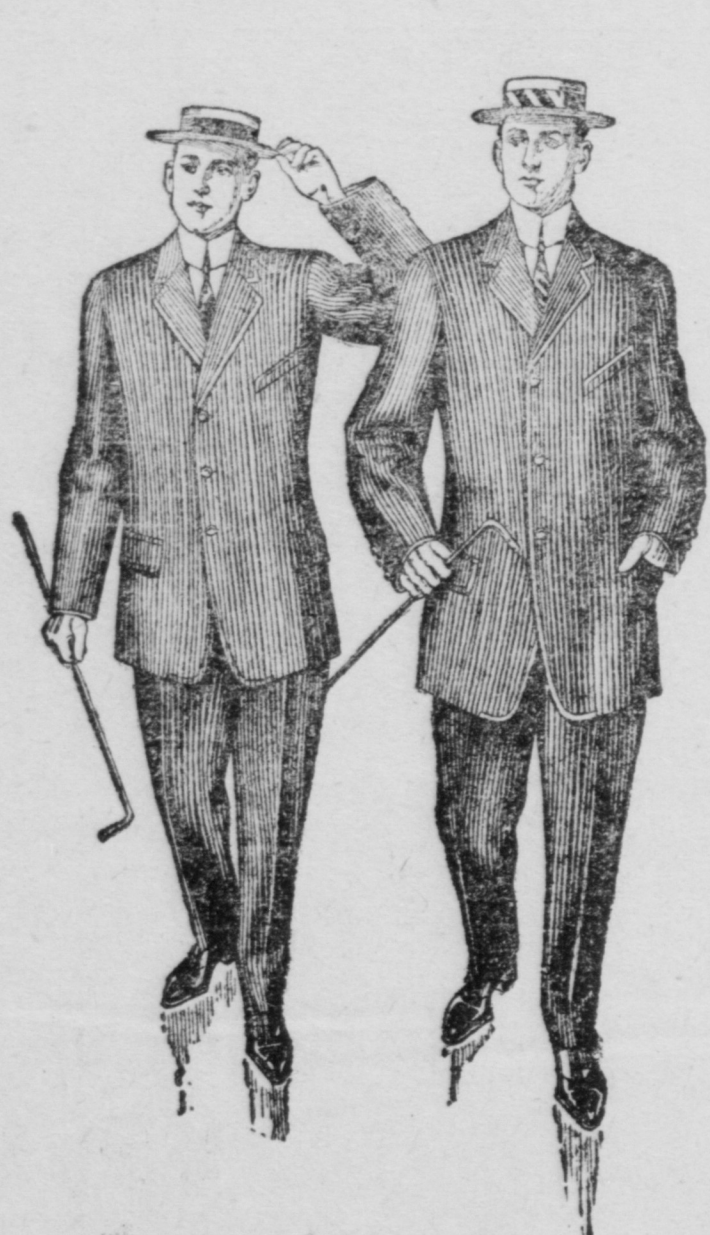

SHALL WE LOSE CANADA

Sir Alfred Mond On the Attacks On Reciprocity By the British Tariff Reformer

At the annual meeting of the Free Trade Union held in London last month, the following resolution was adopted: "This meeting affirms its unwavering belief in Free Trade as the chief cause of the increasing commerce of Great Britain, and condemns the policy of Tariff 'Reform,' now three times rejected by the nation, as a grave menace to employment and prosperity, a direct attack upon the poorest tax payer of this country, and an unwarrantable interference with Colonial freedom."

Sir Alfred Mond in seconding the resolution made reference to the Canadian situation in these terms:

On a poster today in Victoria street I saw the legend, "Shall we lose Canada?" First, I would like to point out that Canada is not to be lost. Canada is neither to be lost or won. It is part of the British Empire, as firmly a part as the Isle of Wight and I tell you as the result of my visit to Canada that the people there resent bitterly that this libel should be used with regard to themselves, that they are to be won or lost, that they are to be bribed or cajoled, inhabited by a most virile race, whose affection to the Mother Country is deep and sincere, and they will be neither deluded nor cajoled into doing anything they don't want to do. And that is the mistake the Tariff Reformers always make. They think these great dominions are back yards to Great Britain, a dumping ground for the goods no one else will buy, to be kept in a ring fence to buy from us what we don't want. If anyone is so foolish or so mad as to imagine that it would be possible at any time to induce the Canadian Government to enter into any form of treaty which would deter the Canadian people from making treaties with France or the United States or any other great power that they think in their interests, they are deluding themselves and following a will-o'-the-wisp.

