## GOVERNMENT WEARING A COAT OF MANY COLORS

Extract From Able Speech of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in the House of Commons This Week

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O "THE CHARACTER OF THE VICTORY OF SEPTEMBER 21ST  
O WAS A TRIUMPH OF IMPERIALISM. ALL OVER THE COUN-  
O TRY WE WERE GREETED WITH PARADES OF TRIUMPHS WITH  
O SHOUTS OF VICTORY FOR THE CAUSE OF IMPERIALISM.  
O INDEED ON THE VERY NEXT DAY, THE 22ND OF SEPTEMBER,  
O MR. JOSEPH CHAMBERLAIN HIMSELF, THE APOSTLE  
O OF IMPERIALISM, CABLED HIS CONGRATULATIONS AND  
O HIS BLESSINGS TO MY HONORABLE FRIEND, STATING  
O THAT HE SAW IN THE VICTORY THE DAWN OF THE DAY  
O HE HAD LONG BEEN LOOKING FOR, AND THAT HE HOPED  
O SOON TO SEE THE REALIZATION OF HIS IMPERIALISTIC  
O DREAMS. SO, UNDER THE CIRCUMSTANCES, THEREFORE  
O THERE IS PERHAPS NO OCCASION TO ASK WHAT IS THE  
O CHARACTER OF THIS ADMINISTRATION? IS THERE ANY  
O DOUBT? IF I WERE TO LISTEN TO MY OWN REASONING, MY  
O OWN JUDGMENT, IF I WERE TO ATTACH IMPORTANCE TO  
O THE DELIVERANCE OF MY HONORABLE FRIENDS OPPO-  
O SITE, I WOULD CONCLUDE THAT THIS IS A TRUE IMPER-  
O IALIST ADMINISTRATION. THAT IS WHAT MY REASON  
O WOULD TELL ME, BUT MY EYES TELL ME A DIFFERENT  
O STORY. (LAUGHTER AND APPLAUSE.) WHEN I LOOK ABOUT  
O I CANNOT SEE WHAT IS IN THE HEARTS OF HONORABLE  
O GENTLEMEN, THAT THEY HAVE REFUSED TO TELL US;  
O BUT I SEE BEFORE ME A VERY COMPOSITE GALAXY. I SEE  
O MEN SITTING ON THE TREASURY BENCHES OPPOSITE,  
O ONE, TWO, THREE, PERHAPS FOUR, UPON WHICH THE  
O BLESSING OF MR. JOSEPH CHAMBERLAIN WOULD PRODUCE  
O THE SAME CONTORTIONS AS THE SPRINKLING OF HOLY  
O WATER UPON THE HEAD OF SATAN. (RENEWED LAUGHTER  
O AND APPLAUSE.) THEY CANNOT HAVE COME TOGETHER  
O WITHOUT SOMETHING EXTRAORDINARY HAVING TAKEN  
O PLACE. THIS GOVERNMENT IS LIKE ANOTHER JOSEPH; IT  
O WEARS A COAT OF MANY COLORS. (HEAR, HEAR AND  
O LAUGHTER.) ANOTHER JOSEPH WAS BETRAYED BY  
O HIS BROTHERS AND SOLD INTO BONDAGE. I HAVE NO HES-  
O ITATION IN SAYING, WITH A FULL SENSE OF THE RESPON-  
O SIBILITY ATTACHING TO MY WORDS, THAT THE HON. GEN-  
O TLEMEN NOW ON THE TREASURY BENCHES CANNOT HAVE  
O COME TOGETHER UNLESS SOME OF THEIR BRETHREN  
O HAVE BEEN BETRAYED AND UNLESS SOME OF THE ELEC-  
O TORS EITHER IN ONTARIO OR IN QUEBEC HAVE BEEN SOLD  
O AND BADLY SOLD. (CHEERS).--SIR WILFRID LAURIER IN

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## F. B. CARVELL DENOUNCES TORY-NATIONALIST ALLIANCE

Ottawa, November 21.--There was some New Brunswick politics in the house today. F. B. Carvell, Hon. Dr. Pugsley and Hon. Mr. Hazen were heard on the issue of the late campaign.

The issue for which reciprocity stood in the recent campaign, the securing of larger markets for the Canadian producers was not dead, declared F. B. Carvell, of Carleton, N.B., who resumed the debate.

"I care not what you call it," said he, "the government which would loyally serve the interests of this great and growing dominion must set itself to secure good markets for its increasing productiveness. The policy of raising tariff barriers higher and higher could not ultimately survive."

Hon. Mr. Foster interrupted. "It is not necessary," he said, "to place a larger protection on imports to make a home market."

"I am glad to have this intimation from the minister that there is to be no increase in tariff, at any rate," responded Mr. Carvell.

This brought Mr. Foster to his feet again with alacrity. "I did not say that," he observed, amid Liberal laughter.

"Ah," observed Mr. Carvell, smiling, "I thought the hon. gentleman had gone further than he intended."

