GOOD FRIDAY.

It has been said that "coming events cast their shadow before." This was never more true than in the events leading up to the tragedy of the Cross. A sensitive nature feels the forecast of experiences and the conscious soul is in a degree influenced by these things. In a marked degree was this evident in the life of Jesus immediately previous to the day of his death. He knew that his journey to Jerusalem would mark the full tide of human wrath and work out the glorious, yet inglorious, completion of his work. He knew that every step of his journey to Jerusalem was a step toward death—a death resulting from the combination of human passions and sin. He could feel the waves of envy, of narrow petty jealousy as they rolled over his sensitive soul. He could feel the anger of men as it rose in their breast against the One whom they thought had usurped their privileges and drawn the people from them. He could not help but know that these men, to whom power was dearer than life, would stop at nothing to quench forever the fire of love and devotion for this Man of Nazareth which was fast growing in the heart of the people.

Yet in spite of the consciousness of all the gathering cloud of hatred and malice this Man proceeds calmly—yes with added dignity to His last days in Jerusalem. What must have been the thoughts passing through his mind on that eventful Palm Sunday and what his secret meditation during that last feast in Jerusalem? But whatever may have been his word he went on to meet the storm, to face the tempest, knowing that only in this way would the deep dark power of sin be fully revealed to the world.

And it is characteristic of the Manhood of Jesus that he did not ask one favour of his enemies nor in any way dodge the issue before him. It was for this hour he had come into the world. "Without the shedding of blood there could be no remission." The full enormity of unrestricted passion, and unleashed sin could only be revealed as that power burst in its awful fury upon an innocent victim.

The strength of sin can only be grasped when one sees its determin-

ation during the trial and judgment of Jesus. In all that vast throng he stood there defenceless. He heard their sick, had given them back their dead, yet in face of that storm of hatred no one stood with him, even his judge, though conscious of his innocence, hands him, in fear, over to his accusers.

Yet how noble, how great looms the figure of Jesus. The lesson could only be taught the people by his death—and by his conquest. The full revulsion at this wanton act could only come by the sight of the cross—the full deliverance through its exalted victim.

What a lesson this Son of God would teach the world. The world can not be saved by platitudes. Savvity and smooth sayings will not bring conquest. As though forced by a hand of fate Jesus went to his death—yet it was something stronger than fate that led him on. It was a loyalty to his brethren and to his Father's command.

It is still true that man can only save their life by losing it. It is equally as true, life is the product of death and the salvation of the world will only be achieved by struggle—struggle in which men shall travail in soul. Passionate and imperative on this Holy Day comes the voice from the Cross—it calls to service and to sacrifice, to pain and even death that the work begun so long ago on the cross may ever continue.

MINISTERS AND POLITICS.

Speaking at a meeting for men only in St. John last Sunday, the Rev. J. W. Aikens, Secretary of the Department of Temperance and Moral Reform of the Methodist church, said:

"He heard many complaints about 'Christian ministers taking part and speaking on public or political questions. Why should we not?'

"We are citizens as you all are, and what effects you, effects us 'just the same. Jesus Christ was 'interested in all that went on 'around and about Him.

"Politics is a Divine institution, and the indifference of the best is 'always the opportunity for the 'worst among us."

No sane or liberal minded man will dispute the arguments of Mr. Aikens. The ministers of the country should be the leaders of every movement tending to the moral and social uplifting of the community. And the question naturally arises will the people of a community overlook the private political leanings of the minister and take his words, as they are no doubt intended to be, the honest expression of a man seeking faithfully and sincerely to better the conditions which every wide awake man knows exist. There was a striking illustration of this matter only a few years ago in this country when a number of the ministers, among whom was the present man-

ger and erstwhile Editor of this journal, honestly and fearlessly sought to deliver the country from the wholesale barter in franchise which is patent in every public man. The result was that the private political leaning of the ministers was everywhere brought forward and wrong interpretations were placed upon honest utterances with the result that the very men who went through the country trying to uplift and purify were branded as partisans of the worst kind.

The result, to say the least was discouraging. The Ministers felt that in spite of the cry of the people for efforts after purity when it got down to actual work, purity was not desired and the impression left upon the minds of the most active workers in the campaign referred to was that only an extreme of corruption, an extreme which would produce moral stench and nausea and conditions repulsive to sensible men, would alone awaken the electorate to the need of sweeping reforms. To this undesirable goal the country is fast reaching. Huge funds now seem essential for an election and it is a common statement that in one polling place in one of our leading counties where there is over 300 voters only 17 can actually be looked upon as non-purchasable.

Surely conditions like this warrant not only activity upon the part of the ministers but also upon the part of all honest men everywhere. The doctrine of laissez-nous faire should become a thing of the past. To let this thing alone is to destroy the very fundamentals of our constitution. The very men, who by a play of circumstance, are forced to partake of it, are sick and disgusted.

It is time that the manhood and womanhood of our land rebelled against it. To gain the desired success there must not only be more broadness of thought and a willingness to let the ministers and moral leaders have their private opinions, but a union of effort in the moral purging of the land. Mr. Aikens may be deemed visionary by some, but the fact remains that purity can only come by the insertion of purity and reform by the strong acts of living virile men—even tho' they come in the guise of reformers.

"Kindly have this matter investigated and let me know the results."

Electric Power Company Contract Referred to Committee of the Whole

Moved by Coun Dibblee and Mair and passed that the clerk be requested to give the usual 30 days notice for a vote of the ratepayers on permanent streets.

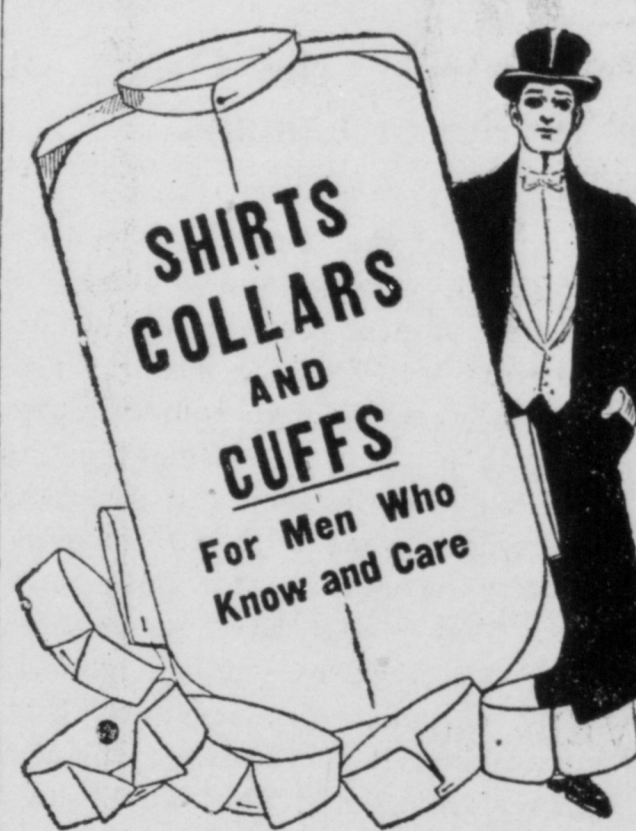