THE LOYALTY OF CANADA.

Canada today is loyal to us through affection. Canada will pursue as she has pursued in the past, the policy of reducing her duties by increasing her preference with us; but do not let us imagine that Canada at any time will be willing to let go out of her hands the free economic developments of that great country, which is still in its infancy, in any kind of reciprocal bargain. If any such bargain is made it will be an evil thing for this country and a still more evil thing for the connection. What is implied in the bargain? It means that you will raise in this country the price of food and of living to the poorest part of the community. You will protect the interests of the great empire with dearer bread and dearer meat, and subject the country always to agitation and at times to distress and to feelings of resentment and bitterness. Such an arrangement, if it should be made, will be a continual and fretting link such as Preference was when we abolished it in 1846. Let me take a picture on the other side. Take the farmers of Canada. You say to the farmers of Canada. "You are never to be allowed in the future to buy your agricultural implements cheaply from the United States by keeping the duty down. You will never be in a position to get the best market you can for your produce in America or anywhere else. You are tied in your actions, and whatever you want to do you cannot do it." Such a bond would lead to exactly the same results as when we had our previous experience. This is not new; it is old. We had the whole system in operation in 1836, and the Blue Book reporting the proceeding, of the Committee of the House of Commons in 1840 is very interesting to us today. Both in Canada and Great Britain far from linking us together, these attempts to benefit sections of the community were merely increasing the discontent of such.

COLONIAL COMMERCIAL FREEDOM.

In the last phrase the resolution before us refers to the "unwarrantable interference with Colonial freedom." I have been endeavoring to point out to you that this tariff arrangement would not only interfere with the Colonial freedom of trade, but with the fundamental principles of our whole imperial community in the Empire to frame its own system of taxation, to levy its own taxes, and to vary them whenever they wish. It is most important to remember, and I have never seen it pointed out, that this scheme, which has been so much belauded mistakenly as the bond of union, would strike at the root of our whole Imperial system, which consists in every part of the Empire making and revising its taxes whenever it wants to. The one fundamental fact is that taxation is the function of each individual state, and liberty in taxation is the greatest liberty of the British subject. Any freedom which impairs in the slightest degree that principle is bound to fail.

Mr. William Jennings Bryant Commends the Canadian Government Annuities Scheme

A prophet is without honor in his own country. As with prophets, so it is with the natural advantages which a country enjoys, and those acquired advantages which are obtained under its laws and customs—it often needs the eye of the outsider to discover the striking benefits of some institution with which the people are blessed.

The earnest tribute paid to the Canadian Government Annuities system by Mr. William Jennings Bryant during his address to the citizens of Galt on Friday last should do much to determine the question for those who have not yet taken advantage of the system, the opinion coming, as it does, from one who has made the social problem a life's study. He is reported to have said: "I have been trying for years to figure out a similar scheme for the benefit of the citizens of the United States, and I cannot understand why every civilized country does not follow the lead of Canada and encourage the people to put something by for the day when they will be too old to work. This is true co-operative government," he added. While other countries have established pension schemes, which are but extensions of Poor Law Relief, the result of which is to pauperize, and not to stimulate thrift, the Canadian Government has, by its Annuities Act, inaugurated a scheme whereby thrift is promoted, and the people are provided with facilities which will enable them to help themselves and at the same time preserve their self-respect and dignity.

The hills of Great Britain will blaze with bonfires on Coronation night. At 10 o'clock the fires will burst forth from the Scottish Highlands to Cornwall. Mountains and hills and village eminences are to be the scene of a fiery acclamation of the crowning of the King. There will be few parts of the country from which at least one fire cannot be seen. At the coronation of King Edward 1,630 bonfires were lit.

The Times says:—It is understood that Lord Mount Stephen has offered to give ten thousand pounds towards the institution of a pension fund for ministers of the church of Scotland on condition that nine others contribute the same sum.

To the Canadian Mounted troops, under the command of Lieut. Colonel Hugh H. McLean, M. P. of St. John, will be appointed the highest military honor of the coronation pageant. This will be the furnishing of the personal escort to His Majesty as he rides through the line of 60,000 soldiers and marines from all parts of the Empire, the day after Coronation.

A movement started two years ago resulted in the organization, in Boston, last week of the Scottish Historical Society of North America. The object of the Society is the collecting and preserving of historical data relating to the achievements of men of Scottish birth or blood of the North American Continent.
