bridge and continue down King Street. As a business street it is slovenly and untidy. Passing up Richmond street I find near the laundry edgings piled indiscriminately, occupying part of the sidewalk, and slab wood on the street, and it has been so since last spring and on the opposite side a grove of burdock occupying the outer edges of the broken asphalt sidewalk, while there are old cans, bottles and shoes strewn everywhere. Passing up the lower end of Chapel street from Richmond past the post office the street is kept in a most untidy state. Then take Main street from the bridge up. The edges of the sidewalk and gutters are filled with paper. Going up Albert street some of the residents keep the sidewalk and street clean in front of their homes, but here again the town is at fault as there are tin cans, shoes, bottles and things beyond mention. Up Victoria street the sidewalk is in a most disgraceful state, the residents try to brush up and keep clean but there is a big job for the Supt of street, and has been there for two years. Green street looks very fair but we venture to hope the grass will be cut before coronation day. Some residents of Chapel and Orange streets have brushed up near their residences, but the town team could make quite an improvement there also. Going down Queen street on Sunday I found the sidewalks littered with banana peel, fire crackers, waste paper, etc, and a very unsavory odour coming out of some places. Now Mr Editor would it not be commendable on the part of the town council and its mayor and aldermen to get a move on in this matter and clean up, repair the sidewalks, and compel some of the slovenly citizens to act accordingly without delay, so that when strangers visit our town we can show them around without having to tumble over piles of slabs and waste matter on some of our principal streets.