BOURASSA, THE MASTER.

Proceeding, he arraigned the government for conducting an election campaign based upon race and religious prejudice, and dealing with the naval question, scored the composition of the Nationalist-Conservative cabinet.

"Henri Bourassa is the master of the present administration," he declared. "It is absolutely and abjectly under the control of the Nationalist party. The Premier has confessed that he does not know what he is going to do. Let me tell him. He is going to do just what his Nationalist masters tell him; he is going to do nothing. The plebiscite is the refuge of a government which cannot make up its mind. It puts Canada in a position of humiliation before the eyes of the world."

## LADY MISSIONARY FROM CHINA

Miss Wade, a worker of the M. S. C. C. in the Foochow district of China was in Woodstock on Monday.

In the afternoon Mrs. F. H. J. Diblee was hostess at a reception when the members of the W. A. under whose auspices Miss Wade had come to Woodstock, were able to meet her personally. In the evening Miss Wade spoke to a large and interested audience in St. Luke's school room. The enthusiasm for her work and the sympathy expressed for the unprivileged Chinese were most marked; Miss Wade seems impressed to a wonderful degree with the calamitous result

of a reorganized China, bearing the outer shell of Western civilization but lacking the inner influence of religion. She earnestly set forth the great opportunities both for work and more workers. A silver collection was taken to defray Miss Wade's expenses and help her particular mission.


AN APPROPRIATE SERMON.

## OPENING OF THE FISHER CARLETON COUNTY HOSPITAL

The Building, a Gift to the County From the Late L. P. Fisher, One of the Finest in Canada

With the opening of the Fisher Memorial Hospital, Woodstock can boast of having the finest situated hospital in Canada. Such at least is the verdict of competent men from the large centres who have looked over the building and its surroundings. Situated as it is on an elevation overlooking the river and protected on the north and west sides by a dense growth of evergreen trees, and with a view of many miles in every direction, it is indeed an ideal site. The building was erected some 35 years ago by the late Lewis P. Fisher as a private residence, and there is perhaps not another building in the Dominion which has stood the test of time as well. The walls are in perfect shape, every door and window fits just as perfectly as they did when put in. It is as near fire proof as it is pos-

sible for a wooden building to be. The roof is double boarded and between the boards is a solid half inch of plaster, so that in the event of fire, the flames will be confined to the outer roof. The doors on the second floor were purchased by Mr. Fisher at the time of the World's Fair at Philadelphia where they were awarded first class diplomas, and they probably cannot be duplicated in America today.

A traveller who has visited nearly every hospital in Canada, while being shown through the house recently, remarked that had it been built purposely for a hospital it could hardly have been laid off better, and it would seem that, even when erecting the building thirty odd years ago, Mr. Fisher had it planned in such a manner that it could easily be converted into a public institution, and there seems no doubt that such was his intention at the time of building.

The citizens of Carleton County did Woodstock particularly have just reason to honor the name of Lewis P. Fisher, who even in the prime of life planned far into the future for the benefit and welfare of his fellow-men.

The rooms and halls on the first floor of the main building are handsomely finished in cherry and walnut, the second floor in cherry, and the ell in ash and birch. Massive, easy ascending stairways lead from the first floor upwards, the steps covered with rubber matting. An elevator capable of holding a seven foot cot, runs from the lower to the upper hall, so that patients may be moved with the least possible exertion.

The building has been largely remodelled inside, the work being under the supervision of Mr. William Chapman, Master Builder, who has been assisted by Stephen Shaw. The large south front room has been made into two private wards. The old bath section of the main house,

The building is heated by two large hot air furnaces, which were used for heating purposes by the late Mr. Fisher, and two large hot water boilers which have lately been installed by Pickel & Davidson, local plumbers. The hot water plant was put in so that there would be ample heat in the northern part of the building. A large quantity of new supplies, including a latest improved sterilizer have been ordered by the trustees, so that the equipment of the hospital will be second to none in the provinces.

The first floor of the building contains two kitchens, a dining room, pantry and laundry. A dumb waiter runs from the kitchen to the second floor. Near the kitchen is the cold storage room with concrete walls and floor. There are also two public wards, the men's 50x20 ft., and the women's 29x18 ft.

The second floor contains the large operating room, an etherizing room, and ten private wards. The large elevator is almost directly in front of the etherizing room so that patients, who have to be taken to the operating room, may be moved as little as possible.

The Matron's office room will be situated directly at the end of the main hall at the front of the building. There are also on this floor seven lavatories, eight wash bowls, five sinks, two bath tubs and two shower baths. The rooms on the upper floor, of which there are four, will be occupied by the nurses. The new furniture, beds mattresses, etc., for the building are being supplied by J. Vanwart, furniture dealer of this town.

The house is supplied with water from the town system, but there is also a pump connected with the purest of spring water. The building is also connected with the town sewerage system. A fire escape reaches old bath section of the main house.
