TORY FARMER OUT FOR RECIPROCITY

Ontario Conservative Tells How His Party Has Left Its Principles — He Will Support the Liberal Cause This Time — What He Thinks of the Arguments Against Reciprocity—Where Britain Buys Army Supplies—Does That Effect British Loyalty?

Writing in the Canadian Farm, a paper published in Ontario, Mr. William McDermott, of Beaton, Ontario, discusses the Reciprocity Agreement from a Conservative farmer's point of view. Here is what he has to say, and it will well repay the reading of it:

Reciprocity in natural products with the United States—it would be well for every citizen, especially every farmer of Canada, before recording his vote, to sit down and carefully consider this very important question from a business standpoint, and refuse to be misled by party cries and party names.

Now what is reciprocity? Its meaning is simply equal rights or benefits mutually yielded or enjoyed by two countries trading together.

It is well known that for many years both the great political parties in Canada tried in vain time and again to negotiate a similar trade agreement to the one passed on the part of the United States. Every proposal made by the representatives of Canada was rejected by the United States, and, owing to the popular opinion, those missions going hat in hand to Washington begging for favors, had to cease, much to the gratification of all self-respecting Canadians.

The writer has for half a century taken a more or less active part in politics, and has during that time supported the Conservative party, not because all their acts could be condoned or defended, but for the historical fact that all, or nearly all, of the great measures and most beneficial legislation for uniting and developing this young but great Dominion was the work of the leaders and followers of that party; and I regret to state, that in common with many of those who have been designated as the old stalwart Conservatives, we feel humiliated owing to the present attitude of the once great Conservative party which always heretofore had some policy to present that could be endorsed by the electors.

Their present policy, so far as the farmer is concerned, seems to be akin to that of the old church elder, who at the induction of a new minister prayer earnestly that the Lord would make the minister humble and he himself would take care that the congregation would keep him poor. In a word the great Conservative party seem to be like sheep without a shepherd. They have ample material with which to build a platform on which the party could unite, by showing up the extravagance and maladministration of the Laurier Government without this purely obstructive opposition to reciprocity, especially as they offer nothing better as an alternative.

It is simply disgusting to read the speeches and newspaper editorials condemning this reciprocity agreement. Not a single one of them but on a few months' reflection by a person of ordinary common sense, would be reduced to rags and tatters having no foundation in fact. Perhaps at first thought one might be impressed by the argument that prices for farm produce in certain lines are higher in Canada than in the United States; but a moment's thought will convince one that we have at present, and have had for some time, abnormal conditions in Canada. For instance, last summer, we had a great failure of crops in the southern and best settled parts of the western provinces, which caused the farmers to dispose of their cattle, hogs, and in fact, even their brood mares at a great sacrifice, as they had no fodder to carry them through the winter. This has caused high prices and a great demand all this season for meats of all kinds, in fact, beef, pork, and mutton are,

and have been for several months, as high in price, and sometimes higher, in Winnipeg than in Montreal. But this state of things is only temporary; moreover, the rapidity with which the towns have developed in the many districts in Northern Ontario has been an important factor in increasing the demand for meats, and bread stuffs, but no one can say how long that will continue.

A factor which materially increases the demand for and value of horses is the enormous amount of railway construction now in full swing in Canada. At the present time no less than 6,000 miles are being surveyed and under construction, but in the natural order of things this cannot last long.

Now, anyone conversant with prices under normal conditions knows that prices for farm produce are almost invariably higher in the United States than in Canada.

As to the loyalty and annexation cry, it is simply a gross insult to the people of Canada, for deep down in the hearts of Canadians is a feeling of love and devotion to British laws and British institutions that impels them to scorn the tase insinuation that they would sell their birthright for Yankee dollars.

Another cry that trade will be diverted is none the less nonsensical, as every one knows that trade will flow in the most profitable channels; and why should the farmer or any one else be deprived of the privilege of selling his produce in the best market or buying in the cheapest?

When Great Britain wants a supply of meat to feed her giant army or navy she generally gets supplied by the great Chicago abattoirs. Does that make Canadians any less loyal to Great Britain or the Yankees less loyal to the United States? When she wants remounts for her cavalry or artillery she obtains them in the cheapest market, and is commended instead of condemned by every true British subject.

But Mr. Borden and his disciples "out Herod, Herod" in their fanatical imperialism. They have nothing better to offer the farmers and yet they oppose free trade in natural products; and if they had their way, would deprive the farmer of a choice of market simply because the arrangement was negotiated by a party in power. It reminds me of the old Scotch story.—A very good Presbyterian Scotch lady and her daughter were passed on the way to church by a Methodist minister driving rapidly. "Oh," exclaimed the old lady, "I would nae gie much for that man's religion. A merciful man is merciful to his beast." Before reaching the kirk they were passed by their own minister driving more furiously than the Methodist. "Ah! Mither," said the daughter, "what do you think of that driving?" The old lady exclaimed "God bless the guid man, his heart's in his work. He's hurrying to get there." Now it is the opinion of many Conservatives that if this trade agreement had been made by the Conservatives it would have been heralded over Canada as a master stroke of statesmanship, with probably a day set apart annually to commemorate the taking down of the Yankee tariff wall.

I fear this is already too great a trespass on your space, and will close by a brief reference to another puerile argument against this trade pact, namely, that the Yankees are only seeking to exploit Canada. This "bugaboo" doubtless was originated by our own exploiters, as they do not want competition in their exploits. Our Canadian meat packers, and many other classes of high financiers have been exploiting our farmers and piling up their 100 per cent. dividends and accumulating their
